SECURING GENERAL POPULAR APPROVAL

Special Session Has a Great Accession of Newspaper Support

THE REFERENDUM AMENDMENT WOULD NOT BE SELF

Operative Without Legislation—Senator Fulton Does Not Want to Get the Oregon Senatorship by Any Log-Rolling Scheme

The leading daily newspapers of the state are taking up the Special Session idea, and showing the great advantage it would be to the state and the people.

Two weeks ago the Governor, the state officials, the legislature, the newspapers, Portland, the politicians, Tom, Dick, Harry, the Devil and all his piper's seemed to be against it.

Another leading daily Republican paper at Astoria now swings into line for the special session in the following well-worded editorial:

SPECIAL SESSION.

(Astoria Daily News, Oct. 16, 1902.)
Governor Goer has a SUDDEN ACCESSION OF POPULAR APPROVAL for his scheme to call a special session of the legislature. It grows out of the fact that the Lewis and Clark appropriation will stand a better chance to pass at a special session, where it would be up against the "log-rolling" game. The Oregonian has ventured on that line, and may soon come squarely out for a special session.

Others wish it in order TO GIVE

THE "FLAT SALARIES" BILL A FAIR SHOW; so politicians cannot dodge it. Others, still, want it because they wish to see a law enacted at once for enforcing the new initiative and referendum provision of the constitution.

At first glance it would seem that this measure is self-operative. IN FACT, THOUGH, IT IS NOT. It does not fix the exact per cent of voters necessary to start a law or a veto of laws. It says "not less than" a certain per cent. It does not name any officer whose duty it shall be to receive, file and promulgate the petition for a popular vote.

If the secretary of state, for instance should be hostile to a vote, he might refuse to act and no mandamus would lie. SINCE IT IS NOT MADE HIS DUTY.

This situation is likely to secure a call for a special session with general popular approval.

So far as Senator Fulton is concerned, the Daily News believes he is warmly in favor of a liberal appropriation for the Lewis and Clark expedition and, furthermore, DOES NOT NEED ANY LOG ROLLING TO SECURE HIS ELECTION TO THE UNITED STATES SENATE. His pathway to that high place is without any serious obstruction.

INSPECTED OUR ROADS

Party of Gentlemen Interested in Good Roads Visit the Highways in This Vicinity.

A party of gentlemen, interested in the good roads movement, including Senator Martin Dodge and R. W. Richardson, of the Bureau of Public Roads Inquiries, arrived in Salem on the morning train from Portland today, and spent the day inspecting the roads in the vicinity of this city. They were met at the station by County Judge Scott, president of the state good roads association, and John H. Albert, a prominent member of the Greater Salem Commercial Club. Mayor Bishop, who is also interested in the good roads organization, was also a member of the reception committee, and escorted one of the three loads.

The visitors were first lined, and carriages being procured, the party was driven to the Liberty road, south of this city. This road is the first piece of practical road building that has been made in this county, and, although not finished, County Judge Scott is deserving of the credit in a large measure, for he has made the subject of road building, from a scientific standpoint, a study, and he is determined to improve in a substantial manner the standard of the Oregon road, as it exists in the vicinity of the Capital City.

The Liberty road was thoroughly inspected, and the visitors became acquainted with the conditions that exist here for road building, and the progress that has been made in that direction. When the party left the city, it was the purpose of the gentlemen who were serving as an escort to show the visitors, in addition to the Liberty road, the Wallace road, and the excellent thoroughfare that was built a few years ago on the east extension of State street by convict labor. The party is obliged to return to Portland this afternoon, and necessarily had to abbreviate the scope of its observations in this locality.

A visit from so distinguished a party of visitors is complimentary to the people of the Capital City, and their efforts to improve the roads. It is believed that an era of general and substantial road building on a permanent and approved basis has arrived for this section of the Willamette valley. The community shares with County Judge Scott the honor of his being the president of the first good roads organization that was ever formed in this state, and through this agency expects a concerted action in all localities and lasting benefits. The election of Judge Scott to the presidency of the organization could not be improved upon. He will prove a capable and energetic executive head, and will have the hearty support and endorsement of the people in any step that has for its purpose the bettering of the roads.

ACQUIRED DELAGOA BAY

England Takes Possession of Portugese South Africa

Brussels, Oct. 18.—Le Petit Bleu announces today that the sale of Portuguese South Africa to England has been accomplished. To avoid wounding the Portuguese susceptibilities the bill of sale was drawn in the form of a 99 years lease. The sale will necessitate the making of new treaties covering German possessions as well. The Kaiser and the King of Portugal will meet in England to discuss the matter.

ENGINEER MISTOOK ORDERS

Resulting In a Fatal Collision Between Trains

Lake Crystal, Minn., Oct. 18.—A passenger and freight on the Omaha road collided early this morning, seriously injuring five people, and slightly injuring 11. The most seriously injured are Mrs. E. C. Elger, of Mankato, Internally, and Ira Van Polton, of Sac City, Iowa, skull fractured. Mistaken orders were the cause of the fatality.

FRENCH MINERS CRISIS

General Strike Throughout France Is Threatened

Paris, Oct. 18.—The General Workers' Federation threatens to call a general strike throughout France, to aid the striking miners. Settlement of the American strike was received with great enthusiasm, strongly encouraging the French strikers, who believe that on following the same lines they can win.

