SPECIAL VERSUS REGULAR SESSION.

There is a great deal of needless circumlocution these days over a plain matter of public duty.

All know that regular session of the Oregon Legislature, "as she is carried on," is a "holy terror."

All know that in forty days, the shortest session of any state in the Union, there is barely time to pass the appropriation bills, and even that in a hazy, hazy, hazy manner, savoring of grand larceny.

The first ten days of the session is taken in organizing, and the rest in fighting over who shall be senator.

There are three great matters that need to be disposed of in an orderly way—the Referendum, a flat salary bill and the Lewis and Clark exposition.

These things should not be thoroughly belated in the whirlpool of personal grafts and political dirty linen, called the regular session.

The people have voluntarily petitioned for a special session. The Oregonian said 500 names were signed to petitions. The Statesman says 922. The fact remains that a special session was asked for. No petitions were circulated but through The Journal.

No man need have petitioned for a special session. The paramount justice and necessity of a special session stands upon its own merit.

Just why the figures are given out about the special session petition no one can tell. They are not given out by any one who wants a special session, but by those who want the grafts and disorders to go on.

Those petitioning for a special session are not interested in any aspirant for senator or any graft. They are citizens and taxpayers, and their names are clean. The slur that many of them are from Marion county is gratuitous.

From a political standpoint the Democratic party has everything to gain by the failure of the Republicans to put flat salaries and direct legislation into effect.

No friend and well-wisher of the Republican party can want to see it guilty of neglect or treason to great reforms.

But the party has such a majority in Oregon that its leaders imagine nothing will ever turn the people against them. Instead of conceding a few reforms in a decent, orderly manner, they must drive the people to the last ditch of desperation.

That is the logic of purblind partisanship. That is the genius of Bourbonism. It blindly pursues its scavenging methods until it becomes fatally poisoned from an overdose of apathy.

Let alleged Republican politicians beware how they trifle with the people on matters where there is no party division.

ABOUT CHARTER AMENDMENTS. The Salem committee on charter amendments should have their attention called to some important changes that should be made in that instrument.

The city should have power to take up in a popular loan the \$15,000 of bridge bonds, drawn for 5 per cent and float them at a popular loan of 4 per cent flat.

The charter should be amended so that the street car line owners can be made to put down the proper cement crosswalks.

All that is good of the charter amendments be retained, and only such amendments be enacted as will make it better.

PORTLAND TAXPAYERS' ACT.

The action of the Portland Taxpayers' League, in resolving to petition the governor for a special session, is minimized as much as possible by the Salem and Portland papers that are against a special session.

Frank Davey, the Salem representative of the Portland Telegram, rushes several columns to his paper that the referendum needs no legislation, but is already in effect.

These off-hand opinions settle nothing. Can any of these newspapers or Frank Davey, or Governor Geer himself, give a good, logical reason why it is not just and fair and right to enact laws to put the Referendum in to effect?

Can they explain why this part of the constitution would be self-operative, and all other parts of the constitution require legislation? A statute educates the people, and has directory, mandatory and punitive features. A constitutional amendment, without legislation, is a dead cock in the pit.

Can they give a plain, logical reason why it would not be just and fair and right to enact a flat salary law, to take effect in January, instead of waiting two or four years?

Can they tell why it would not be fair and just and right to make provision for the Lewis and Clark Exposition, instead of letting it go over into the regular session to become trading stock to cost the state a million?

With a state tax levy of over twelve mills, the people have a right to the fullest protection and benefit of the Referendum, not in any theoretical form, but in full force and vigor.

The Portland taxpayers can see these matters in their full importance, and are perfectly right in petitioning for what should be done as a matter of plain duty to the people.

The character of the men who compose that organization needs no certificate of approval from any source. The fact that they array themselves against the thrifty agencies of the state does them credit.

While we give credit for honesty of purpose to those who differ from our views, it must be remembered that only inch by inch are any reforms won from existing conditions. Progress is not won by flatteries or trafficking with stipendiaries of existing abuses.

The slime and morass of politics has sunk our fair state about as far as the people can stand. They are waiting to their necks in a sea of burdens and abuses that can only be lifted by a fight for what is right.

The Taxpayers' League will get abuse from many sources for taking this stand on the side of the people of this state. But it will have the satisfaction of rejoicing if it gains a single point in its demands.

