REPUBLICANISM.

It must appear to any unimpaired and unrefrigerated intellect that to many prominent Oregon Republicans the principles of Republicanism mean as much as a mouse does to a cat, and no more.

The Republican party stands for sound finance and modern business interests and a protective tariff. But when one of these prominent can't get what he wants, he bolts the party or the caucus.

He does not bolt as a matter of principle, because one of these cardinal principles of Republicanism has been repudiated, but because he, the politician, can't get his mouse.

All the caucuses holding in the legislature for three sessions has not been because of any principle, but to keep some cat from getting its coveted mouse, and to help some other cat get it.

Now there is to be another caucus bolt, not because some ancient principle of Republicanism is imperiled, but because some hungry aspirant can't get what he wants. And that is Republicanism.

A Republican caucus, where a straight majority rules, is good enough for a nomination for a state or county office, worth from \$1000 to \$5000.

But for a \$200,000 to \$500,000 senatorship a caucus won't do.

The signed, sealed and delivered caucus, with conditions, is not Republicanism. It is catlike greed, thievishness, commercialism, anarchy.

THE PRESS AN EDUCATOR.

In this practical age people have found the value of an education. They are not all in a position to acquire this through formal methods. They cannot go to college. Their period of school life has been short. One essential of an education is a fair knowledge of current events. There is a desire to know what the world is doing. This is not idle curiosity. There is necessity for knowing. This information can be had from the daily papers. Thus the press becomes an educator, says the Tacoma Ledger. It is an educator in more ways than one. It cannot make people think as it does unless it has the right way of thinking, but it can stimulate them to the process of thought. If the press is right, the effect of its argument will not be wasted. If it is wrong, the reader has the privilege of disagreement. The truth is, that usually it tries to be right. The press as a whole is on the side of morals, of intelligence, of honor among men and between nations. Politically there must be divisions, since no two persons view the world from exactly the same standpoint, but the statement of a paper is not accepted as final. It is weighed by the same standards applied to the opinion of an individual. An intelligent opinion expressed and defended is an instrument of educational potency. The aim of the newspaper is to place before the public a fair, uncolored picture of the

happenings day by day. This is the compilation of history, as history is made. Moreover, the language of the press, concerning which certain smart people have been known to grow sarcastic, is more nearly correct than that in common use. It is better than the language heard on the streets or in places of business and at social functions. Written in haste, it displays many imperfections, and yet these leave it still comparatively at a high plane. The writer who presents periodical records directed at "news paper English" is, as a rule, an ignorant person, mistaking conceit for knowledge. Newspaper English is so superior to the English that newspapers would not tolerate, but which is in common use elsewhere, that it is to be specifically recommended. So it will be seen that in various aspects the press is an educator. No community could afford to be without its paper. The more intelligent the community, the greater the manifest appreciation.

OREGON SOLDIERS' HOME

There Are 96 Veterans at the Institution

Commandant Shipley Recommends More Buildings

W. J. Shipley, commandant at the Oregon Soldiers' Home, at Roseburg, has filed with Governor Geer his biennial report for the period of 21 months, December 30, 1909, to September 30, 1912. New furniture for the barracks is recommended, and also a new water system for the home. At the present time water is obtained through a 2-inch pipe from Roseburg, and, while the service is satisfactory in quality, it is faulty and of insufficient quantity, and makes the successful fighting of fires in any of the buildings an impossibility. The accommodations of the home are all taken with the 96 veterans who are now there, and 20 applications for admission are now on file. The report states that the new barracks and the addition to the hospital that were ordered by the legislature have been partly finished, and the commandant recommends that they be completed, as the room is badly needed for the accommodation of the inmates of the home. The cost of completing the building is estimated at \$4500, and when finished will accommodate 150 persons. All of the general appropriation made by the state for the maintenance of the institution was exhausted on September 30th last, but the report states that there is a sufficient balance in the national fund to carry the home to December 31st.

Appropriations Wanted.

Commandant Shipley recommends the following appropriations for the home for the ensuing year: Maintenance for 1903 and 1904, \$24,900. Completing barracks and hosp., 4,500. Furnishing and equipping same, 2,500. New water pipe, 2,000. Steam laundry, 3,000. Furniture for barracks, 500. Fences, sidewalks, etc., 500. The report of Geo. E. Houck, the surgeon at the home, shows that there were 21 deaths during the period covered by the report, or one for each month. The report further shows that there are in the home 70 United States volunteer soldiers and 26 Indian War Veterans.

Cost of the Home.

The cost to the state in maintaining the home for the past two years was \$29,437.44. This total was made up of the following amounts:

Clothing	3,525.41
Hospital, exclusive of subsist.	2,278.35
Farm and garden	4,112.66
Repairs, current	2084.4

Total \$29,437.44

The average cost of maintenance per capita was as follows: Per annum, \$191.11; per month, \$15.92; per day, 52 cents.

Representatives of Mount Angel, Beaverton and Portland colleges have purchased grubbers and Mr. Finney feels grateful to the professors.

STATE NEWS ITEMS.

The Lane county commissioners' court has fixed the tax levy for the year 1903 at 22½ mills. This is for state, school and county purposes. The tax is two mills less than the levy for last year.

The Lakeview electric light plant has had to shut down for the lack of fuel, and the town has had to go back to candles and kerosene. The city council promises to start up the plant again as soon as a supply of wood can be secured, but winter mud roads make wood hauling a matter of serious consequence.

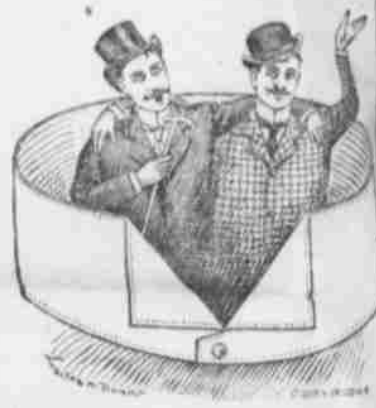
