AN ACT OF PETULANCY.

In the refusal of the ministerial council to grant national significance to the obsequies of Emile Zola, the childish, resentful spirit of France when wounded in its egotism, is characterized. To do homage to the genius of this illustrious man would be to condone the blow he struck at the national honor, when, by his relentless pursuit in seeking the vindication of Dreyfus, he exposed the rottenness of the existing military system, which caused the humiliation of France the wide world over. That the nation has been the gainer in the lesson acquired, does not appear to shortsighted officialism, in whom the old-time slogan of "l'Etat c'est Dieu" still dominates. Zola's prestige, however, does not suffer by this exhibition of petty vindictiveness, for though a Frenchman by birth the world was his country. It was for humanity at large that he wrought with trenchant pen and an unflinching moral purpose in view caused him to expose with masterful, yet shocking realistic skill the moral ills of society, the same hand also found the remedy for its healing. Based upon his profound confidence in the divine potentiality of man, and the ultimate triumph of truth and justice. Against this man's towering genius partisan hatred is impotent indeed.

THERE ARE BUT TWO WAYS.

Alderman Merrill, of Portland, deserves credit for bringing the question of dealing with vice by the city government to a climax. Either his way must be adopted, or there must be no blackmail permitted. There is a large amount of money collected from the criminal classes of Portland, and they are given protection by the city government. The laws against them are not enforced, and the city gets no revenues. The Journal believes that there should be no partnership between a city government and the vicious elements. No levies should be permitted by police or politicians. That is legalized blackmail. It demoralizes the government and the politics of the city that allow it.

No political boss at present has any graft of that kind, and the police do not raid or hold up any vicious class. If a citizen has a complaint to make of laws being violated by a certain class, he should report it to the city authorities. Dr. W. H. Byrd, dean of this department of the University, reports that there is a largely increased attendance this year.
