Fulton goes into the United States senate with clean hands. How clean they shall remain we can only judge from the character of the man, and the general morality of the government at Washington.

But a congressman to succeed Tongue should at this time have firm and well-known convictions on matters of vital interest to the district. It is a well-known fact that wholesale spoliation of timber lands has been going on in Western Oregon by corporations and big syndicates.

asking the referendum on the Cello portage appropriation of \$165,000, and the Harris corporation tax bill, are legally defective.

All the petitions out are recalled and new petitions will be framed and circulated. The first effort to invoke the referendum was faulty in form, and the work will have to be done over.

Without taking sides as to the merits of the matter, The Journal will aid in circulating these petitions, for the purpose of testing Direct Legislation. No harm can come from bringing some of the important acts of the legislature to a popular vote.

#### SCIENTIFIC ROAD BUILDING.

The Journal must take issue with an esteemed correspondent, who writes intelligently on other phases of the question, but says an engineer is not needed for good road building.

Roads can be much improved by being laid off properly to begin with. The easiest grade, the best location for drainage and construction, and saving of distance and land are very important matters.

Only engineering skill can properly lay off a road. There is no more absurd proposition than having roads follow land lines, regardless of the character of soil, drainage and grades.

A wagon road should be laid off with as much skill as the track of a railroad is located, and nothing would be more ridiculous and disastrous to railroad transportation than to locate railroads as our common highways are now located.

Road building is a scientific engineering proposition, or it is not. If it is the former, then how can a road be properly built without a survey and specification as to construction?

#### THE REFERENDUM ON THE FAIR.

The referendum will be invoked in Oregon in three cases; the Lewis and Clark exposition, the portage railroad \$165,000 grant and the corporation license law. The initiative will be called for in three cases: For a corporation law, flat salary law and a direct nomination law.—Albany Democrat.

It is understood that steps were taken by a mass meeting at Albany Monday to send out 1500 petitions asking for the referendum on the Portland fair appropriation of \$500,000.

The item above has, however, no foundation, as there is no intention on the part of the friends of the other matters to invoke the initiative, unless it might be for the Harris tax bill.

The flat salary reform and the Direct Nomination law can be passed and become laws in the regular way, as all parties are agreed upon them, and it is only a question of educating the people in a few counties to understand the necessities and merits of those reforms.

It should be remembered that Marion county Republicans were united in the legislature in support of flat salaries and direct nomination. These reforms were promised in all platforms, and Marion county members respected their pledges. The rest of the state will have to come onto the Marion county platform, or defeat the Republican party at the next round.

#### BENNETT FOR SENATOR.

The Portland papers keep speculating on the probable result and choice of Governor Chamberlain should be called to name a senator to fill the vacancy caused in case of Senator Mitchell's death.

It is stated that Hon. C. E. S. Wood is not available, as he is an unqualified free trader and anti-expansionist, when it will be remembered that in his campaign Governor Chamberlain took very conservative grounds on those warm subjects for a Democrat.

It is also stated that Mr. Wood did not observe the political proprieties when he urged Democrats to vote for Geer for senator, advice which every Democrat in the legislature studiously disregarded.

There is one man whose appointment would give great satisfaction to Democrats, and a great many people outside of the party, and that is Hon. A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles.

He is a lawyer of great ability, and has borne the Democratic banner against overwhelming odds for congress, for supreme judge, and has always had a big vote outside of his party.
