MARKLEY MURDER TRIAL

Began in the Circuit Court This Afternoon.

District Attorney Hart Files Indictments

The regular October term of the criminal department of the Marion county circuit court was convened today. District Attorney J. N. Hart this morning returned three indictments, as follows: Frank Gordon and Joseph Murphy, larceny in a store; George Drake, adultery. Gordon and Murphy were arraigned. Both waived further time and pleaded guilty to the charge. Thursday at 9 a. m. was the time set for pronouncing sentence. Gordon is the fellow who entered the store of Jos. Meyers & Sons and carried off several pairs of trousers. Murphy visited J. N. Shantz's second-hand store and helped himself. Drake was given until tomorrow in which to plead.

The court appointed as bailiffs for this term of the court A. E. Parker and E. E. Cooper.

Court was convened at 1 o'clock with all jurors present. Judge Burnett read to the jurors sections of the code pertaining to contempt.

O. G. Schellberg was excused as juror because he is an exempt fireman. W. L. Jones, constable of Jefferson precinct, was also excused from jury service, as he is an officer.

In case of Palmer vs. Brand, a motion to dissolve the attachment was overruled, and the motion to quash the summons and the service of the same was sustained.

Jacob Leidenberger was sworn in as third bailiff, who will be in charge of the jury in the Markley case until a verdict is reached.

Markley Case Called.

The Markley case was called at 1:30 o'clock. District Attorney J. N. Hart and Deputy John H. McNary and C. M. Inman appeared for the state and Markley is represented by John M. Gearin, of Portland, and Carson & Adams, of this city.

The first twelve men called to the jury box were R. B. Duncan, O. I. Morris, A. Dune, W. P. Miles, T. C. Davidson, John C. Savage, L. H. Poulade, Alonzo Moffitt, D. Bowerman, F. A. Wiggins, D. Steiner, James H. Patten and W. H. Downing. There is not a very large attendance at the trial.

Of the first body of jurymen called, Duncan was peremptorily challenged by defense, as was also Miles, O. I. Morris, A. Dune and T. C. Davidson were excused. John C. Savage, a cousin of J. H. McNary, was excused because he did not believe in inflicting capital punishment, when even a part of the evidence was of a circumstantial nature. L. Poulade, a farmer of Gervais precinct, was the first juror that was accepted by both sides. The examination of the other jurors is in progress as this report closes.

History of the Case.

At an early hour Wednesday morning, June 25th, John D. Pain, a retired merchant of Champe, was shot and killed at the rear of the store of John F. Markley, his former partner. Markley was arrested, charged with the crime. He protested his innocence, but, upon the showing made at the coroner's inquest, all of the evidence being of a circumstantial character, the jury charged Markley with the crime. The accused man was given a preliminary examination before Former Justice O'Donald, who held the suspect to the circuit court without bonds.

Markley was arraigned in the circuit court, and made application for a continuance of his case until the October
