NARROWLY ESCAPED DROWNING

Mrs. Henry E. Huggins Falls Into Willamette River

Was Rescued After Sinking the Third Time

Mrs. Henry E. Huggins, of Los Angeles, who is visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Gilbert, in this city, narrowly escaped drowning in the Willamette river about 3 o'clock Monday afternoon.

In company with Mrs. H. G. Meyer and daughter, Miss Alice, Mrs. Huggins had been taking photographic views along the banks of the river, bordering on the residence property of the Gilberts. It was suggested that Mrs. Meyer take a picture of the two young ladies from a boat in the river. Mrs. Huggins was the first to enter the flat-bottom boat, which suddenly overturned, and she was thrown headlong into the river, which at this point is very deep. Mrs. Meyer realized the seriousness of the situation, and, restoring the boat to its proper position, entered the same, while Miss Alice held the craft close to the shore. Mrs. Huggins came to the surface twice, but her companions failed to seize her. When she appeared the third time she grasped the boat with one hand, and was pulled into the boat by Mrs. Meyer. Medical aid was called and Mrs. Huggins has about recovered, save from the effects of the severe shock attending the mishap.

The accident was seemingly providential, since at this season of the year the river is at an extreme low water stage. The absence of any current is largely responsible for the rescue of Mrs. Huggins, who would very probably have been carried down stream and drowned before help could reach her, had there been any current what ever in the river channel at the scene of the mishap.

POWERS VERSUS POWERS

Two Answers Filed in Local Divorce Suit

Powers Attributes Impaired Health to Wife's Temper

G. M. Powers, who is defendant in a divorce suit instituted by his wife, Hattie L. Powers, has filed an answer to the complaint. The answer is signed by J. A. Jeffrey, Powers' attorney, and the local agent for the O. R. & N. Co., and was more recently employed by the Oregon Nursery Company, of this city, as a salesman. Powers is seeking for a divorce and an interest in the property. Mrs. Powers asks for \$20 a month alimony.

In his answer the defendant makes a general denial, and charges that the plaintiff is possessed of a violent, vicious and ungovernable temper, that she was abusive in her treatment of the defendant, that she scolded, worried and henpecked him on the slightest pretext; that she formerly abused him every time he attended a meeting of the Masonic order, to which he belonged, and that in so doing she would become hysterical, and would scream at the top of her voice for the purpose of henpecking, humiliating and lowering the defendant in the estimation of his friends and neighbors; that defendant purchased a large library of leading magazines and periodicals, and when he attempted to read them at some plaintiff would fly into a passion, and abuse him, charging that he was seeking to avoid her society. Defendant charges plaintiff with the removal of his house and the partial destruction of a valuable collection of mineral specimens, fossils and Indian relics. Defendant further represents that by reason of the actions and treatment of the plaintiff, his health became impaired, and in September, 1931, he went to San Jose, California, where he remained for several months, and while there followed him in the month of February, and renewed her personal abuse. Defendant further admits that in San Jose he inadvertently caused plaintiff to be locked in a room for about an hour, and alleges that while living with the plaintiff he provided every comfort and necessity; that after he entered the employ of the Oregon Nursery Company, plaintiff falsely and maliciously represented that he indulged to excess in the use of liquor, was out of his mind, and was apt to dishonestly appropriate and convert to his own use the property of the company, and that she would never allow defendant to procure a legal separation from her, and would always contend any effort in that direction, that a letter written by plaintiff at Salem to defendant at San Jose, last month, was signed by plaintiff "Your wife until death do us part."

As a cross-bill defendant asks to recover \$200, alleged value of library, and \$1000 for medical collection. Defendant asks for a decree dissolving the marriage relations, judgment for \$1200, and costs and disbursements.

Another Suit.

In the same suit, Frank H. Powers, of Portland, to whom defendant transferred his real property in August, and who is made a party defendant in pending suit, has filed an answer through his attorney, K. A. Jeffrey & Statler, of that city. Mrs. Cooper is charged in plaintiff's complaint that the transfer of the property was made with fraudulent intent, and without valuable consideration, and in support of position sets out in further and separate answer an estoppel to plaintiff's suit that plaintiff, at Albany, in March, 1932, told defendant that she would never bring suit for divorce against defendant, G. M. Powers. Defendant asks for a decree dissolving the complaint, and for his costs and disbursements.

SCARCITY OF HOUSES.

A Salem Business Man Complains That Capital City is Losing Permanent Residents on This Account.