THE MATTER OF EXTENDING CITY BOUNDARIES.

Is important, but should not be entered into hastily, and with a disposition to wrong any man.

Certainly this city has been in no haste to expand, and in all past campaigns of this kind the people have been found on the side of conservatism.

The people are there now, but they will resent efforts to asperse the motives of the boundary expansionists, as though they were public enemies.

For ten years the city, as it now stands, has borne the burdens of government for the suburbs, and has fairly got its head above water.

It has been proved for four years that the city can be run on safe lines, and not a dollar of public money misappropriated.

So the people of the city are at least on ground where they can invite the suburbs to enter, and not be branded as highwaymen or persons who wish to plunder their neighbors.

This matter of extension of city boundaries is a business proposition. There is nothing personal about it, and those who push personalities to the front have surely their own personal interests to hide or serve.

Many worthy people live outside the city, and have surely a right, along with other citizens, to be asked to be taken in. It is no crime.

Many have the use of city water and electric light and telephones, and pay not a penny of city taxes on their residences.

That is the condition of many of the people of Salem. They have great advantages from doing business and living in the city for all practical purposes, and yet pay nothing to maintain the city government.

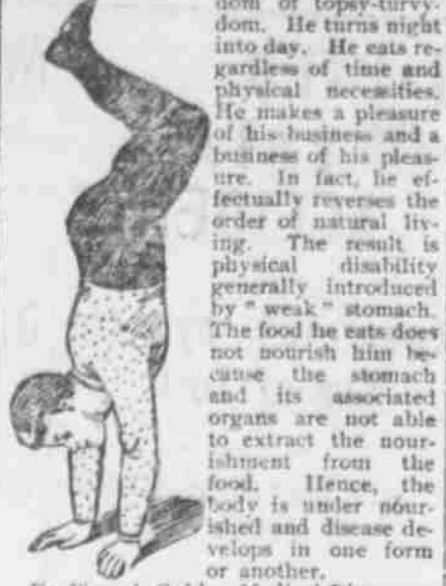
Two committees are at work on this question of what is reasonable in the way of extending city boundaries. Their action and report can be awaited.

Those who are now outside the limits and get all the advantages of a city should be willing to pay some thing for it.

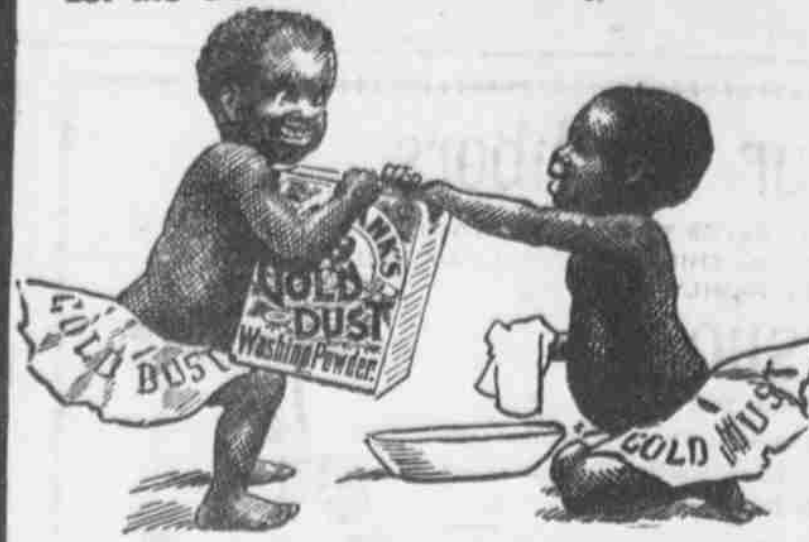

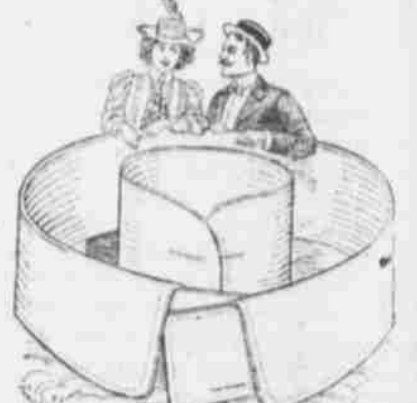
