## Hop Market Now Uncertain

W. Hubbard, the veteran hop buyer, left today for California. He re-

ports that the hop market is quite unsatisfactory and uncertain. "One-third of the year's crop was contracted," said Mr. Hubbard, "and there will be little doing in the market until that part of the crop which has been placed on the market at lower prices than other hops can be purchased, is disposed of, and the demand raised for the balance of the crop, which is being held for a higher figure. December is a holiday month, and there is usually very little activity in hop circles for that period. It is impossible to predict the future of the hop market." Mr. Hubbard may return to Salem and remain for a few weeks longer, should the weather become more pleasant.

## Ezra Durand Was Pardoned

Governor Geer has granted a pardon to Ezra Durand who has served about six years of a 12 years' sentence for the crime of forgery committed in Portland. The pardon was granted on the petition of the prosecuting attorney who secured the conviction of Durand, and also at the solicitation of many persons who were defrauded by the operations of Durand, who are of the opinion that the man has been sufficiently punished.

Ezra M. Durand was convicted in Multnomah county on a charge of forgery, having issued a lot of notes to which the name of his friends were forged.

**Beresford Is Unpopular.**  
London, Nov. 28.—Rear Admiral Beresford will be relieved from the command of the Mediterranean squadron and will be assigned to another command. He is said to be unpopular with the admiralty board. This is given as the reason for his transfer.

## BRITISH DIVINE DEAD

### Dr. Parker of London's City Temple

Was a Favorite With Americans Abroad

And Mentioned to Succeed Henry Ward Beecher

London, Nov. 28.—Dr. Joseph Parker, the famous pastor of the City Temple, who has been ill for several weeks, died this morning.  
Rev. Dr. Joseph Parker, better known as "Dr. Parker of the City Temple," was the leading Congregational minister in England, and has ever been a prime favorite with Americans abroad. Dr. Parker established the City Temple in 1869, and during the years that have passed since then he has developed an important work among the poor of the great city. Few pulpits orators were more outspoken or more fearless than the celebrated British divine. He has several times attracted attention by his bold criticisms of King Edward when he was Prince of Wales, and since he has ascended the throne.

Dr. Parker made a tour of the United States in 1887, and at that time was frequently mentioned as a successor to Henry Ward Beecher, of whom he was a deep admirer.

Dr. Parker had reached the age of 72 years, and was possessed of a stalwart physique that until recently has kept him in excellent health, despite his arduous duties. In 1900 he edited the London Sun for a week. Dr. Parker received his degree of Doctor of Divinity from the University of Chicago.

## THE MIGHTY HAVE FALLEN

### Champion John L. Is a Bankrupt

Has Filed Petition of Insolvency--Liabilities \$2600

Has Nothing Left But a Suit of Clothes

New York, Nov. 28.—John L. Sullivan, the former champion pugilist, filed a petition for bankruptcy today in the United States district court. In his petition he says he is not at present engaged in any business. The liabilities are \$2600 and his assets consist of personal clothing valued at \$60.

## MATTHEWS AN OFFENSIVE PARTISAN

### Portland Journal Files Charges Against Him

San Francisco, Nov. 28.—The Portland Journal is preferring charges with the department of justice at Washington against U. S. Marshal W. F. Matthews, of the district of Oregon, because of offensive partisanship. It holds that his office as chairman of the Republican state committee was contrary to the order of Attorney-General Knox.

## EXPELLED FROM RUSSIA

### Fifty Thousand Armenians Driven to the Frontier

Vienna, Nov. 28.—A Vienna daily reports that the Czar recently expelled 50,000 Armenians from Russia. They were driven to the frontier by Cossacks, but Turkish officers refused them admittance, and drove them back across the line. Zero weather prevails, and the mortality list is heavy. The Armenians are entirely unsheltered.

### Russians Demand Reforms.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 28.—Tremendous effect has been produced in Russia by the unanimous demand of the agricultural inquiry commission for constitutional reforms and political liberty as the foundation of economic well being. In spite of Minister Witt's encouragement to speak boldly "because the Emperor wants to know the exact truth," the minister of the Interior, Von Plowe, has begun arresting the members of the commission, including among them a physician named Martiny, for the authorship of the resolutions presented to the local committee of Veronzh, demanding a national congress, and two other members of the agricultural commission named Michaelovik and Nikoviv, of Tula, for advocating a remission of the peasant land payment. Martiny's collaborator, a school teacher named Ronivok, is now awaiting sentence.

## FIRST LIE IS NAILED

### Mayor Bishop Will Not Remove from City

Mayor Bishop was seen today in regard to the statement published this morning that he would remove from the city soon after election. He gives this signed statement:  
"It has come to me that my name is on the Citizens' ticket for mayor to give it strength, and that as soon as the election was over I intended to resign and go to Portland. I wish to say that I have no plan contemplating a move, and, so far as I now know, I shall continue to reside in Salem, and my interests in the coming campaign are solely identical with the property owners and taxpayers of Salem, who desire the policy of the government of the city, as it has prevailed the past four years, to be continued."

## KING ALFONSO A DEGENERATE

### So Says Distinguished Spanish Anthropologist.

Madrid, Nov. 28.—Senor Macho, the distinguished anthropologist, has been threatened with suit and the suppression of the publication of his magazine containing an article relating to King Alfonso. Macho, in his analysis of the King's character, along physiological lines, concludes with the inference that the monarch presents a veritable type of degeneracy.

## Negroes Indorse Roosevelt

Norfolk, Nov. 28.—The American Negro Methodist conference, in session here today adopted strong resolutions endorsing President Roosevelt, and thanking him for the consideration shown to negroes, as expressed by his letters written to South Carolina.

## ONE DAY'S RECORD

### Of Death and Injury On the Rail

Northern Pacific Freight Trains Collide

Wreck on the Big Four Injures Twelve People

Butte, Mont., Nov. 28.—Two freight trains on the Northern Pacific collided two miles west of Missoula this morning, killing an unknown tramp, and seriously injuring five trainmen.

**Wreck on the Big Four.**  
Indianapolis, Nov. 28.—A Big Four passenger was wrecked near West Danville this morning. No one was killed, but 12 persons were injured, none fatally.

**Fireman Is Killed.**  
Des Moines, Ill., Nov. 28.—A Wisconsin Central fast freight jumped the track near here early this morning, killing the fireman and dangerously scalding the engineer and brakeman.

**Head-End Collision.**  
Wasatch, Utah, Nov. 28.—In a head-end collision on the Union Pacific's main line between a work train and a freight train 10 men were injured seriously. Fireman Smith and Conductor Rheaburg had their legs crushed, and received severe scalp wounds.

## ENGLAND AND GERMANY

### Unite in Policy Toward Venezuela

Emperor William Sends Two More Warships

Our Government Will Offer no Serious Interference

Washington, Nov. 28.—The national capital is alive with gossip regarding the reported concerted action of Great Britain and Germany against Venezuela. Advertisements received here say that Germany is preparing to rush two more warships, making seven powerful engines of war in Venezuelan waters, and landing a force of 2000 men. England has sent two strong cruisers, the third, the Charybdis, sailed hurried from Halifax last night under secret orders.
