FOR THE SPECIAL SESSION

Movement Not Dead by Any Means

Only Politicians Are Opposing What

Is So Badly Needed For the 1905 Fair

Portland Journal, October 29th: The movement for a special session of the legislature is not dead. Opposition to the project was subtly planned, and the tactics were of no mean order. When the opposition came out with their chunks of wisdom amid the legal phases, they uttered platitudes that have been known to everyone who has given attention to the subject with common information as to the statutory and constitutional requirements in the premises. The fact that the legislature could vote for a senator at a special session was patent all of the time prior to the publication of that fact. The possibility that "flat salaries" and the initiative and referendum might be effective without action by the legislature prior to the first of the year was also understood.

The situation appears to be that those who urge that flat salaries are effective now, in view of the constitutional provisions, are not really favorable to the inauguration of flat salaries for the state officials. The men who represent the secretary of state and the state printer and other officers, who are now drawing immense sums from the treasury, were among those who opposed the flat salary matter in the last campaign. They did not want flat salaries then; they do not want them now. If the matter go over to the regular session, the state printer, for instance, will continue to draw the same sums he draws now, with no power to reduce them until the end of the term for which he was elected.

Remains in Statu Quo.

The need for the Lewis and Clark act charter legislation is as imperative as it has been at any previous time. Nothing has occurred to alter the status. If it was needed a week ago, it is needed now.

The constitution limits the special session to 20 days. If the session were called to convene on a Wednesday, there would be 13 days in which to transact business of a special character, before a senator could be elected. If the election of a senator were injected into the special session, it would be simply because the candidates for that position themselves injected it, and hence all-claims against the special session that the senatorship would become involved are proof that those candidates will do

New York, Oct. 30.—Negotiations are said to be under way for the consolidation of the North American Company, owned by Morgan & Co., and the United Gas Improvement Co., controlled by Widner & Griscum. The ultimate plan is to gain control of all the lighting and trolley companies in America. The latter company already has vast holdings in England, while the Morgan company is strong in New York, and controls Milwaukee, Detroit, Cincinnati and many smaller cities. Their probable plan, after consolidation, is to invade the far West and Pacific slope.

LAVA POURING VOLCANO

Still Shaking Up the Central Americanos

Washington, Oct. 30.—The state department today received a telegram from Consul McNalley, at Guatemala, stating that the eruption of Mount Santa Maria continues. The city of Quetzaltenango is covered with a layer of six inches of volcanic matter. Rich coffee plantations on the coast side are buried under seven feet of sand and ashes. Detonations are heard continuously in the capital, and earthquakes are frequent. Another eruption is reported to the department from Tompauro, where the inhabitants are fleeing.

CHINESE ARE STARVING.

And Ask Their Countrymen in the United States for Aid.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 30.—The Chinese Benevolent Society of this city has received cablegrams from South China asking for assistance for the famine-stricken people. The crop has failed in five largely populated districts as a result of drought, which has lasted five months. The richer Chinese, taking advantage of the famine, have cornered the rice supply, and have raised the price to four cents per pound. The Chinese Benevolent Society has, therefore, cabled to their overseas branches asking for money, which will be used in the purchase of rice in Siam and the Straits Settlements for sale at a rate which the poor will be able to meet. About \$2000 has already been collected in Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster.

Arizona Gets Relief by Rain.

Tucson, Ariz., Oct. 30.—The first rain for two months has fallen here, accompanied by hail, and continued at intervals for several hours. Word from Southern Pima and Santa Cruz counties report abundant rainfall there. Stock was commencing to suffer, as well as mining, for lack of water. Indications are favorable for more rain.

The trusts are to pay to the White Star \$53,500,000, of which \$15,500,000 is in cash. The stockholders receive in cash and stock \$50,000 for each \$5000 given, thus gaining a decisive financial victory by holding off until the last minute.

Hazleton, Oct. 30.—Upon advice of Mitchell, District President Duffy this morning ordered the strike continued at the collieries of the Markle, Pardee, Cox Bros. and Wentz companies. Fifteen collieries and 7000 men, including steam workers, are affected by the strike, which will be continued until the objectionable agreements are withdrawn. The strikers are to be cared for from the relief fund.

Operators Make Concessions.

Chicago, Oct. 30.—The meeting of the Stationary Firemen's Association, called for today in Toledo, has been postponed for a week on account of the elections.

Since President Morton's threat to order a boycott against the anthracite collieries, unless the firemen in the anthracite mines were reinstated, Treadwell, and many independent operators, have given the men their places back. Other operators have also made concessions, and a peaceable solution seems probable.
