Mountain Lion at Belknap's.
Pleasure-seekers in the mountains near Belknap Springs had a thrilling adventure recently, according to Julian Ward, a farmer living near Coburg, who has just returned from the springs. The persons in question, whose name was not learned, went out for a watch at a deer lick, and in planning the ambush they tethered their pack horse a short distance from where they lay in wait for the deer. The next morning when they went for their pack horse his clean picked bones were found in testimony of a sumptuous feast by a mountain lion. The boldness of the attack, which occurred within 100 yards of where the hunters were lying, shows the desperation of these ferocious beasts when goaded by hunger.

Some Fine Grain.
F. P. Caldwell, of Spring Valley, Polk county, today brought to The Journal office a bunch of white spring oats. Twenty stalks grew from one, about six feet tall, and sustained nearly a quart of grain. Mr. Caldwell's crop of oats, wheat, peas and rye averaged 36 1/3 bushels to the acre, and he is himself satisfied with the year's results. He also has 20 acres of hops which look fine. His clover is one of the best crops he grows, and Mr. Caldwell is an advocate of clover as a rejuvenator of Oregon farms.

OREGON NEWS ITEMS.

Mrs. Craig, wife of Professor John Henry Craig, formerly of Tualatin Academy, at Forest Grove, died at her home at Bristolville, O., August 11th.

Peter McGovern, an old-time resident of Baker county, died in Baker City Friday. He has been in poor health for some time. Mr. McGovern came to Baker county and engaged in mining in 1870. He was very successful, and at one time owned a large amount of property. A wife and four children survive him.

The battleship Oregon is expected to sail for Chinese waters in about two weeks. She recently came off the dry dock, and is said to be in splendid trim.

Homer D. Anzell, of The Dalles, has been awarded the Morgan scholarship in the Columbia University of Law, for next year.

REPAIRING THE WIRES

SALEM'S ELECTRIC LIGHTING COMPANY CONTINUES TO IMPROVE ITS PROPERTIES AND THE SERVICE.

The Salem Light, Power & Traction Company is this year expending a large amount of money in the improvement of its properties in this city. Now that the company's roadbed has been placed in tip-top shape, attention is being given to the overhead wiring system. Superintendent Flannagan and a force of line men this morning began the making of permanent improvements in the wiring of the city. This has been needed for some time, and would have been done before, but for the fact that the management has been flooded with work for several months. All overhead wires for trolley and electric lighting purposes will be inspected and strengthened, preparatory to the heavy traffic that is expected next month during the state fair. When the improvements now being made are completed, the Salem street car system will be placed in first-class condition, and will be a credit to the city.

Will Print Muster Roll

Adjutant-General C. U. Gantenbein arranged with State Printer Leeds for the printing of 500 copies of the complete muster roll of the Second Oregon. This was ordered by the last legislature as a means of preserving in accessible form, the records of the famous Second Oregon. The copies will be distributed as directed by the governor, but it is understood that each of the commissioned officers of the Second Oregon, and the newspapers of the state, will receive copies, while the various libraries of the state will also be supplied with a copy.

ANOTHER MAN HAPPY

A. D. Pettyjohn, who operates the Hall's ferry across the Willamette at Crosson, was in the city today, and to say that he was happy would but lamely express his true feelings. Mr. Pettyjohn's hearing has been entirely restored, after a short treatment by the celebrated electric physician, Dr. Darrin. Mr. Pettyjohn was for over three years entirely deaf in one ear, and the other was seriously impaired. He can now hear perfectly, and says he cannot too highly recommend the doctor to others who are similarly afflicted.

A writ of habeas corpus, sued out for the release of Charles M. Fay, of Portland, Ore., before Judge Winchester, will be argued at Bismarck, N. D., today. Fay was charged by officers of Waukegan county, Wis., with obtaining money by fraud. The requisition for him was secured from the governor of Oregon, but afterward revoked, and Fay was taken from a train on a writ of habeas corpus. Attorneys for Fay say no crime was committed in Wisconsin.

WILL BE OBSERVED BY ALL

How Labor Day Will Be Celebrated Here

Banks, Offices and Business Houses to Close

The labor organizations of this city have made elaborate preparations for the fitting celebration of Labor Day, Monday. All public offices will be closed, and business of all kinds will be suspended at noon, and all will participate in the exercises of the day. At 1 o'clock in the afternoon the union organizations of the city will give a street parade. It will consist of two divisions, and will include eight unions, each organization having adopted a uniform to be worn in the procession. The unions that will participate are as follows: Painters', Typographical, Carpenters', Bricklayers' and Federal. The grand marshal will be A. C. Hopf, bookkeeper for J. J. Dalrymple. His aides will be C. A. Bord, from the Painters', and Ed. Swayze, from the Carpenters'. Following the parade, there will be exercises at Marion square, including addresses by Representative-elect Frank Davey, ex-Representative E. H. Flag, L. H. McMahon and J. A. Jeffrey. During the afternoon a program of sports will be carried out on the streets, the merchants of the city having contributed valuable prizes for the successful contestants. The day's exercises will conclude with a grand ball in the armory in the evening, when several prizes will be awarded.

