

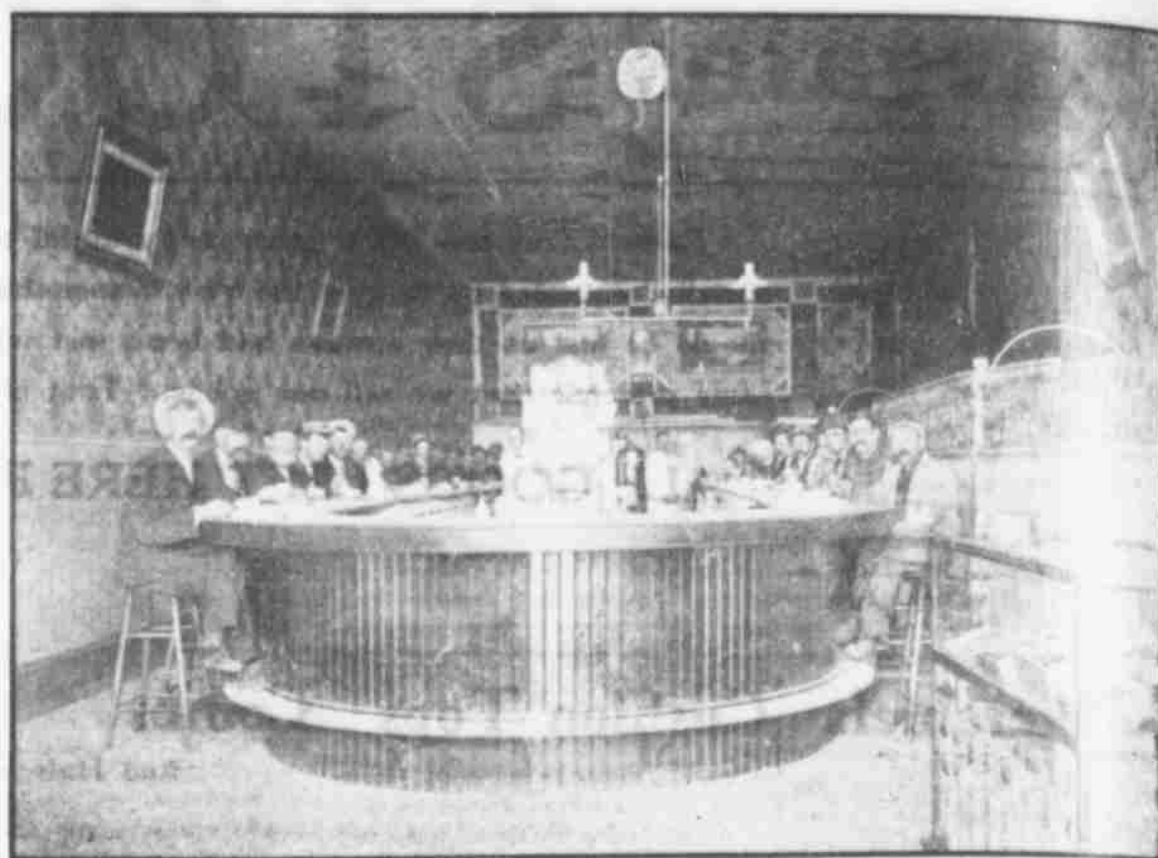
SALEM BUSINESS MAN WHO FAVORS ORGANIZATION.

As Viewed by a Lady From
the Valley

The one that I noticed first was Say's Phoebe, one of the Flycatcher family. It is not generally distributed over Oregon, but in Sherman and Gilliam counties it is the most common of birds. It is very plain, with a brownish gray coat, length from seven to eight inches.

He comes early in the spring and stays late in the fall. He likes to have his home as near the home of man as possible, prefers to build over the front door or window, and if he cannot get that he will take a backdoor or window, and if not allowed his way in that a board or beam in the woodshed or barn will do.

One pair of Phoebe's I knew of built for several years in an old well, that was not in use. The nest was placed on some boards several feet down, and when the birds were large enough to get out of the nest they fell into the water and were drowned.

The nest I have was found in an old cabin, no one living in it at this time. It was built on a little shelf about five feet from the floor, had four white eggs in it. They often lay six; in a few weeks after taking the nest I was in the cabin again, and there was another nest just like the first and had the four white eggs in it.

The next bird I found very plentiful was the Arkansas Kingbird, of the Flycatcher family, and the largest one we have. His head, neck and breast are a bright ashy gray and his crown concealed scarlet patch, back, olive gray; tail black, with white web of outer tail feathers abdomen and sometimes lower breast is yellow. He is often called the Red Martin. He builds his nest in trees or on cross bars of telegraph poles. I saw one nest on some boards up in an old windmill, and, like the near relative, the Kingbird, he likes to keep large birds at a safe distance from his nest.

There was a small bird that was very plentiful in the winter and spring which, from his color must be a Redpoll Linnet. It had the red crown and almost a pink breast, but as both Mr. Lord and Chapman say the Redpoll nests in the far north. This bird certainly nests in eastern Oregon, and sometimes builds his nest in, or as I thought, on top of the old last year's nest of the Orioles. If this is not the Redpoll I could not find any description in Mr. Lord's book that suited it.

In the rocky canons of these counties I found the Rock Wren. He makes his wings go so fast when he flies that he makes one think of a humming bird or an insect. There were such numbers of these little fellows always flying around among the rocks that I never tired of watching them.

In Gilliam county they have the Shrike; his length is about ten and a half inches, his color, upper part gray, tail black and white, under parts white with black lines, ear coverts black. This is a very interesting bird
