BOUND FOR HOP YARDS

MANY SALEM FAMILIES LEAVE FOR THEIR ANNUAL PROFITABLE OUTING IN THE COUNTRY.

The annual exit of Salem families to the hop yards has begun. The advance guard left this morning. Hop growers will be kept employed for several days in transporting pickers to their yards in time for the picking of the crop, which will begin any time next week, or the first of the following week, according to the location of the yards. Some yards ripen more rapidly than others, and in these picking will be general by Wednesday of next week. The harvesting of the crop in all of the yards of the valley will be in progress by September 8th. It has been estimated that 25,000 pickers will be required to harvest the hop crop this year. Of that number a large part will come from Portland.

L. L. Patterson, who with A. N. Gilbert, owns a hop ranch near Eola, says he will begin picking his early Fuggles next Monday, and the later varieties about a week later. Mr. Patterson says the talk of a probable shortage of pickers is absurd. He has been compelled to refuse many applicants, while his neighbors have referred to him pickers that they were unable to furnish employment. This same condition exists in all sections where reports have been made. Not a word of complaint has been made against the established price of 40 cents for picking, and that price will probably prevail throughout the valley, except possibly in the case of growers having very small acreage, who may be obliged to pay more as an inducement to get their hops picked.

SWALLOWED PEACH SEED

C. W. HELLENBRAND, VETERAN RESTAURANTER, THOUGHT HIS TIME HAD SURELY COME.

Charles W. Hellenbrand, Salem's pioneer restauranter, thought his time had surely arrived this morning. While eating a peach, he swallowed one-half of the seed, which lodged in the oesophagus, causing him severe and alarming pains. Drs. Smith, Tammie and Lane were summoned, and in a few minutes were successful in relieving the sufferer, and in affecting the displacement of the obstruction. Charles was badly scared, however, and declares that he will in the future eat only the seedless variety.

Many Swedes Coming Here.
Stockholm, Aug. 29.—Driven from their homes by the unprecedented hard times, and the stringent conscription laws in Sweden, an unusually large number of Scandinavians are making their way to America this summer. Every steamer leaving for America is crowded, and the transport lines are coping with the greatest rush since the early 80's. Many are unable to obtain passage at Scandinavian ports and are obliged to go to Liverpool and Southampton.

It is estimated that 15,000 passengers for America have left Copenhagen alone during the past six months. The emigrants are mostly of an excellent class. They are bound chiefly for the Northwestern states, where they intend to settle on agricultural land.

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OUTRANKS THEM ALL

CHEMAWA SCHOOL EXCELS OTHER INDIAN INSTITUTIONS OF THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST.

A dispatch from Washington D. C. to the Portland Oregonian includes a complimentary mention of the Salem school by an official of the Indian bureau. The dispatch follows:

It seems to be the consensus of opinion among officials of the Indian bureau, who visit the Pacific coast, that the school at Salem, Or., far outranks all other Indian schools of the Northwest, and, but for capacity, stands in the class with Carlisle, Haskell and Hampton. One of the bureau chiefs of the Washington office recently visited a number of schools on the coast, and returned to Washington satisfied at finding the Chemawa institution all that had been claimed for it by its friends. Speaking of it, he said:

"The Salem school is an exceptionally fine one. The plant generally is in good condition, and the new dormitory, which we called our 'summer hotel,' is not out-classed by any building of its kind in the Indian service. I was unfortunate in visiting Salem when the school was not in session, so gained my opinions principally from the buildings and grounds. Salem certainly has a desirable location for its school, and with a slight rearrangement of the buildings, which will be made at an opportune time, the plant will be markedly improved in appearance."

"I was particularly pleased with the hospital at the Salem school. I have visited many Indian hospitals, but never before have I seen one that equals that in attractiveness. The school physician is a lover of flowers, and, by the exercise of good taste and some gardening ability, has endeavored the hospital with attractive beds and lawns, which must be grateful to the eyes of convalescing patients. The same attractive features prevail inside the hospital, and from roof to cellar I was unable to find a speck of dust. Cleanliness is the keynote of the physician and nurse in charge."

"There is a fine opportunity to build up a great school at Salem," he continued. "There is no immediate demand for enlarging the capacity of the school beyond what is now provided for. Plans are now under consideration for the \$25,000 brick dormitory authorized at the last session of congress, and this, with improved heating and lighting facilities, will provide every present requirement. As I said before, it may be necessary before long to move some of the smaller buildings, and possibly erect a new hospital building at a point more isolated than the building now used. The present hospital can readily be used for some other purpose. The ideal hospital is located remote from living quarters, so as to be at a safe distance in case infectious diseases should break out among the pupils. It may also be decided to ask congress next winter to provide a new and modern lavatory, to supplant that now in use, so that modern plumbing may be provided throughout, and replace much that belongs to the past. Aside from these changes, the Salem school really needs nothing beyond the customary repairs made necessary by time and use."

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DOMESTIC TROUBLES
