A VISIT TO CASTLE WARTBURG

Where Martin Luther Was Confined

Formidable Medieval Fortress With Drawbridge

A Ramble Through Leipsic -- Famous Battleground

Berlin, Germany.

Our first stop on our return from Bavaria was at Eisenach to see the "Wartburg." The grand old castle can be seen for miles. It stands on the topmost point of a very high and heavily wooded mountain. We reached the top after perhaps a half hour's hard climbing. The first object to draw our attention was, of course, the majestic old castle. Several months out of the year, while the owner is away, the "Wartburg" is rented for a money-making scheme. We found over a hundred people waiting to be taken through the castle by the guides.

You buy your ticket immediately upon arriving at the castle and then sit in the cafe (which has been built on the cliff for the accommodation of travelers), or you may stroll about the grounds outside the castle grounds, until the gong rings, which is a signal that the guides are ready to receive the next lot of sightseers. Then we all got in line and marched up to the castle gate. It looked very military as we passed between two armed guards at the bridge leading into the castle. This bridge is the only entrance and is a queer affair, being dropped down from the side of the castle so that in time of trouble they simply drew up the bridge and all outside connections with the castle were cut off. We then passed through all manner of gates, doors and narrow passage-ways and reached the court where we paused to see which one of the buildings the guides would enter first. We entered to the left and walked down a long narrow corridor, the guides explaining as we went the famous paintings by Moritz von Schwind of St. Elizabeth. He next took us into the chapel and banquet hall where Kaiser William II is banqueting when he is visiting at the Wartburg. One of the most interesting rooms is the singer's hall, where the "Sanger Krieger" took place, which Wagner made famous in Tannhauser. We climbed up into many little domes where the stone stairs were deeply worn from use in the last 800 years. We afterwards crossed the court and went up a mean wooden stairway to visit the room of Martin Luther, where he lived sometime in concealment. The room remains practically in the same condition as when he lived there. The ink spot on the wall where he threw the ink bottle at the devil is still in evidence, although it has gradually grown to be more of a hole in the wall than an ink spot. I understand a new ink bottle is thrown each year, as the old one is continually carried away by travelers (no doubt Americans).

We remained several hours at the castle and left by the opposite side from which we came. It was even more beautiful. Words fail me to half express the grandeur of this beautiful spot. It is really one of the grandest on earth. We passed so gradually down from the high mountain, the paths winding in and out through the deep wild canyon. Presently the castle disappeared and we found ourselves in the very heart of this monster gorge with cliffs, trees (and really large ones for Germany, reminded me much of those in the Cascade mountains), and mountains of rock staring at us from all sides. The gorge is a mass of beautiful ferns, moss and wild blossoms. Well, enough of the "Wartburg," suffice it to say there is perhaps no more interesting or historic spot on the continent of Europe than it is, and one must see it to fully appreciate it.

Eisenach is a beautiful, rich little city, favored by nature and is a favorite home-building city of retired capitalists, therefore beautiful mansions are seen on every hand. The Fritz Reuter villa where Richard Wagner lived, lies just at the foot of the "Wartburg" mountain, by the lake. We stopped next at Leipsic. Our train got in at 10 p. m. and we hurried to our hotel and left at once for Auerbach's Keller, that famous old underground wine restaurant where Goethe, Schiller, Schumann, Mendelssohn, Chopin, and many other great men used to kneipe (tavern). We saw the painting from which Goethe took his text for Faust. The monster wine cask is sitting there in one end of the "kneipe." We remained drinking wine and examining the old painting which completely covered the walls until about 2 a. m. Many of the pictures are almost obscure with age. The next morning we started out to see what was to be seen in and about Leipsic. We went first to the Gewand House, and then to the Thomas church, where Bach used to play. Then we rode out to the battleground of 1813. Saw the Napoleon vieta, a massive old granite monument about six feet high, erected on the spot where Napoleon stood and watched the progress of the fight during one day of battle. On the top of the monument rests a model of his hat and sword. We saw the huge monu-

ment which they are beginning to build on the battleground. They intend to be twelve years in building it. In 1913 it must be completed for the 100th anniversary of the battle of Leipsic. They have been working at it nearly three years and the foundation is only well begun.

There are many other beautiful monuments on the field and a museum of war relics. We came back to the city and went to the oldest church in Leipsic, the Nicolai church, over 800 years old. We rang a monk at the foot of the dome on the street and the old sexton peeped down from the tower and opened the door for us by pulling some sort of an attachment. We entered and started on our upward climb. The further up we got the darker it was, and finally we could not see where we were stepping at all. It was awfully confusing and I expected to fall at every step. In about fifteen minutes (it seemed at least) we reached the monster bell. It weighed many tons. We climbed on further up and finally came to where the sexton lived with his wife and three children. He took us still higher up and we stepped out on a narrow platform built around the dome, and how the wind howled! The day was beautifully clear, and he explained the lay of the entire city to us. We were over two hundred feet above the street and the people underneath us looked like children. The sexton said none had a more lofty pleasant residence than he. He explained that all his provisions were bought in bulk and pulled up by a pulley from the street on the outside of the dome. He must have pleasant apartments in summer, but I would think in winter it would be dreadfully cold, for the church dome sways with the wind and they get the wind from every direction. We remained so long at Nicolai church that we nearly missed our train out of Leipsic. Arrived in Berlin at 10 p. m. C. HELLENBRAND-GRAHAM.
