Suggestions as to Raising Funds for the Purpose

It has been wisely decided by the Greater Salem Commercial Club to turn down all advertising schemes for the present, except the "Adam and Eve" pamphlet, 100,000 copies of which are to be distributed free by the Harriman syndicate, and the daily press of Salem.

This matter is placed in the hands of people coming West, and reaches exactly the class that should be reached. After they land here the city and country and the people and resources thereof must do the rest. The city should engage in all kinds of improvements that will beautify the streets and parks and private property, and thus make this the most attractive place to live.

The club, with commendable enterprise, is soliciting subscriptions for the purpose of advertising Salem through the bureau of immigration under the Harriman railway lines. The committee which represents the club asks for donations to cover the expense of printing and getting up 80,000 copies of descriptive Salem. A business man suggests that the committee do not overlook the larger capitalists, of whom Salem has a number, and ask them to contribute, as well as to expect the business man to foot all the expense. The business man of Salem would not reap all the benefit. There seems to be a tendency to call upon the business man for everything. The property of the retired moneyed men is enhanced in value for every cent contributed by their less wealthy neighbor. Why ask the poor man in business to help the rich man by these public enterprises, when the rich man, as a rule, is already helped by the business man. Let the committee call for some reciprocity. For some united effort in this matter. In the past the business man has paid most of the bills, and the rich and retired capitalist has reaped the benefit in improved values to his property.

Another merchant suggests that the surplus Fourth of July money be applied to the raising of the 80,000 circulars for advertising Salem, and would do very nicely towards meeting the expense of advertising. It has also been suggested that we start a botanical garden in the Marion square with it, but it would look better appropriated for the Greater Club of Salem. These men who donated this surplus of money could call for a pro rata and have credit on the advertising list. Here is several hundred dollars lying idle, and here is a very good place to put it. Will somebody please put it.
