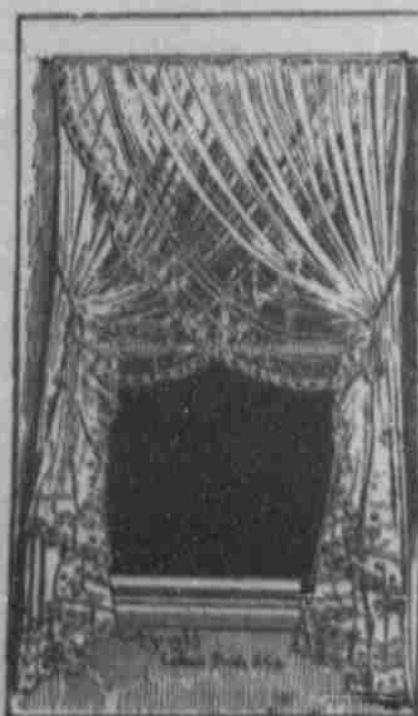

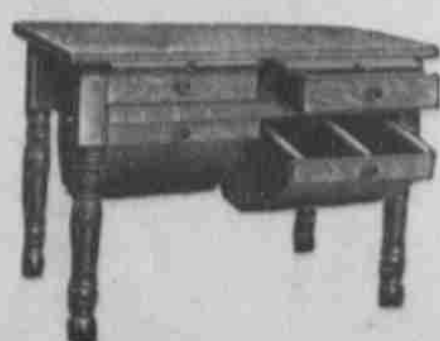

CLAIMS HE'S NOT INSANE

N. E. Kegg, of Yamhill County
Wanted to Get Out

Invoked Habeas Corpus Proceedings to Effect Release

A habeas corpus proceeding was begun Friday in the Marion county circuit court by N. E. Kegg, plaintiff and petitioner, against Dr. J. F. Calbreath, superintendent of the state insane asylum, defendant. Kegg is a patient at the state insane asylum, where he was received from Yamhill county in May, 1900. In his petition for a writ of habeas corpus Kegg alleged that the commitment papers under which he was committed to the asylum were irregular and defective, and did not comply with the statutes of the state. The writ was made returnable before County Judge J. H. Scott, in this city, at 9 a. m.

Kegg was represented in the proceeding by J. A. Jeffrey, of this city. It was alleged by the petitioner that the commitment papers, by which he was sent to the asylum, were defective, and for that reason it was not entitled in any court of jurisdiction to examine the charge; that the commitment was without date; that it did not bear the seal of the county court; that there was a lack of jurisdiction over the petitioner on the part of the county judge by reason of the defective commitment; that the commitment was further irregular because it did not comply with the statutes of the state. Petitioner further alleged that he has been long ago restored to his health and right mind, and that he is being wrongfully detained at the asylum, and that he has extensive business interests in Yamhill county that require his attention.

Case Was Continued.
At 9 o'clock this morning the case was called before County Judge Scott, when Attorney-General D. R. N. Blackburn, who appeared for Superintendent Calbreath and the state, asked for a continuance, on account of his ill-health. Objection was made by Kegg's attorney to any extended postponement. It was finally arranged that Deputy Prosecuting Attorney C. L. McNary should appear for the state, and the case was continued until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Another Postponement.
The asylum official, having made an irregular return to the writ, Judge Scott ordered the case continued until 2 o'clock Monday afternoon.
Case Is Not a Precedent.
This proceeding by Kegg against the management of the state insane asylum is not without a precedent in the state. In 1894 Captain J. B. Smith brought a writ of habeas corpus proceeding against Dr. L. L. Rowland, then superintendent of the asylum. Fourteen physicians were called and gave testimony at the hearing of the case, which was conducted by ex-County Judge W. C. Hubbard. The decision of the court was that Smith be remanded back to the asylum, but, during the hearing of the case, he escaped from the attendant in whose charge he had been placed.

Miss Nannie Wagner is at Van Anda, B. C., and her pa hadn't heard from her for some days, so he telegraphed as to her health, and today received the following message: "Don't be anxious. Am well. Caught a 20-pound salmon yesterday." So the family feel assured that she is in perfect health, and having a royal good time.

The O. C. T. Company seems to be successful in operating its line of

steamers on the river, in spite of the strike that exists among the marine engineers of the state. This company operates out of Portland, and runs one boat to Oregon City, another up the Yamhill, and the third to Salem. None of the engineers have yet abandoned any of these boats, but Agent Baldwin, in this city, says the second engineers are talking of joining the strikers. But in that event the company does not expect to have any trouble in replacing the men, so its boats can be run without any interruption of the trip schedule.

Harry Dunn and Ed. Lang, two familiar faces in the Salem police court, were arraigned before Police Judge Judah this morning on the usual charge of drunkenness. They were given ten days each. This will carry them over the fair season, and the police will be rid of at least two perennial offenders.

OUR SHERIFF IS CAGED.

The office of Sheriff Colbath, of Marion county, has been provided with office caging, by means of which the business department of that office is separated from the rest of the office. This is an improvement that has been long needed in that department at the court house, and will admit of the transaction of the business of that office in a more formal and business-like manner.

BETTER SERVICE.

The management of the Salem street car company this morning inaugurated a ten-minute service to the fair grounds, over both of its lines, and the improved service will be maintained until after the fair. Extensive repairs have been made to the company's roadbed and overhead wiring, and all arrangements made for the safe and expeditious transporting of the immense crowds to and from the exposition grounds.

Suit for Money.

F. Levy, the hop merchant, today began suit against Ed. Herren for \$1950 due on a promissory note and \$200 attorney's fees, and has attached Mr. Herren's growing crop of hops to secure the same.

An Insane Woman.

Mrs. F. G. Tolle was this afternoon examined for insanity before Judge Scott, and was committed to the asylum.

American Liner Won.

New York, Sept. 13.—The American liner, Philadelphia, has won the transatlantic race with the Puert Rico. The former arrived this morning.

W. W. Skinner was in Portland the other day, and was asked to chide the chutes, but could not get an agreement with the manager as to the price.

Found His Wife In the Asylum

Carl Hansen, a Danish citizen from Portland, came to Salem today in search of his wife, who left that city two weeks ago and came up the valley hop picking. At Salem he learned that a woman answering the description of Mrs. Hansen had been prosecuted from working in the sun, and had been taken to Salem for treatment. Arrived here he was not able to get any track of her, but finally found a newspaper item to the effect that she had been sent to the asylum. Telephone connections being secured, he learned that such was the case, and took the street car and went out to Wanted.—Four or five waiters at the Willamette Hotel.