The Central Labor Union will hold a meeting Sunday, when the final arrangements will be made for the program of the day. The program will not vary materially, however, from that published in The Journal Friday evening, an outline of which appears above.

A Bank Holiday.
Monday, September 1st being a non-judicial day in this state, all bills, notes and other demands which would otherwise mature on that day will become due and payable on the day following, Tuesday, September 2d. For this reason all courts, public offices, banks and other business houses observe the day by suspending their several functions, as authorized by law. No legal demand being possible on that day for the payment of monies, or the performance of any other business obligation or duty.

Growth of Labor Unions.
The growth of labor organizations in the state is shown perhaps more forcibly than in any other way by the fact that all the important cities this year intend to celebrate Labor Day. Only Portland, Astoria and Baker City held celebrations last year, while next Monday Portland, Astoria, Baker City, La Grande, Salem, Oregon City, Grants Pass, Albany and Roseburg will give big demonstrations in honor of the day.

The United States is the only country in the world which has set aside a legal holiday devoted to celebrations by the wage-earners, and Labor Day is now almost a national holiday. It has been recognized by the laws of 36 states and by the District of Columbia. The origin of Labor Day is found in an agitation which began in New York in 1882. All the great labor organizations of the country participated in the efforts to secure this recognition of labor's cause, but it was not until 1887 that the efforts bore fruit of legislation, when Oregon passed a law setting aside the first Monday in September for this observance.

TROUBLES OF THE GIBSONS

HUSBAND MAKES STARTLING ALLEGATIONS IN HIS ANSWER TO DIVORCE SUIT OF HIS WIFE.

Thomas Gibson, defendant in a divorce suit, recently brought against him by his wife, Mary F. Gibson, today through his attorneys, J. A. Jeffrey and R. A. Fleming, filed an answer to the complaint, and in so doing makes some startling allegations concerning the woman who seeks to be divorced from him. After making a general denial of the allegations set out in the complaint—which includes the spitting of tobacco juice in the face of the plaintiff, cruelly beating her, and threatening her life—Gibson, for a further and separate answer and defense, says that the plaintiff is possessed of a "violent, vicious and ungovernable temper, and a wicked, vile and blasphemous tongue;" has threatened, cursed and maltreated defendant; has applied to him "profane, vile and abusive language and epithets;" threatened to place poison in his food; assaulted him with rocks, and stated that she would murder him. The defendant further alleges that the plaintiff is not a person to have the care and custody of the minor children, and in support of the allegation complains that "said plaintiff has advised and encouraged the minor children of the said plaintiff mentioned in the complaint herein to commit the crime of larceny by concealing, and encouraging them to retain articles that had been stolen by them from the neighbors of the plaintiff and defendant, and the plaintiff has refused to permit the said minor children to attend the district school," etc.

In further support of his contention the defendant charges that several years after the death of the plaintiff's first husband, and prior to her marriage with himself, that the plaintiff "procured an abortion to be committed upon herself, and said unborn child was thereby murdered by the plaintiff." In his answer the defendant claims that the suit has been brought against him "at the instance, procurement and instigation of one A. T. Savage, who is now and ever since the commencement of this suit, and prior thereto, has been taking an active part in prosecuting the same, and urging that the plaintiff so do, for the purpose of injuring, harassing and ruining the defendant, and said suit would never have been begun but for the evil and pernicious influence and machinations of the said Savage over the plaintiff."

The defendant asks that the plaintiff's complaint be dismissed, that the bonds of matrimony existing between the plaintiff and defendant be forever dissolved, annulled and held for naught, that the defendant be decreed the care and custody of the minor child, and that he recover his costs and disbursements in the action.

Gibson, through his attorneys, today also filed an answer to the injunction suit that was brought against him by Mrs. Gibson, to restrain him from entering upon or in any way interfering with the management of the farm upon which the couple was living at the time the suit was commenced. Gibson asks that the plaintiff's complaint be dismissed, and that the injunction be dissolved, and demands judgment against the plaintiff for the sum of \$276.75, alleged to be the value of cattle and farm machinery belonging to him that is now in the possession of the plaintiff, including, also, a sum of interest money, and a further sum of \$1200, claimed to be due for work performed by himself on the farm, and for which he claims to have received nothing.

Board of Equalization.
The Marion county board of equalization will probably be called to meet on September 22d, or the week following. County Assessor Lembecke this morning said that, in the absence from the city of County Judge Scott, that he may himself issue the call for the meeting of the board, the members of which are the county judge, clerk and assessor. The law requires that the meeting of the board be regularly advertised, and since the tax roll must be completed and delivered by the assessor to the county clerk on the first Monday in October, the board will have to be convened soon. It is probable the action of Assessor Lembecke, in assessing the property of the Salem Flouring Mills Co., et al., will be protested, and the same will be heard by the board of equalization when it convenes.
