RAILWAY TIES.

Wireless telegraphy is to be used on Italian trains as a means of preventing railway accidents.

COAL TO BE PLACED ON FREE LIST

President Engages in Conference on Coal Question

Effort Made to Relieve Coal Famine in New York

Washington, Jan. 13.—The House ways and means committee this morning decided to report a substitute for the Hill bill, which provides a rebate for all kinds of coal from all sources, for one year, virtually placing coal on the free list for that period. The bill will be called in the House this afternoon, and undoubtedly will pass immediately. Daisell, Payne and Grosvenor, by request of the President, called at the White House this morning for a consultation on the coal situation, besides the proposed legislation granting a rebate. Other plans will be discussed, which the participants in the conference refuse to discuss.

Washington, Jan. 13.—In the Senate this morning Culberson introduced a resolution exempting from duty anthracite and ask immediate consideration out of order. He declared there was an unbroken precedent in the Senate since 1815 for such action, under the constitution. Aldrich objected because it is another phase of the Veto resolution, which would be considered in regular order. The resolution went over. The ways and means committee this afternoon decided not to bring the amended Hill bill before the House, as the privileged bill would cause them to be subject to amendment. He desired to submit it so it will immediately pass. Instead it has been decided to bring a rule for its consideration at tomorrow's session.

New York, Jan. 13.—Low's conference with the coal operators, and the President's call for the purpose of ascertaining what measures are possible to relieve the famine in the city, began at 11 o'clock this morning. Baer was the first to arrive, followed by Markle, Underwood, of the Erie; Fowler, of Ontario, and Thomas, of the Lehigh Valley.

All the coal men present agreed to co-operate with the New York dealers to supply 25-pound balls of anthracite for 10 cents, and to do their utmost to expedite an increase in the supply. Baer, Fowler and Saylor were appointed as a committee to try means to relieve the famine. Low, Baer and Thomas made addresses. Baer read his, saying "He did so to prevent being misrepresented by the sensational press." He said his company was only receiving five tons. If any case were brought to his notice where the dealer was buying and holding for higher prices, he would cut off his supply. The real cause of the scarcity was that none was mined during the summer.

SMOOT REMAINS IN FIGHT

Mormon Apostle Is Strongly Opposed

Salt Lake, Utah, Jan. 13.—Members of the legislature have received communications signed by Lillian M. Stephens, president of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, representing 300,000, vigorously protesting against the election of Reed Smoot for senator. Every mail brings similar protests from all over the country. Smoot, when interviewed today said: "I shall not resign the apostleship on account of the senatorial candidacy. I am in this race, and intend staying. My friends have signified their intention of standing by me, and as long as they are with me I

shall not desert them. I do not believe that President Roosevelt intends to take a hand in a local fight."

ANOTHER BATTLE REPORTED

Turkish Force Overcomes Macedonians

Vienna, Jan. 13.—The Die Zeit today reports a fierce battle at Penelope, between 200 Macedonians and the Turkish forces. Seventy of the former were killed and wounded. Another dispatch relates horrible atrocities by the Turks at Djumala. Eight peasants were hanging head down for 24 hours, and scores of women and girls were violated.
