Washington, Nov. 13.—Coroner Neville this morning conducted an autopsy on the body of Louise Hoge, aged 24, who died last night without medical attention.

Chicago, Nov. 13.—Miss Hoge, who was treated in Washington by a Christian Scientist, is a niece of Holmes Hoge, of this city, a prominent member of that faith, and cashier of the First National Bank.

CRIMINAL COST BILLS FILED
The Past Four Years Compared to Four Previous Years
NEARLY EIGHT HUNDRED CRIMINAL PROSECUTIONS IN FOUR YEARS

Under Partisan Administration--Citizens Non-Partisan Business Administration Make Only 81 Cases

One of the pledges made by the Salem Citizens' Non-Partisan Business Administration was that no more criminal cost bills should be run against the county merely for the purpose of earning fees for the officials.

In all cities a class of criminal offenses are punishable under both state and city laws, and under the present system the City Police court made all the cases possible under state laws, and the officials pocketed the fees.

Thus, while drawing their salaries for holding the city office, they worked up hundreds of criminal prosecutions that became the basis of large fee bills against the county.

Under the Citizens' Program the city officials are on flat salaries, get no fees whatever from the public treasury, and have no interest in making cases against the county.

When there is a case of violation of state laws that comes before the city police court the fees are turned over into the city treasury, instead of going into the pockets of the officials.

Following is the record for four years of the new system and four years under the old system, when partisan officials made cases for the fees:

The above record has been made by City Recorder and Police Magistrate Judah, who is also ex-officio Justice of the Peace of Salem precinct, and City Marshal and Chief of Police Gibson, who is also constable for Salem precinct.

FIRST CASUALTY AT PANAMA
Revolutionists Fire on Americans
One Marine, who Fought Under Dewey, Was Killed
Yellow Fever Has Broken Out on the Isthmus

Panama, Colombia, Nov. 13.—The first American casualties as a result of the revolution occurred Wednesday.

The government warship, Bogota, (formerly the Jesse Banning) manned by an American crew and commanded by Captain Marmaduke, lowered two boats with armed men.

In the meanwhile the revolutionists were discovered in ambush close to the beach, and when the Bogota's boats pulled ahead the second time the rebels opened fire on them, killing Ship's Armorer Richard Kane, of Washington, who fought under Dewey at Manila, and wounded George Walker, a seaman named Clark and Lieutenant Vasquez were also wounded.

The Bogota and Chucuito then opened fire on the enemy. One shot fired at a group of ten rebels killed every one of them.

Gunner Cross, of the Bogota, thinks 40 or 50 rebels were killed. The schooner Helvetia, loaded with rice, was captured, but the first shot at the second schooner set her on fire, and she was completely destroyed, with her cargo. The body of Kane will be buried here with military honors.

Washington, Nov. 13.—Cassidy sent a long dispatch to the navy department this morning, stating that yellow fever has broken out among the marines on the Isthmus of Panama. Orders will probably be issued immediately to concentrate the marines at Colon, and take active steps to prevent a spread of the epidemic.

Members of Mr. Irwin's family in this city were seen this morning, but the only knowledge they have of the man's whereabouts is that he is in the above telegraph dispatch.

STRUCK BY PRESIDENT'S TRAIN
Unfortunate Negro Accidentally Loses His Life

Paducah, Ky., Nov. 13.—While traveling at a high rate of speed the train bearing President Roosevelt South, struck and killed a negro trackwalker near Boaz, Ky., at 4 o'clock this morning.
