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DIRECT NOMINATION LEAGUE.

The Marion County Direct Nomination League advertised meetings at Astoria Saturday night, March 21st, and at Maclean Saturday night March 28th, and will soon hold a meeting at Salem.

These meetings are to be addressed by Republicans and Democrats, and for the purpose of making further public sentiment against the present corrupt slate primary and jockeying county conventions.

Direct nomination was put in the platforms of all three parties in Marion county last spring by action directly of the delegates, and with no suggestion of any newspaper or factions.

The state conventions promised in their platforms to enact Direct Nomination, and yet it was impossible for the Direct Nomination League to get their carefully prepared bill, to which no one could find objection, even before the state senate for a vote.

The Direct Nomination League attributes the failure of a Flat Salary law, and of the Harris tax bill, to the absence of some check on the part of the people over the nominating power.

All who believe in this fundamental reform that makes it possible for the people to reward representatives who do right and punish those who violate their pledges, should help Direct Nomination.

THE DEMOCRATIC PROGRAM.

A few Democratic politicians, many of them armed with proxies, have decided to call a congressional convention composed of delegates appointed by the county central committees to nominate a candidate.

As some speakers at their meeting contended, primaries alone give a Democratic basis for a convention, and delegation selected by a committee is getting too far away from the masses of the people.

As an advocate of Direct Nomination The Journal would call the attention of the Democratic managers to the necessity of giving the people a voice in this matter, by petition at least, if not by primary.

A ballot submitting the names of the Democrats who are eligible for this honor, who are capable of canvassing the district, and who are known to the people of the district, would draw a great many to the primary.

The present Democratic program of nominating a candidate, not even by holding county conventions, but by committee delegates, and largely by proxies, is a mistake of political tactics, to say the least.

The Democratic party is in the minority in this district, and should go in the opposite direction of enlisting the interest of the people in its organization and candidate, instead of repelling.

A nomination entirely independent of the Democratic machine, by direct vote of the people, or by petition, would be more Democratic.

DEPRESSION IN EUROPE.

There is considerable business and financial depression in some of the great nations of Europe, and it is only a question of time when it may make itself felt in this country.

Germany and Austria and Hungary are suffering from reductions in values of property. Rents on city property are coming down, and many places that formerly were full at good prices are now without tenants.

The United States is better circumstanced than ten years ago, and as the old belief of a depression once in seven years has not materialized, it is possible that we pass the low water mark without suffering whatever.

In a certain way we are independent of Europe. Our diversity of productions being so great that we cannot be hurt by a decline of any one great line of industry.

GRABBING THE SCHOOL LANDS.

Governor Chamberlain has gained great credit for putting a stop to the old game of having the state act as middleman and agent for the lieu land swindle. It was a belated act, but better late than never.

Tilmon Ford, of Salem, calls attention to the game of grabbing school lands at \$1.25 an acre, when in sixty days the state advances the price to \$2.50 an acre. Many of these grabs are by public officials themselves.

The law says the state land board shall sell the school lands for not less than \$1.25 per acre, and, in view of the new law, there seems no good reason why they should not be advanced to that price now, and stop the game of grabbing for speculative purposes.

The whole trouble with the state land business seems to be that the officials who deal with these matters seem to regard themselves as only

clerks to expedite whatever can be done under the law, and not as the watchdogs of the public treasury, to get all the revenues possible out of the resources of the commonwealth.

In this respect here has been little difference between the Republican and Democratic administrations of the past. At a low estimate the state is a million dollars shy of what it "might have been" if the laws had been enforced for the state, instead of against it.

TREAT ALL ASPIRANTS FAIRLY.

The Woodburn Independent, Rep., is inclined to be very severe on Hon. Binger Hermann, as a candidate for congress in this district. The Journal hopes to see the contest for the nomination kept out of the mud-slinging stage of degenerate politics, and along the clean lines of principle, and cannot but deplore such utterances as the following:

"Binger Hermann would undoubtedly represent Oregon in the lower house of congress, in many particulars, in a very able manner, but it would be decidedly impolitic to even nominate him. Mr. Hermann was not literally kicked out of the United States land office, but received such a strong hint that he resigned. He knew that he had to go, and every politician in Oregon knows the same thing. With this knowledge, it cannot be possible, that the Republicans of this congressional district will seek to nominate a man who, if elected, would be guided by revengeful feelings and ally himself with the anti-Roosevelt Republicans. The Republicans of this district should not take up Hermann's fight and begin it with a slap at the administration. The nomination of Hermann for congress could be regarded in no other light than as a slap at President Roosevelt."

ASTORIA IN THE SWIM.

Items like the following are calculated to send a cold chill down the backs of the Oregon moonshackles residing in the city of Portland, who have always imagined that the development of any city in the state meant sure death and decimation to their own town.

Astoria is now in the swim. She has the sea dredge rapidly approaching completion, with 200 men hard at work to complete her at the earliest possible moment. She has the jetty project approved by the secretary of war, and a certainty of immediate progress in the work of extension.

She is now assured of a 20-foot entrance at the mouth of the Columbia before September 1st. She is assured of a 20-foot entrance within two or three years at most. Chairman Harman is now able to work on the solid basis of the finest port in the West at his immediate command. There is no reason on earth why he should not begin to develop this port for the great Oriental traffic. Here alone is the place where he can checkmate Hill's gigantic plans for corralling that great commerce.

Astoria is now in the swim. The last barriers to her seaport supremacy have been broken down and soon the debris will have been cleared away. Let us be up and doing. Let Astoria prepare now for a great future that is to come upon us with the end of the summer.

The young trees need cultivation for a few years, after which they will do very well in grass or clover, or any other cover crop. Too much cultivation ruins all such trees by growing too much brush, but they cannot have too much cover growth or mulch. Of course, no commercial apple crop can be grown now without spraying.
