BIGGEST GUN ON EARTH

Was Tried at Proving Grounds Saturday

Shell Covered a Distance of 7 Miles Before Lost

New York, Jan. 19.—The first shot from the biggest gun on earth was fired last Saturday afternoon at Sandy Hook proving ground. The gun was moved out where, if it exploded, the pieces would fall on the sand only. An immense crowd of spectators were taken to the scene of the experiment on a special train. When the gun was fired all went into bomb proofs. The gun is the famous 16-inch gun and is probably the last of its size that will ever be made.

A small warming-up charge was fired with a blank cartridge, then the 2500 pound projectile and 650 pounds of smokeless powder, equivalent to 1120 pounds of black powder, was discharged. The shell struck four miles off shore, ricocheted in quarter mile jumps for nearly three miles farther, and then was lost sight of.

NOTED INDIAN LEADER

Valuable to Whites in the Matter of Treaties

Tacoma, Jan. 19.—General Marcellus Spott, more properly known by the Indian name of Marcellus Squo-dup-kin, an aged and noted leader of the Puyallup tribe, died in the city jail last week as the result of alcoholism and old age. He was found in a helpless condition early in the evening by Officer Nelson near East E and Twenty-fourth streets, and was conveyed to the central station in the patrol wagon. His condition was so alarming that physicians were summoned, who administered stimulants and did everything possible to relieve the aged chieftain, but he was beyond medical aid and survived only a few hours.

Coroner E. M. Brown was notified and gave directions to have the body removed to the undertaker's, where it now lies awaiting the directions of relatives, who have been notified.

The deceased left a brother-in-law living on the Puyallup reservation and a step son in Yakima.

After inquiring into the facts Coroner Brown deemed no formal inquest necessary.

Friendly to the Whites.

General Spott was a man upwards of 80 years of age and had held a prominent place in the councils of the tribe, but he was friendly to the whites, and had frequently been of valuable service to them, especially in the early treaties negotiated by Governor Isaac I. Stevens.

His love for firewater was perhaps his besetting sin and led to his final taking off. About a year and a half ago his family was in Tacoma and left for home in the evening in a two-seated wagon, all much the worse for liquor. In going over a bad place in the muddy road Mrs. Spott was thrown from the wagon into a pool of water where she was drowned. The others were too much befuddled to miss her and drove home without her. Next day her body was found.

The general and his son indulged in more liquor, and on the following night the son was struck by a street car and killed while driving home.

His Recent Troubles.

Not long afterward General Spott took an Indian woman named Kate Arquette to live with him. She had another husband living, who she claimed had abused her. Spott and the woman went to live temporarily in a shack near the county road, and had been there but a few days in June last when an Indian known as Tommy Santiago Howard called at the place one night and demanded admission, saying he wanted something to eat and he wanted to see Kate. Spott told him she was sick, but he could see her if he wanted to.

As Spott afterward told the story in court, Howard at once began an assault upon the woman, but Spott drove him out of the shed. Howard came back with a knife and Spott ran away. Presently Howard came out dragging the wretched woman. Next morning she was found dead with evidences of having been choked to death.

Howard was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment. He is now in jail pending an appeal to the supreme court.

From the time of Howard's arrest in June until the trial in September Spott was also detained in jail as a witness, and during that time he got well sobered up; but when the trial was ended he fell back into his old habit of dissipation, and has been rapidly going to the bad ever since.

According to Spott's own statement he was born in Stellacoom and was about 20 years old when the first white settlers came to Puget Sound.


