Our Woman's Department

Lady Bonnet made the startling announcement at the W. C. T. U. convention recently that English women in large numbers are becoming addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors.

Oregon women are taking steps to bring about the introduction of women attendants to convey insane female patients and prisoners to and from these institutions.

The person with the introducing habit should be snubbed. Every woman, especially, has a right to say whom she shall know.

It was sad news to learn of Mrs. J. C. Card's death, which occurred in Portland October 28, after a prolonged illness. For many years past Mrs. Card has been associated with club life in Oregon, especially that of the Portland Woman's Club, of which she was a charter member. She was its first president, and was also the first Oregon delegate to a biennial meeting of the general federation. Mrs. Card will be sadly missed in the councils of the club in the metropolis.

Judge Moore read an excellent paper on "Patriotism" before the Salem Woman's Club last Saturday afternoon which was listened to with great attention. During the course of his introduction he gave evidence of his sense of justice (and the matter ought not to be looked at from any other standpoint) when he expressed with regret that women were excluded from the lawmaking power, and trusted that the time would soon come when her legal rights would be extended to that point.

Utah women have caused the passage of a law which seemingly

age of a law that female teachers in the public schools shall receive the same pay as male teachers, provided they hold certificates of the same grade.

The Year Book of the Portland Council of Jewish Women shows a membership of 219. This puts it way ahead as the largest club in the state.

The movement is on foot by club women in the various states to secure women on school boards. The Portland Journal in its club column has the following on the subject:

Oregon, so far as clubs have reported, has made but one determined effort and that was when the Portland Woman's Club took the field and through its efforts elected Mrs. Chas. E. Sitton. This was no experiment, but has proved satisfactory beyond all expectations and should serve as an example to the club women of other places. Whether it is true or not that "every school board needs a Housekeeper," the Portland women have demonstrated the fact that the right woman on a board adds dignity and gives an assurance to mothers that the very best part of the child life is being cared for, as well as the dollars and cents of the taxpayer. It should be the determination of every club in the state to get at least one woman on their school board.

The death of Elizabeth Cady Stanton removes from the scene of an active life a most remarkable woman. Remarkable not only for the devotion to a principle that almost amounted to a passion, but extraordinary in

for many years championed a hopeless cause. Yet sustained by the righteousness of her purpose she stood a half century before the world as an advocate of what she considered the rightful heritage of free born woman -- equality before the law. Mrs. Stanton's devotion to the interest of women and her constant endeavor for the amelioration of hardships brought upon her sex by the decrees of arbitrary custom, are well known.

What this generation of women owe to Mrs. Stanton can probably never be measured. We can only think of her in grateful remembrance as the pathfinder who cleared the way to the privileges we now enjoy; and though her great desire failed of fulfillment during her lifetime, the cause she set in motion must inevitably bring about the reform for which she labored, for their roots lie in the eternal verities of truth and justice.

St. Louis club women, led by the Cloth Club, have united in the defense of the suicide of Mrs. Addie M. Johnson, the woman suffragist leader of Missouri, who killed herself with chloroform last week.

Resolutions to this effect were passed at a memorial meeting, which was attended by representatives of nearly every club, and at the same time a poem, written by a close friend of the dead woman, Mrs. Florence Griswold Connor, was read. This poem, it is stated, was a favorite of Mrs. Johnson's, and probably aided her determination to end her life.

The resolutions which were passed are as follows: In March, 1902, the answer to roll call in our club was one minute talk on the subject: "Under What Conditions Are Suicides Justifiable?" Mrs. Johnson's assertions on the topic were so positive that the club members were left in doubt as to her belief in suicide and her words on that day made an indelible impression on her hearers. She cited cases in which invalids with lingering or loathsome diseases lived, often scattering the seeds of death, a curse to themselves and a weight to their loved ones, then closed

with the declaration that she thanked God that he had given her the ability to end her life when its days of usefulness were gone.

We as a club do not advocate self-destruction but knowingly we stand as one, if need be, against the world to vindicate Mrs. Johnson in her last act.

Pretty Cottages Going up and Some Improvements

Building operations in the Capital City have been interrupted again by bad weather. Work on the several new business blocks is being rapidly closed up, and the new quarters will soon be ready for occupancy, in fact some are already occupied.

A new house is being built on the Jacob Ledingger property, at the corner of State and Thirteenth streets. James Harrison is putting up a house on Mill street, near Twelfth, that will cost probably \$1600. The Seventh Day Adventists are putting a \$300 addition on their church home on Mill street. The new room will be used for purposes of conducting a school in connection with the church. L. W. Benson, of North Salem, is building an addition that cost \$150 when finished.

E. W. Hartley, of Yew Park, is expending about \$200 for a barn on his premises in Yew Park.
