## HORSE STEALING CHARGE

Four Head Taken in Tygh Valley

Lew Riggs of Brooks Charged With a Crime

Deputy Sheriff Skipton, of this city, on Sunday effected the capture of Lew Riggs, at Brooks, on a charge of horse stealing, alleged to have been committed in Wasco county last month. Riggs was turned over to Sheriff Sexton, of Wasco county, who happened to be in the city yesterday with another man for the state penitentiary. The accused man was today taken to Wasco county, where he will be given a trial on the charge.

Riggs, who is a former Salem boy, is aged about 25 years, and at one time resided in North Salem. On November 19th, four head of horses, belonging to A. S. Bonney, were stolen from a pasture in Tygh valley, Wasco county. At the time the Marion county officers

were notified of the theft, for it was presumed that the horses would be brought across the mountains and disposed of in the Willamette valley. The first trace that the local officers obtained of the stolen animals was on Saturday, when Riggs brought one of the horses to this city and attempted to sell it. The Wasco county officials were communicated with, and it was learned that Sheriff Sexton was en route to Salem with a man for the prison. When the sheriff arrived Sunday morning, a telegraphic warrant was secured from Wasco county, and the officers started in search of Riggs, who has been living with relatives near

Chemawa. The suspected man was not found there, and the search was continued to Brooks, where the young man was apprehended. Riggs does not disclaim knowledge of the theft, but asserts his innocence. He explains his possession of the stolen horses by stating that he met another fellow with the horses in the mountains of Eastern Oregon, and that he traded for the four animals.

M. L. Jones, of Brooks, is the father-in-law of Mr. Bonney, from whom the horses were stolen. Learning of the theft, Mr. Jones kept a lookout for the horses, which he succeeded in locating near Chemawa last week, and he immediately took charge of three of the band, the fourth horse having been disposed of.
