Asylum

Statistics

The statistical report of Superintendent J. F. Calbreath, of the state insane asylum, submitted at the monthly meeting of the board of that institution, Monday afternoon, shows that on September 20th there were 1256 patients receiving treatment there, this number being three less than on August 31st. During the month 25 patients were received and four escapes returned, while 49 were discharged. The expense for supplies for the month was \$6206.97, while the salaries for the same period amounted to \$5498.61, or a total expense of \$11,705.58, or a per capita monthly expense of \$9.33.

Case Was Dismissed

After being postponed a number of times, the case of State vs. Sanford Hamrick, charged with killing pheasants during the closed season, was called before Justice Horgan and jury at 7 o'clock Monday evening. R. J. Fleming appeared for the private prosecutor, W. W. McCulloch, while L. H. McMahon represented the defendant. When the state had introduced two witnesses it rested its case, and, upon motion of the defense, the case was dismissed before it went to the jury.

Mines On Santiam

W. B. Lawler, of Virginia City, Nevada, is spending a few days in Salem. Mr. Lawler owns the Andromed mines in the Quartzville mining district of this county. He reports that but little active work is being done at this time in the Santiam district. The ore there is found to be too base to be profitably mined with the machinery that is now installed at the different

properties. Mr. Lawler says that tests of the ore are being made at Virginia City to discover if possible a more profitable system of mining the Santiam county properties. Mr. Lawler is very hopeful of final success in the development of his mining interests here. At the present time he is manager of the Gold Nugget mines, of White Pine county, Nevada.

FUNERAL OF A PIONEER

Large Concourse of Friends and Neighbors Pay Tribute of Respect to the Late Charles Claggett.

Funeral services over the remains of Charles Claggett were conducted by Rev. P. S. Knight Monday afternoon at the residence of F. A. Welch, north of Salem. There was a large attendance of the friends of the old pioneer from this city.

The pallbearers were: S. Farrar, Dave Pugh, M. E. Goodell, G. W. Johnson, H. Stapleton and J. Q. Wilson. Burial took place in the Claggett cemetery.

Mr. Claggett was well known to nearly all the old settlers in Western Oregon. He was recognized here as a man of great industry and of progressive ideas. While always taking an active interest in all public affairs, he was never a candidate for any office. Until about six years ago, he was a member of every Republican county convention held in this county, and was prominent in the councils of his party. His physical and mental activity continued until a few weeks ago, when a slight illness confined him to his room, finally resulting in his death. He left an estate valued at about \$20,000.

IS FORMER SALEM BOY

Earl Hansen and Two Other Boys Wanted in Washington for Horse Stealing—Geer Honors Requisition.

Sheriff H. L. Tucker, of Yakima county, Washington, was in the city today, and, upon requisition of Governor McBride, of Washington, received from Gov. Geer warrants of arrest for Earl Hansen, Fred Hickel and George Hart, who are wanted in Yakima county, Washington, for the larceny of a band of 27 horses. Hansen is under arrest at Hillsboro, Washington county, and the other two of the trio are in custody at Vancouver, Washington. Sheriff Tucker goes to Portland this afternoon, and thence to Hillsboro to get Hansen. He expects to have further trouble in getting Hansen out of the state, as the fellow is fighting against extradition.

Sheriff Tucker says that the three fellows, under the leadership of Hansen, who is about 22 years of age, the other lads being about 18 years of age each, stole a band of 27 head of horses on September 15th, and drove them across the state line to Arlington, where they were shipped, and afterwards sold. The lads were finally located, Hansen being caught in Portland. Hansen fought the case, and secured his release on habeas corpus proceedings, but Sheriff Tucker did not give up, and came at once to this city, and is now armed with a warrant of arrest for Hansen, whom he intends to return to Washington for trial on the charge. Sheriff Tucker said Hansen, who is a former resident of this city, and whose folks are now living in Prosser, Wash., is the leader of the gang, and that it is believed that he received the most of the spoils, for the reason that he is making a hard fight against being returned to Washington for trial. The other lads are making no fight against the case at all.
