FIREBUGS' DESTRUCTIVE WORK

Strikers are Charged With the Crime

Valuable Mining Properties Are Destroyed

Troops Come to the Aid of Non-Union Miners

Fayetteville, W. Va., Sept. 15.—The immense coal mine and adjoining buildings of the Victoria Coke & Coal Company, at Capertown, was destroyed by fire this morning. It is supposed to be the incendiary work of strikers. Cars were loaded with coal oil and released on the aerial tramway across the river, which dashed into the mine. The flames spread rapidly, and the protection is inadequate. A sheriff's posse is endeavoring to arrest the perpetrators. The mine is owned by New York capitalists.

Troops Frustrate Strikers

Mahoney City, Sept. 14.—An army of strikers pickets assembled this morning determined to prevent non-union men reporting at the colliery. Troops were barged forward by special train from Shenandoah, and frustrated the strikers, enabling the North Mahoney washery to continue work.

In Behalf of the Miners

Chicago, Sept. 14.—J. E. Barry, Jr., commissioner of San Francisco, and a prominent labor leader, tomorrow leaves Chicago, where he has been in speaking the fire department, for the anthracite fields. He expects to gather data there before he returns to the Pacific coast, where he will address the labor organizations of the entire coast, explaining the strike conditions, and soliciting support in behalf of the miners.

STATE FAIR NOTES

Excursion from Portland.

Two special trains, each consisting of 11 coaches, arrived from Portland about 10 o'clock this morning, with an entourage of nearly 1000 people from Portland to participate in the festivities of Portland day at the state fair. In addition to the special trains, several hundred visitors arrived on the regular train at 11 o'clock. The attendance today is probably not as large as on Salem day, but it very closely rivals the phenomenal attendance of yesterday.

Loyal Salientes.

While there is an immense crowd today, it is largely made up of Salem people. They not only raised a purse of \$1,000 for the special Salem day runs but they had the nerve to close all their places of business that could be closed and made the city look like Sunday and all went to the fair Wednesday and many are doing it again today. With two thousand visitors from Portland and all the people from the countryside for 15 miles in every direction, the crowd is still not as large as it was on Salem day when men, women and child went as a matter of duty to the state fair. Credit is due for the turnout from Portland but all honor to the loyal people of Salem.

A Daily Concert.

At the Gen. C. Will music pavilion in the auditorium there is a daily concert on the Holway grand piano with some of the best pianists of the Capital city as performers. The finest classical and up-to-date music is rendered to listening throngs of people, while the talking machines produce the latest hits in speech and song. The Will family are certainly entitled to credit for doing more than their share as great entertainers at Oregon's greatest state fair.

Hotels and Dining Halls.

The Willamette is crowded with people from cellar to garret these days. Every seat in the dining room is taken for hours each meal. The Catholic dining hall, at the fair grounds, and Mrs. Southwick's Home restaurant are packed for each meal at 50 cents a plate. All the restaurants in the city are chock-a-block, the people standing in line to get meals at Strong's and George Bros.

Police Court.

D. McPhillips this morning forfeited \$10 bail in the police court for drunkenness and John Anderson paid a \$10 fine for the same offense. Chief Gibson today made a clean-up of the city jail, and booted all of the fellows that were doing time for petty offenses, with the exception of Harry Dene and St. Lang, the two old-timers, who are doing a ten-days' sentence for drunkenness. Some 15 men were shown the road, and they went, too.

Divorce Granted.

Circuit Judge Botze this morning granted Leah M. Johnson a divorce from Claude A. Johnson, on the grounds of desertion. The plaintiff was given the right to resume her maiden name, Leila M. Tarpley. Bohans & Martin appeared for the plaintiff.

Stole Four Gallons of Cream.

While Mrs. John Given and family were picking hops in the W. H. Humphreys hop yard, an unknown party came to Mr. Given's place and removed about four gallons of cream. The cream was not missed until evening when Mrs. Given went into the milk house to get the cream to have it churned, when, to her surprise, the cream crock was empty.

If the party or parties who took the cream do not come and settle for it within the next few days, Mr. Given will place the matter in the hands of the authorities.

GENEROUS TACOMA ELKS

Offer Some Prize Money to the Poor

Who are Burned Out of Their Houses and Homes

Portland Sends Sufferers Four Thousand Dollars

(Special to Capital Journal.)
Portland, Sept. 14.—The Tacoma Elks will accept the second prize from Portland, and distribute the money among the fire sufferers in the state. This is a laudable solution of their contest with the Salem Elks over the award of first prize.

Portland, Sept. 14.—Over \$4000 has been contributed in Portland for the relief of forest fire sufferers, and this sum will be doubled by Saturday night. All church and many of the secret society organizations are at work collecting funds and clothing. The Merchants' Protective Association committee is making a vigorous canvass today, and on Friday night Elks' benefit performance will be given. On Tuesday afternoon a benefit comedy will be given at the Marquam. The police and fire department are engaged in a lively contest to see which will sell the greatest number of tickets for an entertainment at the Marquam.

Already considerable relief has been afforded in the Palmer, Gresham and Springwater districts. At 1 o'clock p. m. Friday, a general meeting of all the committees having charge of collections of relief funds will be held in the city hall for the purpose of laying out plans for the disbursement of the relief. Concentrated action is necessary in order that some localities and persons shall not receive all the assistance, while others are neglected.

Timber Fire at Tillamook.

Tillamook, Sept. 14.—A great timber fire is raging on Wilson river, nine miles from Tillamook, and there is a possibility that Tillamook may again be placed in danger, should the wind continue as at the present time. Already the loss has reached \$1,500,000, and unless the fire can be stopped by means of back fires, may aggregate \$2,000,000. Men are being dispatched to the scene of the fire to fight the flames, and good wages are being paid.

The area already burned includes seven sections and two townships of the best timber to be found in this section. The timber destroyed belonged to Elodgett & Co., of Chicago; Gilbert Bros., of Duluth, Minn., and Clark Bradley and Claud Thayer, of Tillamook.

This morning 40 men left to fight the fire, and those who have timber in that locality have organized and are paying \$4 a day for those who will volunteer to go to the burning district and aid in putting out the fire.

A Desolate Outlook.

Money and supplies are being forwarded into the burned-out districts as speedily as possible. This will relieve immediate necessities, though the people will suffer much during the next year. They depended upon their places for support, and will now have to leave their homes to look for employment. To stay and build up their homes is a hard task, even harder than if they were going into a new country. The old burned and dry logs are worse to handle than green trees, and they have no tools with which to work. Their fences are all down, their feed all burned up, and not a blade of

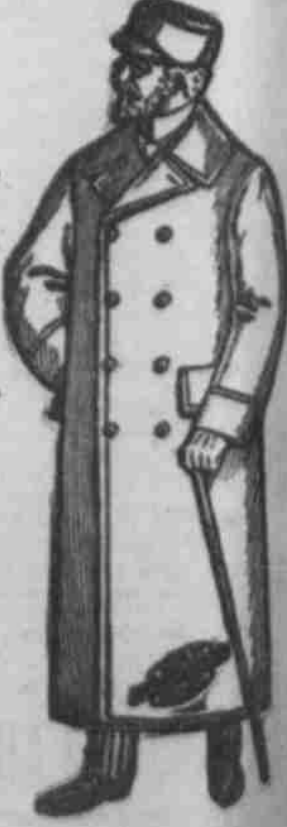
