next year the service will have grown 00 per cent within three years. On July 1st there were 9461 rural outes, and this number increased 10,678 of September 15th. By the end of the present fiscal year, that is June 30, 1903, Superintendent Macher expects to have 14,000 routes in opation. It will take \$9,000,000 to main tain these routes during the next fiscal year, and congress will be asked to ap propriate 52,000,000 additional for the tablishment of more new routes. 
