THE OREGONIAN ON THE CONSTITUTION.

The Oregonian writers are guilty of a piece of legal humor in quoting the U. S. revised statutes against holding a special session of the Oregon legislature. In the same edition it is solemnly stated that the referendum is in effect and no special session is needed, and yet we are told the Portland city charter will not be submitted to a vote of the people of the whole state as it is a local measure. It does not point out the words of the referendum amendment that exempt any local measure from its operations. The Portland charter or any city charter can be referred to a vote of the people of the whole state, though it is not likely that will ever be done.

Of course, no one will doubt the statement of the Oregonian in any ordinary matter in which it is not personally interested, but when it comes to interpreting and construing the constitution, we are some pumpkins up here in the country, too. For instance it gives its interpretation weight by placing it in the mouth of the governor, when it asks:

"Has the legislature all the powers in special session that it has in regular session?"

"Yes, sir, and the governor cannot limit its business to the objects for which he convoked it."

As the governor had taken the trouble to go up to the Oregonian office, of course that paper had a perfect right to put anything in his mouth

that it saw fit to have him say about the constitution. But, be that, it should have put the truth in his mouth. And, gentle reader, both the governor and the Oregonian are wrong in saying that the legislature has all the powers in special session that it has in the regular. For instance, it can't pay itself but twenty days at the special session, while it can pay itself for forty days at the regular session, a mighty important matter with a legislature.

The constitution, art. 4, sec. 10, provides that the sessions of the legislature shall be held biennially at the seat of government. Now that it is the regular biennial session provided by law as much so as a school election.

In article V, section 5, the constitution provides how the votes for governor shall be counted and how that official shall be declared elected. Unfortunately for the Oregonian it says it shall be done at the regular session. Please look it up governor and see if the Oregonian did put wrong words in your mouth. In other words there is no law for counting the votes for governor only at a regular session.

That does away with counting in that wicked man Chamberlain with which Governor Geer has been threatened as well as with other great evils that would fall on his unprotected head if he called a special session.

A special session cannot be held exactly to what the governor calls it together for. The constitution says the governor shall declare by proclamation the purpose for which he convenes the legislative assembly in extraordinary session.

It would be convenient then for the transaction of special business which he would lay before it. Although it might proceed to take a census of all the cattle pastured on public lands, it is not likely that any such unruly cattle would be found in the next legislature.

When asked by the Oregonian when the special session would be called the governor said "that's for the people to decide." Now let us hope that is another misinterpretation of the constitution which the Oregonian has placed in his mouth. Nowhere does the constitution place the power of setting the time for holding special sessions in the power of the people. It rests with the governor solely.

The Oregonian argues in the same paragraph Sunday that a flat salary law would be unconstitutional, yet supported the platform pledging the enactment of such a law.

In the very next paragraph it argues the \$500,000 appropriation for the Lewis and Clark corporation, when article XI, section 5, declares that the state shall not be interested in any stock company, association or corporation. The legislature is specifically prohibited from doing such a thing as that, as any law student knows.

Flat salaries would be a benefit for the whole state, and is unconstitutional, but the fair appropriation would be for Portland and is all right. Flat salaries are not prohibited. The words "and no more" after the present salary clause in the constitution were struck out by the convention that framed it. The legislature is not specifically prohibited from enacting flat salaries. It is specifically prohibited from taking stock or having any interest in a stock company like the Lewis and Clark enterprise.

No one could follow the Oregonian in its mad somersaults against the closely cemented walls of judicial learning known as the Oregon constitution. It is a vulgar impossibility.

THE CITIZENS' NONPARTISAN ADMINISTRATION.

As there is some activity among city politicians it is worth while to review what has been accomplished in a general way during the past four years by the Salem citizen's non-partisan government.

The charter that was then secured in accordance with the business policies demanded by the people when they put the Bishop-Judah regime in power has proven a workable and satisfactory document.

The financial policy of the city, expressed in the idea of living within the city's income and creating no new debt whatever, has been strictly adhered to and that pledge has been kept to the letter.

In those four years the floating debt of the city has been either refunded at a lower rate of interest or paid off and the city put on a cash basis.

Floating debt refunded was done at four per cent interest on the popular loan plan. The debt has been scattered among a great many people and the interest kept at home, besides making the holders interested in continuance of good government.

No fictitious criminal cases have been trumped up for the fees in them and where the state cases were necessary to be made the fees went into the treasury and not into the pockets of the officials.

All officials have been on a flat salary and have made no grafts of fees directly or indirectly, from any source whatever.

No tribute has been levied by the city officials on any form of vice or on any criminal element, as is the common practice in city administrations.

The laws have been enforced without fear or favor in every instance where reputable citizens have made complaint of any violation. The police department has been administered without oppression and without corruption.

The fire department has been maintained with reasonable efficiency. The rule has been enforced of not permitting the fire engines to go beyond the city limits.

As a result of these policies the city government at the end of four years stands much improved over former conditions. A large saving has been effected, debt reduced, revenues increased, expenses diminished.

Of course, it is possible to criticize the Bishop-Judah administration. It is for the people to say whether its good qualities outweigh its shortcomings, if it have any, and decide whether they wish it continued.

Pioneer of 1853.
Died, at Lyons, Lin county, Oregon, October 25, 1902, at 1:30 o'clock a. m. Willis E. Potter, a highly respected and well-known citizen of Oregon, and more especially of Lin county, as it has been his residence for 49 years.

Mr. Potter crossed the plains with his parents when a boy of eight years, in 1853. He was born in Gentry county, Missouri, January 10, 1845, and at the time of his death was 57 years, 9 months and 15 days old. He was married to Miss Susan Miller, February 14, 1870, who survives him. He has one son, J. T. Potter, two brothers and two sisters, who also survive him. They are: Mrs. Julia Robertson, of Stayton; Alex. Potter, of Turner; Jas. M. Potter, of Gem, Idaho, and Mrs. Mattie J. McLean, of Chicago, Ill. He was a member of the L. O. O. F. and A. O. U. W., among whom he had many friends, who accompanied the remains to its final resting place, by the side of his parents, in the Fox Valley cemetery, who have been dead many years.

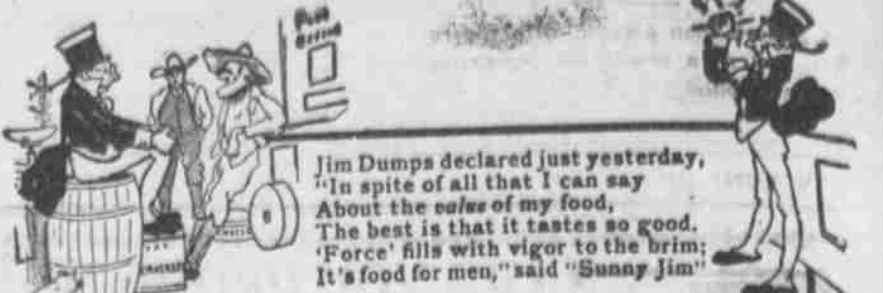
