OREGON BOARD OF HEALTH

Maps Out a Campaign of Operations

The Oregon State Board of Health held its first meeting Saturday, and organized by electing Dr. Andrew C. Smith, of Portland, president; Dr. A. C. Kinney, of Astoria, vice-president, and Dr. Wood Hutchinson, of Portland, secretary.

The election of a secretary was the most important duty the board had to perform, for the secretary is to be the active health officer of the state. For three ballots the vote stood three in favor of C. W. Koene, of Medford, and three for Hutchinson. On the fourth ballot Hutchinson secured four votes and his election was then made unanimous. The board fixed the salary of the secretary at \$200 per month. As the total appropriation is \$5000 a year, this will leave \$2000 a year for the expenses of the board and secretary.

All the members of the board were present at the meeting: They are: Dr. A. C. Smith, of Portland; Dr. Alfred Kinney, of Astoria; Dr. C. J. Smith, of Pendleton; Dr. J. B. Pickel, of Medford; Dr. E. A. Pierce, of Salem, and Dr. Harry Lane, of Portland.

At a business meeting the board decided, among other things, that all cases of contagious diseases shall be quarantined.

Physicians, nurses and heads of families must report to the health officers all cases of such diseases.

Probably the most important action of the board was the making of an order directing the secretary to proceed at once to California and make a thorough investigation of the plague, so that he may be ready to cope with it should there be danger of its spreading to Oregon. The secretary was also instructed to prepare a full set of blanks to be used by physicians, etc., in reporting births, deaths and contagious diseases. Dr. C. J. Smith, Dr. Pickel and Secretary Hutchinson were appointed to investigate the subject of annual diseases in this state, and report at the next meeting.

The board will in the near future issue a circular addressed to school officers throughout the state, urging the need of having pupils in the public schools vaccinated, and warning them of the danger of an epidemic of smallpox. The circular will also contain information regarding the detection and prevention of the spread of diseases.

Burdick's Insurance.

E. L. Burdick, who was murdered at his home in Buffalo, carried about \$25,000 life insurance, all in small policies, mostly of \$1000, except one of \$10,000 in the Security Mutual. Oddy enough he seems to have forgotten that the insurance is all payable to his wife, who was living away from him, and the defendant in a suit for divorce. Attorney Pennell, who is named as co-respondent, is reported to carry about \$200,000, mostly in 20-year endowments, of which \$75,000 is in the Travelers, \$65,000 in the Equitable, \$25,000 in the New York Life and \$25,000 in the Mutual Life.

DEATH'S CHILLING HAND

Laid on Two Former Salemites

John B. Baldwin, aged 64 years, of Independence, died Saturday evening at the home of his nephew, M. P. Baldwin, on Front street, in this city. Liver trouble was the cause of his death.

The deceased was a native of Missouri, where he was born in 1839. He afterwards lived in Kansas, and has been a resident of the state for the past 10 years. He was a Baptist minister, in which capacity he was engaged since 1887. He is survived by a widow, three children having preceded him to the grave.

The deceased was a member of the Modern Woodmen of the World and of DeMolay Commandery, Knights Templar, of this city. The Masonic fraternity took charge of the remains Saturday night, and conveyed them to the lodge hall, where they remained in state until this evening, when the body was taken to Independence, where the burial service will be conducted tomorrow.

Bertha M., wife of J. M. Woodruff, of Portland, died at the Salem Hospital on Saturday evening of pneumonia, after an illness of but two weeks' duration. The deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Taylor, of Macleay, this county, and at the time of her death was but 30 years of age.

The deceased was born in October, 1873, on the farm home near Macleay, where she grew to womanhood. After graduating from Willamette University, in this city, she was for several years successfully engaged as a school teacher in this county. On May 4, 1898, she became the wife of J. M. Woodruff, the popular traveling man, and continued to reside in this city until about two years ago, when, with her husband, she removed to Portland. Mrs. Woodruff was an estimable young woman of noble Christian character, being a member of the Central Christian church, of Portland. She was also a member of Capital Lodge, Fraternal Union of America, of this city. The bereaved husband and the members of the family of the deceased have the sympathy of the community in their sad bereavement.

The funeral party will leave Salem from Rigdon's undertaking parlors at 12:30 sharp Tuesday, for Macleay. The service will be held at the Macleay church at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. J. J. Evans, of Red Bluff, Cal., conducting the services. Rev. Evans was the former pastor of the First Christian church in this city, and officiated at the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Woodruff, in May, 1898. During the services the Stalwart Quartet, consisting of Messrs. Wenger, Epley, Roth and Snyder will sing "The Last Hope." This was a favorite selection of the deceased.

Another Death.

Ido O., wife of J. W. Penick, and only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. McDowell, died at the home of her parents, in Polk county, five miles west of Salem, at 8 o'clock Sunday evening, March 15, 1903. The deceased was aged 28 years, and consumption was the cause of her death.

Funeral services were held at the McDowell home this afternoon, and burial took place in City View cemetery.
