**RASPBERRIES CONTRACTED**

Salem Cannery Company Arranges With Farmers for the Growing of an Increased Acreage of This Fruit.

The Salem Cannery Company has contracted with farmers of this vicinity for the growing of 35 acres of red raspberries with which to supply its plant in this city for canning purposes. It is expected that this acreage will produce about 90 tons of the fruit. The acreage that is devoted to the growing of raspberries in this locality is not as large as it was a few years ago, but by insuring a ready market for the fruit the cannery company hopes to encourage the cultivation of a larger acreage of all kinds of fruit. This same plan might work admirably with the strawberry crop. This crop, however, is more extensively grown about Salem than other varieties, but there are room for many acres more of this berry, which always has a ready sale in the open market and at the cannery.

The drug business conducted during the past year by C. C. Comfort, in the Cottle block, has been sold to E. Ostrander, who will conduct it in the future. Mr. Ostrander has for some years been druggist at the saylum, and is well known here. Mr. Comfort, who has made many friends in Salem, will return to his old home in Philadelphia.


