POWERS OF THE ORATOR

Suggestions to the Oregon Demosthenes

Freedom of Utterance Comes Through the Truth

The Journal proposes to print a series of papers on the subject of oratory for the benefit of the members of the legislature now assembled at Salem.

While we are seeking to attain such freedom of the physical organism as will enable us to command it freely, what mental attitude will be conducive to greater freedom of thought and of expression?

Phelps, of Eastern Oregon, got the floor, and stated that the bill is one of considerable importance to the state at large, and asked that it be referred to the committee on assessment and taxation.

In reply, Kay said warmly, "Mr. Speaker, I think it is an imposition on this house to ask that this bill be referred to the committee consisting of the representatives from Eastern Oregon, which enjoys the benefits afforded in the law, and where 99-100 of the scalp bounty appropriation is spent."

Phelps then moved that the bill be referred to the committee on assessment and taxation, but Malarky proposed an amendment providing that the measure be made a special order for 11 a. m. Friday.

S. B. 67, Miller—To define terms "land" and "real" property; postponed.

S. B. 99, Sweek—To prohibit construction of fish wheels; passed.

S. B. 111, Howe—Limiting time for collection of taxes; indefinitely postponed.

S. B. 135, Mulkey—Relating to challenge for bias; passed.

S. B. 140, Miller—To fix salary of state printer; passed. Daly, Farrar, Mays, McGinn, Myers and Rand voted "no."

S. B. 147, Miller—To fix salary of state officers; referred to special committee.

S. B. 162, Daly—Relating to appropriation of water below point of diversion; passed.

S. C. R. 20, Mulkey—In regard to investigation of state land board and state school fund, allowing committee to call witnesses and ask for legal advice of attorney-general; adopted. Took recess at 11:30 to 11:55.

Third Reading of House Bills. H. B. 186, by Webster—Repealing section 4781, relating to recovering damages for injury from defective highways. Failed to pass.

H. B. 197, by Miles—A bill for an act for improvements and use of rivers, etc. Made special order 10 a. m. Friday.

H. B. 213, by Simmons—An act to protect sub-contractors, material men and laborers furnishing materials. Re-referred to the committee on revision of laws for further amendment.

H. B. 171, by Nottingham—To prevent the manufacture or sale of adulterated linseed oil. Passed.

H. B. 74, by Hansbrough—Imposing on railroad corporations liabilities for injury to their employes in certain cases. Passed, 56 ayes, 4 absent.

H. B. 215, by Johnson—For portage road between The Dalles and Celilo. Made special order for 2 p. m. Monday.

H. B. 37, by Murphy—Providing for enumeration of the school children of the state. Re-committed to committee on revision of laws.

H. B. 110, by Simmons—Amending section 3365 of code, relating to changing of boundaries of school districts. Passed.

H. B. 126, by Eddy—Regulating time of apportionment of school funds. Passed.

H. B. 130, by Davey—Compelling attendance of children at school. Re-referred to committee on education.

H. B. 216, by LaFollett—Repealing scalp bounty act. Re-referred to committee on assessment and taxation.

H. B. 240, by Webster—Making sheriffs, deputies and constables ex-officio fire, fish and game wardens. Passed.

H. B. 259, by Burleigh—To establish a bureau of information, and levy a tax therefor. Motion to indefinitely postpone under consideration.

An Evening Session. On motion of Eddy, house voted to meet at 7:30 p. m. Friday for the consideration of charter bills, and all other measures of a local character.

House concurred in S. C. R. 18, by Mulkey—Authorizing the chairman of the senate and house joint committees on printing to employ such necessary clerical work as may be needed in the investigation of the state printer's office.
