CAME TO OREGON IN 1853

John Wolverton Dies at His Home Near Monmouth

After a lingering illness of several weeks, John Wolverton passed quietly away at 10:30 o'clock on the evening of December 30th, at his home in Monmouth. Mr. Wolverton was born December 4, 1822, near Mount Pleasant, Hamilton county, Ohio. At the age of 17, with his parents, he moved to Illinois. He remained there one year, then moved to Iowa. In 1845 he married Miss Mabel J. Nealey, with whom he came to Oregon in 1853. He located in Polk county, some eight miles south of Monmouth, where he had constantly resided, except for a few years spent in Monmouth.

Mr. Wolverton was the father of seven children—W. M. Wolverton, of Cascade, B. C.; Justice C. E. Wolverton, of Portland; A. P. Wolverton, of Salem; Rev. Bruce Wolverton, of Portland; A. P. Wolverton, of Spokane; Mrs. Dr. J. C. Byrd, of Spokane; Otis A., of Monmouth, and Grant S., of Spokane.

Though not a man of public affairs in a large way, yet his influence was always in the direction of bettering the condition of the county and state at large. Moderate in his counsels, careful in his judgment, conservative in his acts, he was always a safe and trusted friend. He took a leading place in the founding of Christian College, being always ready with his means and helpful with his kind acts. He was a sincere friend of education for the people. He was for many years a leading member of the Christian church. His familiar face and kind words will be greatly missed about Monmouth.

CRAZY HORSE THIEF

Young Man Is Committed to Asylum from Albany

Will Hall, who has been confined in the county jail for the last two months, on a charge of horse stealing, was examined yesterday before County Judge H. M. Palmer by Drs. W. H. Davis and M. H. Ellis as to his sanity, and, after a thorough examination, he was committed to the insane asylum at Salem, says the Albany Herald.

Since his incarceration he has given evidence of an unbalanced mind by frequently growing violently angry at fancied grievances, and while thus enraged he would curse and vilify anything and everybody in his vicinity. His father, Otho Hall, testified that until recently, and for about three years, his son has been in Eastern Oregon, herding sheep, breaking horses and running a pack train; that before that he was at home, and while there was considered by the other members of the family as weak minded. He is 19 years of age, and can neither read nor write. The physicians pronounce it a case of paranoia. He was taken down to Salem yesterday afternoon by Sheriff Huston.
