**THE PRESS OF THE ANTIPODES.**

The Journal receives in the same mail The Evening Times of Manila and the Morning News of San Juan, Porto Rico. One is published on the evening of the 27th and the other on the morning of the 28th. But both at about the same hour in reality.

Our esteemed exchange from the state of San Juan is taken up with an appeal of the Federal party showing up the great outrages perpetrated on the people in the recent elections by the Republicans. It is in the nature of a proclamation to their citizens in the U. S. and if half is true, we are to witness a mighty hot time in that island.

We shall review the situation further in our next but turn now to the esteemed contemporary from the other side of the world. It is five thousand miles farther away but not the less interesting. One blessing besides the American flag they did seem to enjoy—Both states observed Thanksgiving day as a national holiday.

In Luzon the Philippine commission had just passed the quarterly appropriation for expenses of \$2,201,800.33. It seems to cost about eight times as much to govern that island as it does to govern Oregon.

According to The Times of Manila they need two things very much in that country. Greater stability to their finance and more Chinese immigration. This The Times sets forth with great ability. It is a very bright and able newspaper, and although not printed in two languages as is the San Juan News. We hope it will get what it is working for.

**THE CIGAR TRUST FIGHT.**

The striking Chicago cigar makers have all quit because their employers are engaged in a hand-to-hand struggle against the trust that is seeking to monopolize the cigar business of the whole world.

This is an instance where it is hoped independent labor and capital will cooperate. It would seem as though Union labor would neither work in trust factories nor smoke trust-made cigars.

If the labor unions would carry out those two policies the trust would be driven to the wall. But will they enforce such decrees? Will they refuse employment of the trust and refuse to burn their cigars?

A Salem Tobacconist has issued circulars to all members of unions in this city informing them of just what brand of cigars and chewing and

smoking tobacco were controlled by the trust.

The dealer went further and offered them "just as good" brands at the same prices that were made by union labor and not by trust factories. He has probably heard from the members of the unions by this time.

But members of unions are probably like other people—Will work for whoever pays them the best wages and smoke the cigar and use the tobacco that suits their taste. It is likely that some more effective manner of fighting the trust will have to be invented.

**ADVERTISING CREATES BUSINESS**

Those words are probably the most potent factor in the world of commerce today. The use of this maxim is rapidly extending to the professional world. That publicity of a good thing makes demand for it.

**INSULTING THE PRESIDENT.**

Ira H. Burns, legal representative of the anthracite coal companies referred to the President of the United States as "Teddy" in the sitting of the strike commission on Monday. A swift rebuke was administered to him by General Wilson, but unfortunately the incident does not end just there. It has consequences.

Because the President of the United States has formulated a policy for the correction of the trust evils, and because he took specific steps, in response to popular demand, to settle the coal strike, a trust lawyer refers to him as "Teddy Roosevelt." In the same spirit, Mr. Burns might as well have referred to the President of two years ago as "Bill McKinley."

The remark was without excuse or warrant in circumstance or surroundings. It was in exceedingly bad taste. It was unfortunate for Mr. Burns' clients. It will be regarded generally as significant of the hostile attitude adopted by the hard-coal operators toward the chief magistrate of the land.

Mr. Baer and his associates learned a short time ago that the President of the United States could not be insulted with impunity. The coal operators associated with Mr. Burns will do well to take the same lesson to heart.

To insult the President of the United States is to insult the nation, and any group of men approving such an act or instigation or encouraging it is piling up for its members very serious difficulties in the future.—The Inter Ocean.

**A MINISTER TO JAPAN.**

Discussing the report that was first published that it was the intention of the President to nominate John Barrett to be United States Minister to Japan, the San Francisco Chronicle, Republican, said: "If the appointment is made, the President, in justice to himself, should make the public aware of his reasons. In this part of the country the people can see many reasons why he should not be appointed, but none which would justify his appointment. Mr. Barrett is a shining example of what a man of ordinary talents can accomplish if he resolutely sets about keeping himself in some kind of an office, is able to get his first start, and has the knack of properly 'working' commercial bodies and the public press. Mr. Barrett has spent a good deal of time in Eastern Asia in one capacity or another, and was probably a competent and energetic agent to procure exhibits for the St. Louis exposition, which was the occasion of his last visit. That, we judge, is about his limit. To send him as the representative of the United States at an Asiatic court which is the center of, Asiatic and European intrigue is absurd. He is

neither a statesman nor a representative American. He is a Democratic free trader, who changed his politics when the administration politics changed, but without abandoning his free-trade doctrines or his free-trade efforts. He favors "reciprocity" as a stepping-stone to free-trade, and if sent to Japan, would doubtless intrigue for the negotiation of a "reciprocity" treaty with that country.

"So long as the Republican party is responsible for the Government, and so long as that party abounds in real statesmen of strong intellect, breadth of view and useful experience, we look to the President to appoint our high diplomatic posts those who to these qualities add complete sympathy with the protective principle on which the Republican party claims the support of the people. It is said that the Japanese Government does not favor the appointment of Mr. Barrett, perhaps for the very reason that it prefers a representative American. If appointed it will be regarded as a "Pacific Coast" appointment. We do not know whether Oregon still claims Mr. Barrett as a citizen. As a matter of fact, when not in office he stays in Washington or New York, waiting for one to turn up. He is not of diplomatic caliber, and the appointment is not a proper one to be made.
