WANT JETTY BUILT

Florence Citizens Anxious to Have Work Done

There are \$35,000 Available for this Purpose

Florence, Or., March 11.—The people of Florence and the Stuslaw country are very anxious that something should be done towards commencing work on the jetties at the mouth of the river. An appropriation of \$35,000 has been made by congress for this work, but as yet there is nothing being done by the officials in charge, so far as we can find out, toward pushing this work.

INTER COLLEGE DEBATE

Big Delegations Leave for Eugene

Where Eight Colleges Will Compete for Honors

About two carloads went from Salem today to attend the intercollegiate debate at Eugene this evening, when the eight colleges of Western Oregon will compete for oratorical honors.

The State University, Willamette, Monmouth, McMinnville, Newberg, Albany Forest Grove and the State Agricultural College, and no more are in the race, in which young Hale, of Forest Grove, carried off the honors last year.

A delegation, composed of Superintendent Reasler and 30 students of the State Normal School, of Monmouth, arrived this morning, and joined the local Ciceros. They flaunted their colors of cardinal and gray, and lifted aloft their banner, sang songs and let off the barbaric college yell with great gusto. Their orator is W. R. Rutherford, of Harney county, who can run a lariat, as well as bind the spell that wakes the applause.

National Council of Women.
New Orleans, La., March 13.—The women of New Orleans are making preparations on an elaborate scale for the reception and entertainment of the National Council of Women, whose annual session is to be held here the latter part of the month. Reports being received daily indicate that the attendance will be large, and will include representative women from all sections of the country.

The National Council of Women is a central organization, to which all national societies of women organized for any purpose whatsoever come to hear what other national societies are doing on other lines. They counsel together as to any reform, or movement, in which all might co-operate. The council has a cabinet, and is fashioned on a plan similar to the senate of the United States. More than a score of national societies, with an aggregate membership of 1,200,000 women, are represented in the council. Prominent among the affiliated organizations are the Women's Christian Temperance Union, the American Woman Suffrage Association, the National Federation of Women's clubs, the Young Women's Christian Association, the Woman's Relief Corps, and several others of equal importance.

OREGON PRISON MATRON

Many Seeking and None May Be Called

Mrs. Jessie L. Walker, Mrs. James Matthews, Mrs. Alvina Northeutt, Mrs. S. S. Knighton, Mrs. J. N. Fitch, Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Mary V. In many state prisons the warden's wife acts in this capacity. There is no suitable quarters at the Oregon prison for a matron.

UNION PACIFIC ENJOINED

Southern Pacific Trying to Wreck It

Minority Making Fight Against the Stock Combine

Cincinnati, March 13.—United States Judge Lorton issued a restraining order against the Union Pacific this afternoon, on the application of a minority of the stockholders, to prevent the Union Pacific management from voting the stock it holds in the coming annual election of Southern Pacific directors. The complaint alleges that they have secured control of the Southern Pacific stock, using it for depreciating the earnings and profits of the Union Pacific. An application for a restraining order was first applied for at Louisville yesterday, as the Southern Pacific is a Kentucky incorporation. A restraining order is also made against the Southern Pacific stockholders who own Union stock. Foraker and Lauterbach, of New York, represented the minority when the case was carried before the court this morning.