"There is not a day passes but Salem loses permanent residents by reason of the scarcity of houses for their accommodation," said a Salem business man this morning. "Prospective residents come to this city, and find it impossible to find any residences for rent, and are forced to seek another location. Residences for rent were never more scarce in Salem than they are this year, and it would appear that the unusual demand for houses would make profitable the investment of idle capital in the building of houses for renting purposes."

This condition, it is learned from inquiry of real estate men, is true. There never has been the scarcity of houses for rent that exists in Salem at the present time. All houses are occupied, and rooms in private residences are also largely taken. With the demand that prevails for residences, it is very probable that next year will see many new residences built in this city.

PROPERTY VALUES EQUALIZED

Work of Marion County Board of Equalization

Amount of Roll Will Be Greater Than a Year Ago

The Marion county board of equalization completed its six days' session on Saturday evening. The report of the proceedings was not finished until today, and has been filed with the county clerk. The following is a summary of the work of the board in the matter of equalizing property valuations:

Mrs. Ruth Sayre's assessment reduced from \$2772 to \$2487.

Mary Mothers, reduced from \$660 to \$560.

C. F. Hein, Aumsville, money, notes and accounts, increased from \$255 to \$3225.

Mrs. A. W. Howell, Turner, money, notes and accounts, assessed for \$2000.

Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company, reduced from \$16,755 to \$16,355, a reduction of \$400 per mile on its poles.

J. C. Thompson, stock of merchandise, increased from \$4000 to \$5000.

Robert & Altnow, of Woodburn, merchandise and stock in trade, increased from \$1000 to \$1300.

Salem Flour Mills Company, water rights, assessed at \$7500; lots 1 to 5 and 6 to 8, block 45, and tract of land west of block 48, increased \$2000.

Geo. Collins, lot 3, block 5, Salem, reduced from \$1200 to \$1050.

Phil Metachan, lots 5 and 6, Waldo's add to Salem, reduced from \$3000 to \$2750.

Benjamin Strong, acreage in t. 7 s. 2 n. 12 e. non-tillable land reduced from \$20 to \$12 per acre.

A. D. Pettijohn, hop house, reduced from \$200 to \$100.

Woodburn bank, money, notes and accounts, reduced from \$15,000 to \$8500.

Loewenberg-Gold Company, tools and stock in trade, reduced from \$15,000 to \$12,500.

Capital National Bank, Salem, money, notes and accounts, reduced from \$24,500 to \$17,500; real property remaining as assessed, \$20,250.00.

Salem Water Company, lot 4, block 45, reduced from \$300 to \$100; lots 1 and 2, and fraction of lot 8, block 18, reduced from \$1200 to \$1000; lot 1 to 8, block 36, reduced from \$2400 to \$2000.

The board concluded its report as follows:

"It appearing to the board, after examining the said tax roll, that all of the assessments, as made by the assessor, as appears on said rolls, and not heretofore raised or lowered, are as they should be, and that no changes had been made in said tax roll, other than herein stated."

"Wherefore it is ordered that the clerk of this board be and is hereby instructed to carry the values in accordance to these findings into the columns of the taxroll headed 'as equalized by the county board.'"

Assessor Lembecke says that the aggregate valuations on this year's roll will be slightly in excess of the roll last year. The difference in the totals of the two rolls, however, will be small. The roll has been turned over to County Clerk Roland, who has the work of extending the property valuations, as conveyed by the board, on the roll. The next step in the completing of the roll will be the levying of the state, county, city school and road taxes, and the computer of the same, and then the roll will be ready to be turned over to the sheriff for collection.

First Band Rehearsal.

Needed An Interpreter

John Daniel, Andrew Schmidt and Nicholas Ludane today renounced their allegiance to the Emperor of Austria, and declared their intention of becoming subjects of Uncle Sam. Neither of the trio could speak a word of the English language, and County Clerk Roland was perplexed as to what the men wanted. Recorder Sigmond and Assessor Lembecke, the German contingent of the present county administration, were out of the building at the time, and their services could not be had. Mr. Roland found a German in another department of service, until the necessary papers had been issued. When the prospective citizens had finished their business and started for the door, Clerk Roland assured them that at the expiration of the two years that will elapse before the applicants for citizenship receive their final papers, that he expected to be able to speak German intelligently himself, and could personally issue the required papers without the services of an interpreter. One of the Germans replied in a broken way that by the same time he hoped to have partly mastered the English language.

Committee on Charter Amendments.

The Southern Pacific has announced a reduction of 25 cents per hundred in the rate on apples from Portland and all points south to the Missouri river and Texas. The new rate is 75 cents per hundred. The new rate to Chicago and St. Louis is 55 cents per hundred, a reduction of 115 cents.
