ed to pass on Lewis and Clark appropriation. Passed. S. B. 62, by Kuykendall—Changing boundary of Lane county. Passed. House refused to adjourn until Monday. There will be sessions this afternoon, evening and Saturday. Senate—Friday. Bill from ways and means committee to provide for the expense of the 22d session of the legislature; passed. Pierce—Bill to declare Associated Press a common carrier; the majority report was lost, and further consideration was indefinitely postponed. Murphy—Bill (substitute by committee) to provide for the relocation of the county seat of Union county; passed. Kay—Bill to fix salaries of certain officers of Marion county; passed. This measure allows assessor \$3000 for deputy hire and the recorder \$800; it allows the school superintendent \$200 for transportation expenses. It makes the salary of the county judge \$1200 and gives the commissioners \$4.00 per diem. Johnston—Bill to fix salaries of school superintendents of Wasco and Baker counties; read first, second and third times and passed.

Greater Salem Midsummer Carnival

Committee of Sterling Business Men Appointed

The Greater Salem Commercial Club held a well attended meeting at the city hall for the purpose of hearing and investigating the proposition from I. W. Baird and G. L. Hutchins, representing Geo. Jabour, who wishes to conduct a street carnival in Salem beginning June 29th and ending July 4th. Mr. Hutchins went into details, and gave a thorough explanation of the carnival proposition.

He said 12 shows accompanied the Jabour Company, among the attractions being a Ferris wheel, a well stocked menagerie, a German city, midway pleasure, etc. He argued nothing brought people from far and near to a city and proved so attractive and beneficial generally as a street fair or carnival. Salem has never had an attraction of this sort and it would prove a great success here, as it had in many other cities throughout the country.

His idea was that an enclosed fair was usually more attractive than an open one, and this idea seemed also to prevail among the members of the club.

Secretary Judah read a communication from E. J. Arnold, of Portland, who has recently been in Salem trying to work up the same proposition.

Hal Patton thought the citizens should begin to agitate the matter without delay, and moved the appointment of a committee of five to make inquiries and investigations and consult with the members of the city council regarding the holding of the fair.

The motion of Mr. Patton was adopted, and Dr. E. A. Pierce, president of the club appointed H. D. Patton, N. J. Judah, M. O. Buren, J. G.

THREE FIFTHS MAJORITY

Bill to Re-locate County Seats

The enabling act empowering counties to relocate or remove their county seats, by a vote of a three-fifths majority, was passed yesterday with strong opposition from a few members, especially Mr. Phelps, of Morrow and Umatilla.

His reason for doing so was not apparent, unless, as Mr. Malarkey said, he wished to contend against a bill that might come up at subsequent legislatures. Several representatives have had provisions made for the changing of the county seats of their

counties, and Mr. Phelps objected because the matter was not allowed to rest there, without making the law a general one. Wheelon, of Wasco, also opposed the bill.

Mr. Malarkey, in speaking of the bill, said the matter should be settled in each particular county, and not be brought to the legislature, to take up time from more important matters, when only the county was concerned.

ELDER URGED FOR OFFICE

Mayor of Stayton For the Soldiers Home

The friends of W. W. Elder, of Stayton, are urging Governor Chamberlain to appoint that gentleman commandant of the soldiers' home at Roseburg. Mr. Elder is an old soldier, having enlisted in a Pennsylvania regiment in 1861, and served for four years. He was a staunch war Democrat, came out of the army a Democrat, and is still a Democrat. Mr. Elder is well known in Marion county, having been twice before the people of the county as the nominee for sheriff, and gave Sheriff Knight a close fight for that office, and also was the Democratic nominee for county judge, being defeated for the office by Judge Scott by a small majority. Mr. Elder is well qualified for the position his friends are asking for him.
