ASKING A NEW TRIAL

Mr. McMahan's Reasons for the Same

Counsel for Hofer Brothers are Heard

Defendants Never Reflected on a Mrs. Gibson

Counsel on Friday afternoon argued a motion for a new trial in the suit for libel of Mary F. Gibson vs. E. and A. F. Hofer, editors and publishers of the Journal. L. H. McMahan, attorney for the plaintiff, argued for another trial while the defendants were represented in the consideration of the motion by A. O. Condit and J. A. Jeffrey. Judge Burnett after hearing the argument, took the matter under advisement until 9 a. m., Monday, when a decision will be rendered.

In support of his application for a new trial, McMahan cited a number of reasons. He claimed that the court erred in admitting the testimony of Hofer Bros. and J. W. Cochran to the effect that at the time the alleged libelous article was published that one of the editors was out of the city. He insisted that this was evidence in mitigation and should have been set forth in special pleadings in order that it might have been introduced in the hearing of the case. He further contended that the court committed error in not instructing the jury that the character of the plaintiff was presumed to be good until it was attacked. Counsel for plaintiff alleged another error on the part of the court in not instructing the jury that the pleadings from which the alleged libelous article was produced, were not privileged at the stage of the proceedings when they were used. As a further reason for asking another trial, the plaintiff's counsel urged the inadequacy of the verdict for damages that had been rendered.

Messrs Condit and Jeffrey in answer to the contentions of the counsel for the plaintiff, insisted that the testimony of the publishers and that of the reporter who wrote the libelous story, was a part of the testimony of

the case and was not intended as mitigating testimony, that the same should be presented in order that the jury might have in its possession all of the circumstances in the case for its consideration in estimating the amount of damages, if any were found to be due. They maintained that under the issues involved they had the right to present such testimony. The defense further insisted that the character of the plaintiff was not an issue in the case, that nothing had been said against the character of the woman, and that it had been contended by defendant's counsel in their argument before the jury that no testimony had been presented to show that the character of the plaintiff had been damaged; that the entire failure of the plaintiff's complaint to allege that an injury had resulted to plaintiff's character divorced from the consideration of the case any instructions on the subject by the court to the jury; that the instructions requested did not comply with the real issues of the case, and that the subject, so far as it was material to the case, was fully covered in the general instructions to the jury by the court. On the contention of the plaintiff with respect to the inadequacy of the amount of damages that were allowed, counsel for the defendant took the position in their argument that the verdict was excessive, in view of the conditions attending the case.

Pretender Killed Again.

Madrid, Feb. 21.—A Tangier dispatch says the Moroccan pretender was defeated on the 14th near Melilla. The pretender perished in the battle.

Watchman Murdered.

Philadelphia, Feb. 21.—The watchman in the big McCurdy department store was murdered last night, and his body was thrown in the cellar. The extent of the robbery is unknown.