Fatality On A Bridge

Vienna, Oct. 18.—The bridge over the Golden Horn, connecting Stamboul with Galata collapsed today. It is estimated that 100 people were drowned, but that number may be exceeded. The bridge was thronged with spectators at the boat docking when it gave way.

WANT UNIFORM WAGE SCALE

Chicago's Carrying and Shipping Force Ask \$2 Day

Chicago, Oct. 18.—Six hundred freight handlers, shippers, packers and truckers, employed in the largest wholesale grocery houses, struck this morning. They will be joined by 2500 more if the general demand for a uniform wage scale of \$2.50 per day is refused.

Oregon's Departure Delayed.

San Francisco, Oct. 18.—The battleship Oregon, which was expected to sail October 15th, for the Asiatic coast, will not get away before October 25th, owing to the delay of arrival of ordnance. The ship will first sail for Honolulu, and make a cruise of the neighboring islands, from whence she leaves for Yokohama, where she will remain for some time. Her final destination is Manila. Capt. P. T. Brunell, U. S. A., has recently taken charge of the vessel as her commanding officer.

Earl Roberts' desire is that Generals French and Kelly-Kenny shall accompany him.

The Americans have been particularly anxious that Earl Roberts shall visit America, in order that they may have an opportunity of repaying the many courtesies he has shown them during their stay in England.

Female Thief Adjudged Insane.

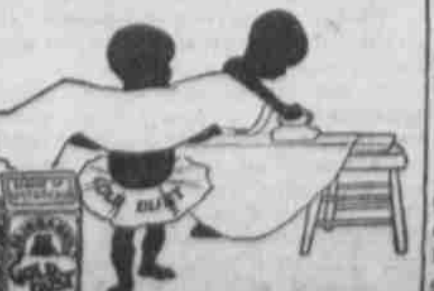

PEACEFUL PICKETING LAWFUL

Is the Decision of Supreme Justice Andrews

Syracuse, Oct. 18.—Supreme Court Justice Andrews today decided the question of the legality of union men picketing in front of a boycotted store. He says merchants have the right to file injunctions and restraining any one from trespassing, obstructing or threatening upon their premises or sidewalks. He holds, however, that peaceful picketing is lawful.

President Must Exercise Prudence.

Washington, Oct. 18.—The announcement was made today from the White House that President Roosevelt was compelled to cancel his visit to the inauguration of President Wilson, of Princeton university, as the physicians say it would be unwise for him to attempt to travel for at least two weeks.

WAR ON BIRDDEALERS

New York Society Enters Upon an Extensive Crusade.

New York, Oct. 18.—What promises to be a lively campaign on the part of Audubon Society, of New York State against the illegal traffic in birds and their plumage has been declared open at the annual meeting of the society in this city. At the close of an illustrated address on "The Present Demands for Birds for Military Purposes and What the Audubon People Propose to Do About It," William Dutcher, of the executive board, read a statement addressed to dealers in birds and their plumage, in which, after rehearsing the state and federal laws relating to the protection of non-game birds, the society warned dealers of its intention to prosecute all violators of the law.

Three thousand copies of this statement, which is signed by Morris K. Jessup, president; Frank M. Chapman, chairman of the executive committee, and William Dutcher, chairman of the committee on laws, have been printed, and will be sent to dealers, Audubon societies and persons and organizations interested in ornithology.

I. T. U. President in Portland.

Portland, Oct. 18.—James M. Lynch, president of the International Typographical Union, arrived in Portland yesterday from San Francisco, and will remain in the hands of Multnomah Union, No. 55, till Sunday evening, when he will go to Seattle. Mr. Lynch is on his official trip, and reports that everything on the Pacific coast is progressing satisfactorily to the unions, except the matter of the disagreement with the Los Angeles Times. The owners of that paper will not recognize organized labor, and the Typo people are making things hot for them.

CASTRO'S ARMY VICTORIOUS

Three Thousand Rebels Were Slain in a 7-Days Battle

New York, Oct. 18.—The consul-general of Venezuela today received the following, sent from Caracas: "General Castro has gained a sweeping victory, after seven days' of bloody battle. There were 3000 casualties in the rebel camp."

FEAR OF CRISIS REMOVED

Financiers Praise Secretary Shaw's Action

Washington, Oct. 18.—The action of Secretary Shaw in offering to buy bonds for the sinking fund to relieve the present stringency in the money market is favorably commented on by financiers here. It is pointed out that the \$15,000,000 of 4s which the secretary experts to obtain under the offer will result in putting into circulation in principal and interest \$20,000,000, which at the late date in crop moving will, beyond all reasonable doubt, carry the country safely over the crisis, which is annually expected at this period.

Although the secretary's offer was not made public until noon Friday, the assistant treasurer at 4 o'clock reported to the department that \$5,203,400 had already been deposited in the treasury there. Of this amount \$5,000,000 was in 4s, the acceptance of which, the secretary has had under consideration for several days. It is expected that by tonight at least \$7,000,000 additional will have been offered and accepted.

The Southern Pacific Company has purchased ten new locomotives to be used for passenger trains only. These engines are the same compared to a local passenger engine as an ocean greyhound compared to a tramp steamer, are equipped with air-brakes and can be brought to a stop in a shorter distance than any of the local engines, although running at a higher rate of speed.

Edinburgh, Oct. 18.—St. Andrew's university today announced that it would confer the degree of doctor of laws on Ministers Choate and White, and Andrew Carnegie and Alexander Graham Bell.
