GIVE THE PEOPLE A RETURN.

In contrast with a lot of today newspapers and politicians, Hon. Jeff Myers has the courage of his convictions, and says he is opposed to a \$500,000 appropriation. The Albany Democrat says:

Hon. Jefferson Myers, of Portland, was in Roseburg on legal business. Mr. Myers is a close observer of people and events, and he finds a strong sentiment in many parts of the state, and among all persons of all political beliefs, against the state legislature appropriating so large a sum as \$500,000 for the Lewis and Clark Centennial exposition in Portland in 1905. That is a very large amount of money to be expended for such a purpose by a state of the wealth and population of Oregon.

The Journal believes that a reasonable appropriation should be made, and spread over about four years to pay the taxes. In the meantime there should be changes in the laws so as to put about the same amount of money in the treasury that the Portland fellows propose to take out. The Journal enjoys the abnormal distinction of being about the only paper in Oregon that advocates putting a dollar into the treasury. The people have been corrupted by graft politicians and newspapers that stand in for what little pickings they can get from the political crib. But the time has come for the taxpayers to demand that something be done besides levy, levy, levy more taxes. A single blow struck by one public man in this direction would immortalize the individual, and we desire to thank the Hon. Jeff Myers for his sane opinion. He has had experience with several expositions, and knows what they are worth. Would that more men had the courage to express their honest opinions, instead of covering before the edicts of the Portland bosses, who seem to think all they have to do is ask for what they want, and it will be handed out to them without any thought of returning a dollar to the people.

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THE CHARTER AMENDMENTS.

Two amendments to the city charter should be considered by the Salem committee on revision of the charter. There will be plenty to object to any change from the present condition, and helpful suggestions are also in order.

One order we would suggest is that there be a saloon limit created, keeping the saloons in their present limits, or thereabouts. The Chinese district should also be kept within bounds.

Another suggestion is that a park board be created, with power to control such parks as we now have or may acquire, and to have jurisdiction over the beautifying of the city, and preservation of groves and trees. They might also have some control over the cemeteries.

There are several parts of the city where there are elevations with beautiful trees, as in South Salem and Fairmount park. To leave those places at the caprice of the owner or renter to hack and cut as they please, is wrong. Public interest and public pride require municipal control over what is of vital importance to the appearance of the city.

A park board should also have authority to lay off some parts of the city with open spaces and circular drives, leaving shade trees, and providing for parking the driveways.

On this board should be an engineer who is competent to plat and lay off city and suburban property in some thing besides squares.

Salem can be made a beautiful city, and one essential of this is that the roadways leading to and going past state institutions, especially Asylum avenue, and the road to the pen called State street, be made as they should be—beautifully graded and well-planned boulevards.

Let the intelligent and progressive Salemites stand together for a campaign of progress, and property will become valuable.

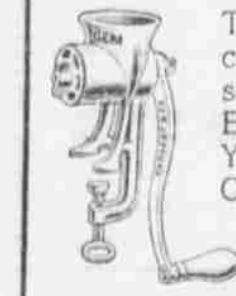

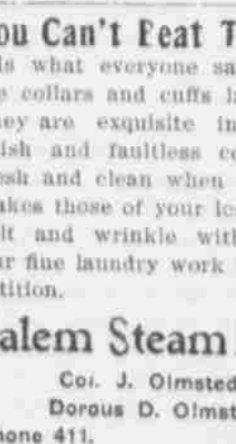

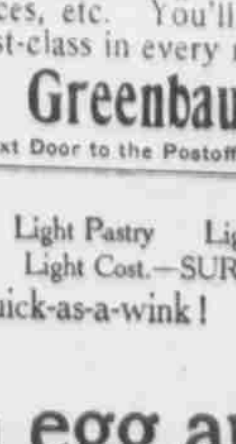
