DRAKE GETS ONE YEAR

His Attorneys Give Notice That His Case Will Be Appealed to the Supreme Court.

George Drake, colored, convicted of the crime of adultery, was this morning sentenced in the circuit court to serve one year in the penitentiary, and to pay the costs and disbursements of the suit.

When the time for passing sentence arrived, W. H. Holmes, one of the quietest of attorneys that defended Drake, addressed the court in behalf of his client. He said there was a number of circumstances in connection with the case that entitled the defendant to the considerate treatment of the court in pronouncing judgment. Admitting that the statements of the witnesses were all true, and the jury, by its verdict, had accepted them as true, the woman in the case was equally guilty with the defendant. The court, having a wide discretion in such cases, counsel contended that every favorable consideration should be given the defense, since the party alleged to have been injured by the commission of the alleged crime was without any reputable character prior to the time the alleged felony was committed.

When sentence had been pronounced, counsel for the defendant gave notice that they would file, within a few days, a bill of exceptions, upon which an appeal to the supreme court will be based. The bond for undertaking an appeal was placed at \$1000. Since the sentence was so light, it is not probable that the appeal will be perfected, since the sentence of the convicted man would have about expired before a decision could be had from the appellate court. For the crime of adultery the statutes in this state provide penalties ranging from a fine of \$100 to three years' imprisonment in the state penitentiary. Drake was taken to the prison this afternoon.
