COMPARATIVE COST OF LIVING.

Mr. Hovorst, superintendent of the Northwestern Minnesota Experiment Station, has given some very valuable facts regarding the relative cost of family living in 1899, 1900 and 1901. His figures have rare economic value, for it is safe to say that the comparative cost of the articles included in his statistics does not differ essentially from that in all other parts of the country, on an average. But the entire cost of living, the country over, would doubtless show a wider variation than do the figures submitted, for they do not include vegetables, but only those things that had to be bought, as groceries, flour, meat, etc., and it will be remembered that vegetables were very much higher in 1899 and 1901 than in 1900, which would make the cost of living relatively higher to those who have to buy vegetables.

In 1899 there were 252 weeks boarded. The cost for groceries of all kinds, flour, meat, help, cooking, laundry, etc., was \$47.89, making the average cost per week \$1.55. In 1900 there were 423 weeks boarded, at a cost of \$47.32, or \$2.00 a week, and in 1901 507 weeks were boarded, at a cost of \$461.25, or \$1.89 per week. The average cost of the articles, included in these figures for the last two weeks was 25 per cent higher than the first year, and if to this is added the increased cost of other articles consumed by a family, and of rent, it must be confessed that the cost of living to the average wage earner has been increased much more than have his wages, for it is not claimed that wages, on the average, have been increased more than 10 per cent. In fact, it is boasted that wages have been advanced to that extent.

One would first come close to us and reconnoiter, and then, on his order, the others would advance with a menacing air, and the battle began, a battle in which we sometimes had trouble to demonstrate effectively our superior strength.—Geographical Magazine.

The Black Maria.

The following is given as the origin of the term "Black Maria." When New England was filled with emigrants from the mother country, a negro

named Maria Lee kept a dinner cooking house in Boston. She was a woman of great strength and helped the authorities to keep the peace. Frequently the police looked her aid, and the saying, "Send for Black Maria," came to mean, "Take her to jail." British soldiers were often taken to the kitchen by this woman, and the stories they spread of her achievements led to the name of Black Maria being given to the English prison van.

MAGIC OF MODERN SCIENCE

Nature's Processes Reproduced in a Laboratory by the Kinetoscope.

One of the most celebrated tricks of the modern conjurer, in which he seems to his audience to cause a tree to grow to full maturity in a few minutes from the seed, which he plants in the ground, is curiously paralleled in a new to which the Kinetoscope has recently been put at the Smithsonian Institution. In Washington, for studying the growth of plants, Kinetoscopic pictures were taken systematically and almost continuously as the plant selected for a subject grew, the work requiring several months before the film was complete and involving the use of automatic flashlights and other ingenious contrivances in order that the changes of each hour might be recorded from first to last. When it was finished, however, the strip of negatives could be run through the Kinetoscope as fast as the operator wished, and the plant was seen in the space of a moment actually growing from seed to maturity, each stage of its progress being in the same proportion to the others as it was in the original development of the living subject.

An interesting similarity between plant and human growth is noted from these pictures. The little plant grew rapidly at first, as the child does; then there was a period of rest, a renewed season of activity extended, and when the rapidity of the development lessened gradually until final physical maturity was reached.

The human eye and human patience—even the patience of the enthusiastic and vigilant scientist—could hardly follow the gradual processes of nature in botany, but the mechanism of the Kinetoscope suffers not even the slightest change to go unrecorded, and when its work has been done every instant which it covers can be brought before the vision with absolute exactness and clearness.

The End of the Novel.

Science and the stern reality of life are bound to destroy the novel. It is out of harmony with the scientific and materialistic spirit of the age, says the St. Petersburg Novoye Vremya. The more industrial and strenuous a nation is the fewer novelists has she. Only the backward, the passive, the visionary peoples produce great novelists. The future, the national tale, the folk-song have died. Why not the novel? It, too, is subject to the law of evolution. It has been its acme, its highest point, and is on the decline.

WORLD'S UNITED STATES.

Ireland Says Great Britain Must Be Nerved in American Republic.

That the British empire must become a part of the United States or fail to pieces is the somewhat startling conclusion drawn by W. T. Stead from the "Americanization of the world," which he is going on at amazing speed, says the Washington Star. In outlining his proposition for this most gigantic of "mergers" the British journalist says: "There lies before the people of Great Britain a choice of two alternatives. If they decide to merge the existence of the British empire in the United States of the English speaking world, they may continue for all time to be an integral part of the greatest of all world powers, supreme on sea and on land, permanently delivered from all fear of hostile attack and capable of welding irresistible influence in all parts of this planet. This is one alternative. The other is the acceptance of our supersession by the United States as the center of gravity in the English speaking world, the loss one by one of our great colonies and our ultimate reduction to the status of an English speaking Belgium."

Mr. Stead admits that the proposition is not flattering to British pride and that politicians will fear to discuss it openly, but he insists that many of the strongest imperialists are heart and soul in favor of seeing the British empire and the American republic merge in the English speaking United States of the world and declares that "the only way of saving the empire and the ultimate goal of the statesmen both of the United States and of the United Kingdom."

Great Britain is not likely to take Mr. Stead seriously just now, but wilder dreams than his have been known to become realities. That a republic so gigantic and widely expanded could be held together so tightly is not the conclusion arrived at through study of the history of nations.

Barbers of Spain. The barber's business in Spain is peculiar in that he is called upon to ply his shears on donkeys as well as men, for it is an important item in the care of Spanish donkeys that they should be shaven as to the back in order to make a smoother resting place for man or panner. So, while the master held his animal, one of the barbers plied some enormous clippers and another shaved the ground with mouse colored hair, leaving the beast's belly far covered below a fixed line and for a small additional price executing a raised pattern of star points around the neck.

The tonsorial profession is an indispensable one in a country where shaving the whole face is generally practiced, since all the barber orders not to mention toreros and ecclesiastics. But the discomfort to which the barber's customers submit is astonishing. Instead of being pampered, soothed, labored at with confidential respectfulness and lulled into luxurious harmony with himself, as happens in America, a man who courts the razor in Spain has to sit upright in a stiff chair and meekly hold under his chin a brass basin full of soda and bring his throat by means of a curved sick at one side.

MILITARY CAMPS.

Accommodations for the Soldiers Boys at the Pan-American Exposition.

Many military organizations intend to visit the Pan-American Exposition during the summer. Arrangements have been made to provide first class accommodations for them.

The Exposition will maintain a permanent camp within the grounds for the accommodation of about 200 men at one time.

This camp will be supplied with tents, floors, cots, blankets, basins, pint cups, light, water and sinks, for the use of which no charge will be made. It will be necessary for visiting organizations to furnish their own blankets and subsistence.

There will be no accommodation for cooking in this camp, but the visitors will not doubt be able to make satisfactory arrangements with restaurants on the grounds at reasonable rates.

It is expected that organizations taking advantage of these camp privileges will, at such time as may be agreed upon beforehand, give military exhibitions without charge in the Stadium.

Bands in uniform will be admitted to the grounds free. Organizations using this camp will pay one general admission per man when they enter the grounds and must be governed by the rules and regulations laid down by the Exposition Company.

On account of the large number of organizations now applying for camp facilities at the Exposition the use of this camp will be limited to a period not exceeding six days for any one organization.

Large bodies of troops visiting the Exposition must be quartered outside the grounds, where a large camp for this purpose has been established.

Major Charles J. Wolf is in charge of the Military Bureau, and he is kept very busy these days furnishing information to organizations intending to visit the Exposition.
