FIRST-DIRECT LEGISLATION AMENDMENT PUT IN OPERA

SECOND-STATE OFFICIALS PUT ON FLAT SALARIES, AND ALL FEES PUT IN THE TREASURY. THIRD-PROVISION MADE FOR THE LEWIS AND CLARK CEN-If these things are not done the state will suffer great loss, and each

The people demand the referendum to protect them against the extravagance and corruption of the regular session. Flat salaries were promised the people in all platforms. It will be suicidal for any party to defer that four years. If Oregon wants other Northwestern states to act on the Exposition

or all of these great matters may be defeated or fatally deferred.

Oregon must act first. The demand of the Indian War Veterans for an appropriation \$300,000 by the legislature only shows the character of pressure that will brought to bear on the regular session that meets in January.

There will be demands for \$300,000 for coyote scalp bounties, and for \$500,000 for the Portland Exposition. With a long string of candidates for United States Senator, headed by Jonathan Bourne and Chas. W. Fulton, to say nothing of the bitterness

If Bourne goes into the fight there will doubtless be a deadlock. That kind of a fight may result in the whole organization of the legislature being defeated. That has been done, and may be done again.

Warehouse Commission, for all kinds of commissions, and new jobs and proprintions. What show is there at the regular session for great Reform measures, like the initiative and Referendum, being put into effect? It may be done

There is no way to get the benefit and protection of Direct Legislation, but to enact the law to put it into effect at a Special Session of the egislature, held before the Regular session meets. The people will have no protection whatever against an extravagant

The people cannot get a Flat Salary law passed that will go into effect for four years, unless it is exacted at a special session held before
