FIRST NATIONAL ARBITRATION BOARD.

President Roosevelt has, without waiting for congress to pass a law, created the first national arbitration board to settle the difference between the coal miners and owners of the anthracite (or hard coal) mines.

As the first body of the kind, and with no law or compulsory feature about it, without any authority to enforce its findings, but public sentiment as to what is righteous, its findings will be of great importance.

The President deserves great credit for bringing the contending parties together in the first place, while the operators did not treat him with any courtesy whatever, he overlooked that and ceased not in his labors to get an adjustment.

The President has assumed the Christian attitude of an absolutely impartial peace-maker. He has said to the world that the humblest miner and the greatest coal baron were alike to him in the eyes of the law.

After a conference with Mr. Mitchell, the great labor leader, and some further conferences with representatives of the coal operators, the President has appointed the members of the commission to inquire into, consider and pass upon all questions at issue between the operators and miners in the anthracite coal fields:

Brigadier-General John M. Wilson, (retired), late chief of engineers, United States army, Washington, D. C., as an officer of the engineer corps of either the military or naval service of the United States.

E. W. Parker, Washington, D. C., as an expert mining engineer. Mr. Parker is chief statistician of the coal division of the United States geological survey and editor of the Engineering and Mining Journal of New York.

George Gray, Wilmington, Del., as a Judge of a United States court.

E. E. Clark, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, grand chief of the Order of Railroad Conductors, as a sociologist, the President assuming that for the purpose of such a commission the term sociologist means that a man who has thought and studied deeply on social questions, and has practically applied his knowledge.

Thomas H. Watkins, Scranton, Pa., as a man practically acquainted with the mining and selling of coal.

Bishop John L. Spalding, of Peoria, Ill. The President added Bishop Spalding's name to the commission.

Carroll D. Wright, appointed recorder of the commission.

MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Physicians of Marion County Effect the Formation of a Society.

Members of the medical profession of Marion county met in this city in the Patton block on Saturday evening and effected the organization of "The Marion County Medical Society."

There were in attendance physicians from all parts of the county. Dr. Andrew C. Smith, of Portland, was present, and assisted in the work of organization.

The purposes for which the society is organized are stated as follows: The cultivation of the science of medicine and surgery; the advancement of the character and honor of the medical profession; the elevation of the standard of medical education; the promotion of public health; the furthering of union and harmony among its members. The buying and leasing of real estate and the construction thereon of buildings suitable to the uses of the society, and the society, will be guided by the code of ethics of the American Medical Association.

The following officers were elected: President, Dr. C. S. White, of Gervais; Vice-president, Dr. C. H. Robertson, of Salem; Secretary, Dr. W. C. Smith, of Salem; Treasurer, Dr. Mary M. Caples, of Salem; Counselors, Dr. W. C. Hawk, Jefferson; Dr. W. T. Williamson and Dr. J. A. Richardson, both of Salem.

After the election of officers, the physicians repaired to a Commercial-street restaurant, where a banquet was served.

They Met The "Farmers"

The Willamette University football team met with disastrous defeat at the hands of the eleven from the State Agricultural College, at Corvallis, Saturday afternoon. The final score was 67 to 0 in favor of the Corvallis team. The newly-formed and inexperienced Salem university team was no match for the heavier and more experienced "farmer" lads. The next game in which the Salem team will participate will be played in this city next Saturday afternoon, when the local eleven will meet the Albany College. The fact

that the Albany College boys on Saturday played a tie game with no score with the State University team, at Eugene, indicates that a good contest may be expected here next Saturday.

The Cow Balked

J. W. Harritt and Byron Harritt on Sunday had an experience with a bovine of mulish disposition, that was not fully appreciated. The gentlemen drove out to Liberty, where the cow was received. The return trip was made without event until South Salem was reached, when the cow suddenly became unruly and mulish, and refused to be led further. The sportsmen of this city last week enjoyed a visit from Frank Howe, a former Salem boy, who is a well-known sportsman. Mr. Howe is now traveling representative for the Union Metallic Cartridge Company and on Friday afternoon took a number of the local shots and gave them an exhibition shoot. It is likely that the organization to be formed will be named after the companies that are represented by Mr. Howe.
