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TO RECEIVE THE PRESIDENT.

Greater Salem will prepare a fitting and handsome reception for His Excellency, Mr. Roosevelt, the president of the United States, when he comes to the capital May 21st.

It is fitting that the capital of the state should give the official reception in his honor, and that the state officials and other dignitaries of the commonwealth should meet and greet the President.

It is to be regretted that there is no official residence where he can be taken on his arrival and made welcome in a truly hospitable manner becoming to the state, but must be met on the street, so to speak.

Of course, it will not be proper to take the President to any private residence, and it is to be hoped that at some time in the future an Executive Mansion bill will pass in such a shape that it will not have to be killed by a veto.

In the reception to the President and party some regard should be had for the unofficial portion of the community—the farmers, the labor organizations, the business men and professional men not holding office.

The President is out to meet the people of Oregon, and those already in public positions should not alone be recognized on committees and in management of the receptions.

AFTER THE BIG GRAFTS.

It is a noticeable fact that the movements to get the referendum vote are all in the direction of calling down the big grafts, as they are called—Portland fair for \$500,000, portage railway for \$165,000 and Indian War Veterans for \$100,000.

The movement of the miners to refer the Eddy corporation tax bill will be found to be a mistake, as about three-fourths of all the people will vote for that when they understand its purposes and operation.

The Portland fair bill will probably not be defeated at a popular vote. All Portland, Eastern Oregon, the railroads, the steamboat and other transportation interests and the labor unions will vote for it.

While there is a pretty big political combine working the measure for all there is in it, and the labor organizations will get their share out of the pie, there are enough interests to carry it at the election.

The portage railway bill has more real merit than any of the rest, and is liable to fare the worst. The cor-

The state built one little portage at the lower rapids, and it cut the price of grain transportation right in two in the middle. The road cost only about fifty thousand, and paid in one year.

The Indian war appropriation has least merit of all, and will work out badly, and the state will never get through paying. But sentiment may carry the job at a popular vote, as it did in the legislature.

PLANT A FEW FLOWERS.

Not because the President is coming, nor for a fine show in your front yard, but for your own satisfaction and for your children, plant a few flowers.

A bed of tulips put out now will bring a fine lot of flowers. To save them from moles and gophers, rodents very fond of bulbs that are sweet, put down a piece of sheet-iron, make a border and have the bed about eight inches deep, one-half old, well-rotted manure.

Plant a few dozen gladioli—plant some every two weeks until July 1st, and you will have a splendid succession of blooms and no flower makes a prettier or more durable show for the sideboard or dining table.

Plant plenty of poppies—nothing gives greater pleasure for a little trouble than the variety of colors and gay blossoms of this commonest of all flowers. What is a house without a bed of poppies, anyhow?

Then do not neglect the plants that bloom later, like the asters, cosmos, stock and carnations. These you can buy of the florists, and for a dollar invested about the middle of May get a grand harvest of floral beauties later in the summer and fall.

The Democrats propose to contest the vacancy caused by the death of the late Thos. H. Tongue, and practically the candidate and plan of campaign have been formulated in the mind of the state chairman. At a meeting of the Democratic state central committee at Portland it was decided to hold a convention to nominate a candidate at Albany, April 11th. Delegates may be elected by primary or appointed by the county committees, at the option of these committees. The candidate decided upon in the minds of the state central committee is Evan Reames, of Jackson county, son-in-law of the late congressman, a popular young Democrat of Southern Oregon. Mr. Sam White, a very aggressive campaigner, will have charge of the battle for the opposition in this district, and will probably make his headquarters in Albany or Eugene, and canvass the district in person with the nominee. Other good speakers will be employed, and every voter will be reached with the arguments for the Democratic nominee.

The city of Salem enters upon an unexampled career of prosperity this spring. There are more improvements, more demand for real estate than ever before. With a spirit of improvement taking hold of our people, and the ambition to make the town something besides a rambling country place, there is a possibility of such a material advance in values of property as will surprise the oldest inhabitant. The coming of the President and the Mid-Summer Carnival will throw elements of life and activity into the situation such as few citizens can look forward to.

Business conditions are going to be very favorable for a good spring trade. There is a much larger surplus of money in the hands of the producers than ever before. Good prices for prunes, apples, hops, potatoes and dairy products have left pretty much all the farmers square with the world, and with some money to spend. The promptness with which they have paid their taxes, and got the benefit of the rebate, shows that there is greater prosperity than ever before.

MAKES DEAF HEAR

Miller Hutchinson of Alabama Does it

His Invention Said to Be a Perfect Success

The New York Sun says: Science has made it possible for even deaf mutes to hear. The fact was demonstrated a short time ago at the laboratory of Miller Reese Hutchinson, a young electrical engineer in this city. In the presence of a few physicians, The Duke of Newcaastle, who is visiting here, and fifteen or twenty men and women prominent in fashionable society of New York were also present. The company was called together to witness the tests of "Acousticon," an invention of Hutchinson's upon several inmates of the New York Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb.

"Acousticon" is a device involving all the important principles of the telephone, plus the additions which Hutchinson's inventions give it. The effect of it is to give such intensity to the sound waves that they will penetrate ears that have never before heard sound.

An instrument carried to the ears of several inmates of the deaf mute institution this afternoon the first sounds they had ever heard. The expression on the faces of some of the deaf mutes, when they heard, was so pathetically joyous that many of the women present looked on with moist eyes.

Hutchinson is a native of Mobile, Ala. He has been at work on his invention for several years. Last year he went to England and showed what his machine could do in several institutions for the deaf and dumb in London.

Queen Alexandra saw one of the tests and asked the inventor to give another at Buckingham Palace. He did so, and the Queen gave him a gold medal.
