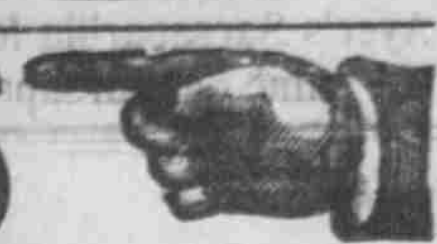

COSTLY FURS.

Mole-skin Coats are the Latest Extravagance.

Furs will be more costly than ever during the coming season, for the coarse furs which have been so much worn during the last few years will be reserved for what may be termed rough wear, as motor coats and gowns, and the finest pelts only—fox, mink, chinchilla, golden beaver and mole-skin—are being used for the coats already to be seen at the furriers.

Such coats of Alaska seal have huge cape collars of Russian sable fashioned

in graceful curves, and they are lined with rich broadens. Other smart coats of seal are in the Russian blouse shape, with perfectly cut basques, long or short, and big collars of sable, mink or chinchilla.

In some cases the coats are further ornamented with belts of mink or kid, daintily embroidered, some with turquoise and silver and others with oriental silk and gold thread embroidery.

Perhaps the most costly garments are those of mole-skin, for several hundreds of these tiny skins go to the making of one Russian blouse, and the woman who owns a coat of this has the satisfaction of knowing she does not possess a commonplace garment.

The dress illustrated is of pale green crepe de chine trimmed with white chiffon and pale yellow lace.

THE NEW COATS.

Some Are Made Without Collars—Velvet Trimmings.

One of the most sensible innovations in women's attire will be the making of coats this autumn without a collar band, and in fact high collars will be dispensed with. This allows dainty jabots and ties to be worn, and the fur or feathery tie sits comfortably over the collarless coat.

The new coat sleeves are very desirable, as they are large and voluminous

and caught in at the wrists, leaving wide frills to fall over the hands. These are wearable over the most elaborate dress sleeves.

Velvet will again be fashionable for trimmings during the autumn, and very elegant effects are obtained by using beaver and moiré velvet on mink, pale fawn and antelope skins, a touch of brighter color appearing in the front. Handsome checked and plaid velvets are also used in Paris for boleros and vests. On a plain cloth gown a vest and undersleeves of lace plaid give quite a distinguished air.

A smart tailor made coat suitable for a young girl is here shown. The material is rough wool marked with a hair stripe and deep blue in tone. The collar is faced with deep blue velvet, and the trimming there is the worsted ruffle set in cape fashion from under a stumping.

How to Make Coconut Macaroons. Grate a coconut fine and moisten it with milk. Add the beaten white of an egg and a cupful of powdered sugar. Whip light and drop on buttered paper in a baking pan. Bake immediately in a quick oven. Let the macaroons get cold before slipping a knife under each and removing from the paper.

WHAT IS WORN.

Turkish and Bell Sleeves—The Triple Coat Cape.

The bolero made quite short and somewhat loose, but not quite of the sack order, is still worn, and the sleeves at present in vogue are extremely elegant. Some of these of Turkish shape are gathered into a

shaped cuff. Others are loosely fitted to the elbow and then spread out in bell shape and have a broad upturned cuff of velvet and long tight under-sleeves of silk lace or velvet. A bell sleeve with three or four gold ruffles suggests a triple bell shape, and many boleros and Turkish sleeves are trimmed in simulated bell fashion, which permits a good deal of fancy trimming in the way of velvet, braid and stitching.

The triple cape is much used on coats, particularly those of the Monte

Carlo variety. These last will be worn all through the winter and will be made of cloth, heavy moiré, bengaline silks and velvet.

The illustration shows a smart rain coat. It is made of waterproof covert. The sleeves have wide lower edges trimmed with strapings. The fullness is let in at the back after the latest fashion.

With this is worn a hat of stitched cloth trimmed with a scarf of dotted gauze.

These will be made quite simply, and the greater part of them follow the style of the summer and fasten down the back with tiny silk buttons.

Red is a very popular shade. A very bright geranium tint is considered the smartest, but this should be worn with discretion.

A dainty afternoon toilet is of rose broadcloth trimmed with ivory guipure lace and touches of deep red taffeta. As seen in the illustration, it is rather plain, with a wide collar, full sleeves and an overdress effect in the trimming of the skirt.

GRAY IS FASHIONABLE.

Tints Ranging From Dark to Light Combined With Bright Colors.

There are two smart grays. One is that steely slate color which, relieved by bright red and ivory lace, makes an ideal hat. The other is a lighter shade and is worn with orange, heliotrope or emerald pink. It tones well with the ever-lace. Small medallions or panels of velvet are mixed with beaded motifs and have an uncommon effect on self-colored cloth.

The herringbone and stitching which have been so popular this summer are still in favor, but are now placed over narrow velvet or satin ribbons. This is very effective on a cloth

gown, using silk thread of the same shade as the cloth, velvet of a contrasting tint and pieces of velvet of the same color for cuffs and hat collar.

Gray metallic velvet in all the shades from gun metal to pearl will be all the style this winter, and entire gray costumes, even to the furs and gloves, will be worn.

The traveling coat illustrated is from a leading French house. The material is gray cloth relieved with touches of deep crimson velvet. The garment is collarless, but has a stitched cape terminating in front with the two oddly shaped diamond revers illustrated. The full sleeves are gathered into a tightly fitted stitched cuff. The hat which goes with this is of gray velvet bound with deep red velvet and trimmed with a white bird of paradise tail.
