HAD A LIVELY MEETING

City Fathers Hear Other Peoples' Troubles—

Street Car Company Asked To Make Repairs

The city fathers had a lively meeting Tuesday night.

In addition to the transaction of the usual grist of routine business, the members of the council listened to the troubles of some of the residents of the city who are anxious to have a bridge constructed on North Cottage street, and then Alderman Stolz had some kicks to make himself. After a considerable amount of kicking, in which the Salem Street Railway served as the planks in the greater part of the time, the council meeting was adjourned, after the fact had been disclosed that the body of aldermen were in a powerless position to correct some of the conditions that were complained of.

New Bridge Wanted.
R. P. Boise, Jr., and other residents of the northern part of the city, addressed the council, and asked that immediate provision be made for the building of a new bridge across North Mill creek on Cottage street, and that the structure across Winter street, on the same stream be repaired. After an extended discussion as to the best plan for making the requisite improvements, the matter of examining into the proposition for the protection of the Winter street property and the building of a new bridge on Cottage street was referred to the committee on streets and public property, on motion of Stolz.

Armory Released.
City Recorder Judah reported that he had closed an agreement with Company F, Fourth Regiment, O. N. G., releasing for the ensuing year the armory at the city hall on the same terms as last year. The action of the recorder was ratified.

To Appoint Committee.
A request was received from the officers of the Greater Salem Commercial club asking for the appointment of a special committee from the council, to consist of five members, the same to act in conjunction with the committee of the club, in determining on the needed amendments to the Salem city charter. The reports of the joint committee are to be submitted to the two bodies that are interested for the ratification of those bodies, before being presented to the legislature. Upon motion the mayor was directed to appoint the committee. Mayor Bishop announced that he would take the matter of naming the committee under advisement for a few days.

Stolz Had a Kick.
Alderman Stolz asked why the members of the committee on fire and water did not have referred to them for their consideration the bills of all the supplies that were purchased for that department. He thought that arrangement would be the better. Burrows, supplemented by Judah, replied and plainly told the alderman from the third ward that all of the bills for supplies were contracted for by the chief of the department, under a previous order of the council, which gave him the right of making all of the purchases, and that before any of the bills were paid they were carefully scrutinized by a committee on accounts and current expenses. After some further discussion of the subject, the matter was dropped.

Show Licenses Amended.
On the question of licenses to be charged shows, etc., the committee on ordinances and licenses, after a joint conference, reported that the general ordinance of the city be amended in the following particulars:

"That the circus clause therein be amended so as to include imposing a license fee of \$100 per day upon all tent shows of the scope and character of Buffalo Bill's Wild West show."

"That the dog and pony show license be raised from \$15 per day to \$25."

"That the license for palmists be changed to \$2 per day; \$10 per week, and \$15 per month."

"That the license for theatres be and remain as at present provided."

Didn't Have Permit.
The eagle eye of Stolz had detected

that during the past few days a new shingle roof had been placed on the old "shacks" belonging to the Hirsch estate, and located at the corner of Commercial and Ferry streets. He stated that this building has been condemned by the city, and he wished to know if the shingling had been done with or without a permit having been obtained from the proper officers of the city. He was informed that the roof had been shingled without the knowledge or consent of the city officers.

After Stolz had thrown a few bouquets on account of "public spirit and enterprise," several bills against the council were read and adjournment followed.

Salem's New Military Band

About 20 members of the new military band were present at the regular meeting and rehearsal Tuesday night. Their constitution and by-laws were adopted, and the following officers were elected: President, Ivan Martin; secretary, Paul Stog; treasurer, William Churchill; manager, Wm. Sellwood. Already several new players have applied for membership, and, under the instruction of Walter H. Downman, there is no question of the band's success.

Salem Hop Buyers Expect Some Activity to Attend Purchase for October Shipment.

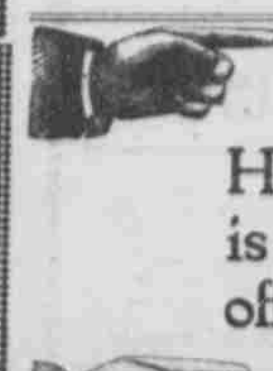
