CHAMBERLAIN AND THE BOER LEADERS

Conference Resulted Satisfactorily to Both Sides

Great Britain Anxious to Forgive and Forget

Promised to End Military Law Shortly When Penal Retention of Boers Will Be Abandoned

London, Sept. 10.—A parliamentary paper, issued today, gives the following full details of the Chamberlain-Boer conference: General Botha said the conference was not asked with a desire to change the surrender conditions, but to gain certain unprovided points. He complained at the retention of burghers in the penal colony in Ceylon, and criticized the composition of the commission of inquiry; he alleged that the British in Natal were hostile to the Boers, and appealed for more money toward the relief of the widows and orphans, claiming that £2,000,000 were inadequate. Chamberlain's reply in all cases was satisfactory, with the exception of an increase of the relief fund, which was refused. He said the military law will shortly be ended, when penal retention will be abandoned. He also said that Great Britain's only desire is to forgive and forget, and paid high tribute to the valor of the Boers. He closed by emphatically denying the reported intention of Great Britain to sell the burghers' farms.

Belding. He testified that he heard the shooting and ran toward the scene. He encountered Belding just as the latter came out of a saloon. Belding told him what he had done, saying also: "I wanted to kill everybody by the name of McCroskey. I plugged the old man twice, and left him rolling on the floor."

The witness on cross-examination admitted that Belding did not seem much excited.

The attendance at the trial at the morning session was small, but in the afternoon all of the seats in the court room were occupied, and considerable interest was manifested by the spectators.

Judge George decided not to keep the jury together at night, as is frequently done in murder cases.

MAKES INSANITY PLEA

A. L. Belding, the Triple Murderer, is On Trial

Washington, Sept. 10.—Minister Powell cabled the state department today that the Haytian provisional government has declared Gonaves and several other ports closed to the commerce of the world, and added that Admiral Killick, commanding the Pierrot, went down with his ship when destroyed by the German gunboat. His body has been recovered.

Jersey City, Sept. 10.—In a trolley collision this morning a car on the Bayonne line became unmanageable, and rushing around a curve, caught a pedestrian, Miss Mary Taylor, on the bumper. She clung desperately to the bumper, when the car crashed into another, killing her, and injuring a score of persons, one of whom, Abraham Ruskin, will die.

Washington Republicans Are in Session

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 10.—The Republican state convention is in session here for the purpose of naming candidates for the offices to be filled at the approaching election. Opinions expressed by the delegates and other party leaders indicate that the resolutions will endorse the administration of President Roosevelt and his Cuban policy, declare for election of United States senators by direct vote of the people, and in regards to state affairs will demand equal taxation on all property, and urge the abolition of the railroad lobby, and the creation of a railroad commission.

Vienna, Sept. 10.—At Marianna, Hungary, 200 pilgrims, sleeping in a barn, were last night attacked by a band of gypsies, robbed and the building fired. Seventeen of the travelers were incinerated and 37 seriously burned.

WANTED TO BE UNITED IN DEATH

Aged Woman Asphyxiates Herself and Husband—Another Chicago Tragedy

Chicago, Sept. 10.—Ill and fearing that death would separate her from her husband, Mrs. Frederika Schmidt, aged 72, turned on the gas last night, asphyxiating her husband, aged 73, and herself. The woman was dying when discovered this morning. A second tragedy occurred here this morning, when Roland O'Shea, a young attorney, shot and killed Emily Hogenson, the daughter of a prominent real estate dealer, then himself asphyxiating her, aged 20, and himself. He was angered because the girl refused to make up in a quarrel in which the couple had been engaged in last night.

RIVER STEAMERS ARE TIED-UP

Marine Engineers Are Striking for Higher Pay and Reinstatement of Union Men

Portland, Sept. 10.—The marine engineers of the local steamers are striking for a 10 per cent. increase and reinstatement of discharged union men. The boats are tying up as fast as they arrive.

The threatened trouble has been brewing for some time—in fact ever since the settlement of the marine engineers' strike, of several weeks ago. The terms of the agreement were far from satisfactory to a large number of the engineers, and the dissatisfaction among them has been growing. Fully half a dozen of them were preceded by non-union men, and the transportation companies refused to consider any proposition looking to their reinstatement. The breach between the owners and engineers widened as the weeks passed by. President Uhler, of the Marine Engineers' Association, made an official visit to Portland, and endeavored to restore peace. Conferences were held, but nothing was accomplished. The demand was then sent to the owners, and they were given until today to affix their signatures to it. As near as can be learned the difference in the schedule now in force and the one asked amounts to practically \$150 per month. This includes the operation of all boats on the Columbia, Willamette

and Snake rivers. There are about 70 engineers, and if the new agreement should be granted would mean an advance in wages of a little over \$10 per month to the man. In all there are 50 boats, and the new agreement represents an additional outlay to each of a trifle over \$14 per month.

It is not known that the strike will affect the operation of the only line of steamers that is plying on the Willamette river to Salem. Inquiry at the office of the Oregon City Transportation company's office, in this city, elicited the information that company is the only company that is operating steamers on the river between Salem and Portland. The Pomona left for down-river points this morning, and will not return, according to its schedule, until Thursday evening. Agent Baldwin says he has no knowledge that the engineers employed by his company are identified with the organization that has ordered the strike. The company is an independent one, and in the employment of its help has usually found independent mechanics, and has been enabled thereby to continue the operation of its boats when the other companies were compelled to shut down.

St. Louis, Sept. 10.—Delegate Hangan was taken from the jail to go before the grand jury today, and testified that the bribery combine received \$50,000 for killing the street car bill, presented August 1st of this year. The measure assured the protection of the lives and property of passengers.

MYSTERY SURROUNDS THE MINER'S CASE

Mitchell and the Coal Operators Profess Ignorance As to the Stone-Morgan Conference

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Sept. 10.—President Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers, this morning denied knowledge of any plans looking toward a resumption of work, and said that he had received no communication from Governor Stone. The operators also profess ignorance as to the result of the conference, and both sides show a disposition to continue the struggle indefinitely.

Good News from Philadelphia. New York, Sept. 10.—A stock ticker at 3 o'clock sent out the following Philadelphia dispatch: "It is semi-officially announced this afternoon that the coal operators are preparing a circular to be posted at the mines tomorrow, offering concessions to the miners, if they return to work Monday."

Will Not Recognize Union.
Montgomery, W. Va., Sept. 10.—The Kanawha & Hoeking Coal Company today has posted notices, granting all the strikers demands, save union recognition.

Troops Will Leave.
Thurmond, W. Va., Sept. 10.—It is almost certain that the troops stationed here the past month will be ordered home today.

Report is Denied.
New York, Sept. 10.—The stock ticker at 3:30 sent out the following: "We have excellent authority for denying the Philadelphia report, portending concessions to be offered the striking miners."

PRESIDENT ARRIVED HOME

Will Remain There Until He Starts for Western Trip

Washington, Sept. 10.—President Roosevelt arrived here at 6:30 o'clock this morning, and remained only a half hour, and then proceeded to Oyster Bay. Secretary Cortelyou immediately started for his home at Hempstead, Long Island, where he will remain until the president starts on his Chicago-St. Louis trip, September 15th.
