**KILLED MIGHTY GRAFT**

Marion Members Have Earned Their Pay

Clerkships Pay Not Increased By One Half

There was a brief but lively scrap in the house last night over the question of allowing extra compensation for the officers and clerks of the house. The original resolution, by Jones of Lincoln, provided extra pay for all of the officers and clerks of the house. A substitute was reported by the committee on resolutions providing that an allowance of one-half day's work should be made for each night that the house was in session to the following officers of the house: Charles Currie, superintendent of the clerks; chief clerk, calendar clerk, journal clerk, reading clerk, sergeant-at-arms, doorkeepers and pages.

Jones of Lincoln vigorously attacked the substitute resolution, which he insisted did an injustice to the minor clerks. He did not believe in showing partiality in the granting of additional pay. If an extra allowance was to be allowed one clerk or officer of the house, he maintained that all are deserving of the same recognition.

In defense of the substitute resolution, Davey said that none of the clerks employed in the house accepted their employment without knowing what compensation they were to receive. He resented the imputation offered by Jones to the effect that favoritism had been shown in formulating the substitute resolution. While the speaker believed every clerk should receive pay for every hour's work, still he thought it about time to put an end to the graft for extra clerk hire.

The substitute resolution was adopted by a decisive vote, and the countenances of the fair and expectant body of clerks assumed a degree of greater disappointment, when the fate of the Jones resolution became known.

In the evening it was reported upon unfavorably by Davey and with the assistance of Kay and others, it was killed. Even if the tender budding graftlet, that would cost about \$2000, is resurrected today, Davey and Kay deserve great credit for their fight.
