MR. MILLER'S LECTURE.

The Salem Commercial Club deserves credit for giving the people who cared enough to go to the city hall and hear the lecture on the conditions prevailing in the Orient an opportunity.

Mr. Miller is an interesting talker, and while there was not much that was new in his review, he presented it clearly and fully, and educated some of the younger generation on race characteristics.

His eulogy of the commercial and military prowess of the Russians and Japanese was an eye-opener to those who imagined that those races, and pretty much the whole world, but ourselves, are barbarians.

The fact is the imperialism and expansion of Russia's policy, in general intelligence and successful results and for its humanity, is far ahead of our own effort in that direction.

Russia benevolently assimilates conquered territory and with kindness and enterprise makes her subjects prosperous, without disturbing their religious beliefs or social customs.

It would do all Americans good to hear Mr. Miller's lecture, and we hope it may be given in many communities.

INTEREST OF LABOR IN EXPANSION.

In the discussion about extending the boundaries of Salem the interests of laboring men should not be overlooked. If expansion of city boundaries results in giving them employment, good and good.

For, let it be remembered, it is the laboring man and his family that builds the city, by building homes in the suburbs. We have few millionaires on whom to rely, as do some of the California cities, for suburban improvements.

If sewers and boulevards and sidewalks and crosswalks were built as a result of extending the city boundaries laborers and teamsters and mechanics would get work.

Every laboring man and every labor organization should stand for reasonable extension of the city boundaries as a business proposition. The town that has hundreds of laborers employed all the year around is the town that will expand, and no other.

The well-to-do and professional class are buying and building homes in the city. The poor man must buy and build a home in the suburbs, or go without. Give him expansion with a liberal policy of public improvements.

BELITTLING THE PETITIONS.

For three or four months the people's petitions for a special session to enact flat salaries and put the referendum into effect lay unnoticed in the Governor's office.

Those petitions had been voluntarily signed by citizens of all parties. No one was charged with the duty of circulating them. The Republican and Democratic politicians were 'especially shy of them.

Then it was sneeringly published in the Oregonian, and copied by some of the schools, that there were only 500 signers to them. The petitions were never noticed until it was seen fit to use them to defeat a special session.

Then a Salem paper compiled the little petitions lying in the dust and waste paper of the Governor's office, and showed that while the signers were scattered over half the counties in Oregon, there were only 902.

Now the Salem correspondent of the Portland Telegram belittles the petitions on file with the Governor, showing that 417 names are from Marion county on a heading printed by a Salem newspaper. He concludes that the petitions are "decidedly populist," and nearly all the "Social Democrats" are on the petitions.

He cheerfully adds, lest the petitions have any weight whatever, that "very few business men or prominent citizens anywhere have signed the document."

The Journal would like to publish the names of some of the signers of those petitions, and compare them with some of the opponents of the reforms aimed at—but comparisons are odious.

But enough of this detraction. The newspapers opposed to the special session have now done their worst, and ought to feel thankful that in spite of their to-do the outlook for a special session is brighter than ever.

They ought to feel grateful to The Journal that it has given them something to write about. The special session has been the only live topic in the Oregon daily press for some time.

But why belittle any man's petition? Hasn't a Populist, Socialist or Democrat as good right to ask for a good thing as any other person, even though he don't wear the halo of an Oregon Republican?

In the meantime we urge people to work for a special session to enact the great fundamental reforms demanded by the petitions on file with the governor.

WRONG WAY TO HELP A CHILD. One cannot help but look with greater sympathy upon the little son of Murderer Beiding, since Portland's sheriff has decided to make the former the beneficiary from the proceeds derived from the father's hanging. Sheriff Storey expects to sell the tickets of admission to the execution at \$5.00 each, and will himself donate his fee of \$150.

In this way he intends to raise as much as \$2000 to be turned over to the boy towards his education.

While the sheriff's motive may do credit to his heart, it hardly justifies his head of the common fitness of things. The pity is that the boy is a helpless victim in the matter, the realization of which, in after years, must only add more sorrow and humiliation to his already darkened life. For the sake of outraged childish helplessness, if not for public decency, it is to be hoped that the relatives will not allow this, and find other means, if necessary, toward the proper care of the child.

DRAWING ANIMALS BY ROPES. The local columns of this paper show that a cow that was led or drawn into town, hitched behind a wagon, died the next day.

It is possible that the animal was injured by that way of leading a dumb animal, as it has often happened, and cases are known where the animal's neck was dislocated from being led in that manner.

It seems to many an inhuman manner of leading an animal, attached to a wagon drawn by horses, when a sudden jolt or stubbornness of the animal may break its neck.

There is a law in Massachusetts prohibiting this form of cruelty, and it would be wise to enact such a law here.

There is too much cruelty to animals, under the most favorable circumstances. Wood is being drawn into the city with half-starved horses. The Salem Humane Society should take notice of some of these cases.
