Washington, Oct. 17.--Governor Taft, in a recent speech at Manila, copies of which have just been received by the war department, has given the Filipinos to understand that when the proper time comes they shall have the privilege of saying whether or not they wish to be independent of the United States, and says that it may require one or two generations before they are fitted for self-government.
