The protest is made through the miners of the Grave creek district, who, like the old diggers in all other sections of the country, are indignant at the wholesale manner in which the timber claims, or so-called timber claims, have been taken up there during the past year. The miners allege that many of the claims taken up did not have enough timber on them to fence them, the sole object of the locator being to get possession of the mineral land the claim contained.
