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ABOLISH DEFICIENCY JUDGMENTS.

Representative Sholley, of Lane county, is a miller and a practical and successful business man.

His bill to abolish deficiency judgments is a step in the right direction. In foreclosing a mortgage the owner of the debt generally bids in the property, and generally bids as little as possible. For the balance he takes a deficiency judgment.

If a man buys a farm for \$2000 and pays \$800 down, and gives a mortgage for the balance, and it is foreclosed, is it not enough that the creditor gets the whole farm back, and keeps the \$800 besides?

Is it right that he should get the farm, keep the \$800 and get a judgment against the debtor besides, to hold over him and his children for the rest of their lives? The Sholley bill abolishes this injustice.

The mortgage holder should be satisfied to take all the mortgaged property. There may be exceptions to this rule, but they could be provided for in an equitable manner.

FARRAR FOR A CAUCUS.

Senator Farrar in casting a vote for C. W. Fulton for United States senator has shown a disposition to be reasonable and conciliatory in position as a Republican.

There is really no occasion to put any of the Republican aspirants in the criminal category, in commenting on their efforts to "get there."

Senator Farrar is an old and tried and true Republican, and his disposition to treat all aspirants fairly is rather to his credit than otherwise.

So far no one has any decided advantage in the struggle. If there were a caucus of the 73 Republicans to

night, Fulton could accomplish very little with his entire 33 votes. Geer could not get a nomination.

The followers of both Geer and Fulton are probably making up their minds to go into caucus when the right time comes. If Senator Farrar can help or bring this about he has rendered the people and the party a great service.

When the Republicans met to choose a candidate for president of the senate, there was a tie of 11 to 11 for a long time. One man rendered the final decision and the senate is harmonious. Is not that right? Is not that the right way to name a senator? Who pretends to deny it? No one.

REPRESENTATIVE KAY'S BILLS.

Representative Kay has introduced several important bills that are of more than average importance to the public.

His bill to permit garnishment the wages of state employees is in the right direction. Why should any one on the public payrolls have immunity from the payment of debts?

The Kay bill to permit school districts to borrow from the unused school funds should pass. If the people of the district do not care to take up the debt on the popular loan plan the idle money in the state treasury should have the next chance to be loaned.

The Eastern loan companies are trying to cripple the popular loan plan and will no doubt fight the Kay bill, as they want all the bonds they can get under the old Paxton law.

Mr. Kay has also introduced the most practical flat salary law, and will make the fight of his life to pass that measure.

His bill to tax the stocks of banks and corporations, where the main office is located, is probably the weakest measure he has, because it attempts to change the status of personal property.

The Marion county delegation is very strong this year in both houses, and, as chairman of the ways and means committee, Mr. Kay occupies a position of unusual prestige.

THE CORPORATION TAX BILLS.

The committees in this legislature on the subject of assessment and taxation have the most important bills before them that are to be considered at this session.

First among these is the organization tax and annual license tax bill, introduced by Mr. Eddy, of Tillamook. The Journal called attention to the danger that it might release stock from taxation.

Such is not the intention of the author of the bill and he informs The Journal that it is a square attempt to collect an annual license from corporations doing business in the state.

This bill, it is believed, will produce \$100,000 to \$120,000 revenue per annum, and interfere with no present taxation of property, tangible or intangible of the corporations.

Mr. Eddy is a very able lawyer, and has made a close study of the problem before the people of this state, and declares that some such measures are necessary to put money into the treasury.

The Dacey bill is on a different line, but will produce still more revenue, and it is not believed that it in any way conflicts with the Eddy bill. Mr. Dacey believes that his bill will obliterate the recent decision in the state of New York against taxing intangibles.

But the New York decision is liable to be reversed upon further hearing before the full state supreme court, where it is appealed. It was only reversed by the appellate division.

The Harris bill goes further than the Dacey bill, and makes a full, complete and all-embracing effort to tax

the tangible and intangible property of the railroads, and all other common carriers. Concessions will no doubt be made, and one general bill passed.

THE ASTORIA CANDIDATE.

In looking for good points in favor of the several candidates for United States senator, The Journal wishes to devote a little space to the Astoria candidate.

It has fought political battles with him and against him, and always found him a cheerful and sturdy antagonist, of more than usual resource.

His Republicanism is all-wool and a yard wide, not too exalted in its ideals for the comprehension of common people, and partisan to the core.

Mr. Fulton is in the prime of life, and if he could be elected and kept at Washington for the next twenty years he would be a very useful man to the people of Oregon.

He is not the deep, scheming, plotting machinator, or the corruptionist that some of the opposition paint him. He is an orator of great ability, and of creditable private life and habits.

When his partisanship is aroused Mr. Fulton becomes a dangerous opponent, and at times has been rather reckless in overriding the rights of the minority.

In the senate he would be of the forceful Roosevelt, Czar Reed stripe of statesman. This is the worst that could be said against Mr. Fulton.

The charge that he is promising of-fices right and left to get votes is rather complimentary to his enterprise as a politician of the spoils school, and he is no better and no worse than his contemporaries.

THE GREATER SALEM CHARTER.

The bill has passed both houses without a dissenting vote that extends the city boundaries over all the platted suburbs.

The city of Salem will hereafter contain about nine square miles of territory, and will be the second city in the state in size and wealth and population.

It will be some time before the charter goes into effect, and there will be plenty of time for all to adjust themselves to the new conditions, and to take advantage of all the benefits accruing from expansion.

The fight has been conducted openly on the part of the expansionists. The charter commission, the Greater Salem Club and the Citizens' Council took steps openly and publicly to secure the charter.

There has been constant misrepresentation of their labors, and today the charter continues to be misrepresented to those who have been taken into the corporation. This will, in time, cease, and better councils will prevail.

It is believed that when all have adjusted themselves to the change there will be little or no occasion for complaint. The suburbs could not forever remain outside of the city. This was the best time to come in.

All property will advance under the operations of the new charter. A Salem real estate man who has been offering a five-acre tract near the fair grounds, for \$150 an acre, was ordered yesterday to advance it to \$200 per acre.

Even \$25 lots in North Salem will be hard to get hold of after a short time. There is no revolution pending on account of the expansion of the city boundaries. All will be benefitted alike, and all will be satisfied it was
