UNITARIAN PASTOR INSTALLED

Interesting Services Last Night

Rev. Frank Abram Powell Installed as Pastor

Rev. Charles E. St. Johns of Boston Delivering Sermon

Frank Abram Powell was formally installed as pastor of the Salem Unitarian church on Friday evening. The services were held at the church, corner of Cheimoketa and Cottage streets.

Gideon Stols, president of the board of trustees, was the first speaker of the evening, and addressed the meeting in behalf of the congregation. He reviewed the fact that Rev. Powell was called to the pastorate of the Salem church last November, to succeed Rev. Elliot, and stated that the time had arrived, according to the customs of the Unitarian church, for the formal induction of the pastor-elect to the station to which he had been called.

After the introductory exercises, including scriptural reading and singing, Rev. St. John preached the sermon of installation. The subject of the address was: "The Household of God," based on the scriptural text, Ephesians 2:19-20. "Now, therefore, ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints, and of the household of God; and are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself, being the chief corner stone."

The membership of God's household, said the speaker, is not alone composed of the believers of creeds, nor does it consist entirely of those persons who have lived good lives; it includes all. As we come into existence we are adopted into the household of God. Many, said the speaker, are unconscious of the relation that exists between their souls and God, and in order that we may cause others to recognize this relation we must

comprehend that we ourselves are of God's household. Being conscious of this relation, a responsibility is assumed that must be discharged to the best of our ability. The speaker urged the members of the congregation to strive to attain the high ideal toward which they are striving. In conclusion Rev. St. John stated that the Unitarian church is one of the most religious church organizations in existence. He briefly reviewed the standing of this denomination, which, he declared, is rapidly coming into prominence in religious circles.

In delivering the right hand of fellowship and the charge to the new pastor, Rev. Cressy, of Portland, remarked that there is a scarcity of religious organizations in this section of the country, considering the magnitude of the country, and the enterprise and progress of the people. He urged the new preacher to preach practical sermons, and to treat fully, freely, broadly, conscientiously and profoundly the great religious truths of all time.

Mrs. Halle Parrish-Hinges contributed a vocal selection at this time, and Rev. W. G. Elliot, the retiring pastor, followed in delivering the charge to the congregation. He spoke of the significance of the service, as indicative of the freedom of conscience, upon which the Unitarians insist in their religious belief. The speaker then called attention to the growth of the organization in the Northwest, and stated that the field of usefulness of the Unitarian society was being gradually but surely extended and much power and influence are being wielded by that denomination.

Tendered a Reception. At the conclusion of the installation ceremonies, Rev. Powell was tendered a reception in the lecture rooms, where the ladies of the congregation served splendid refreshments.

Will Burn the Mortgage. There is a mortgage of indebtedness against the Salem society of \$7170, and it is the purpose of the congregation to raise that amount within the next 10 days. Rev. Elliot, in charging the members of the congregation last night, stated that he was in receipt of a letter from Mr. Stone, of San Francisco, Pacific coast secretary of the society, in which that gentleman had renewed his pledge for the financial relief of the Salem church. Mr. Stone agrees that if the congregation will raise one-half of the indebtedness, he will subscribe the remaining one-half. The offer of Mr. Stone holds good until April 1st, and in the meantime the members of the congregation will make an earnest effort to raise one-half of the obligation of the society, or \$3585. They hope to be able early in April to hold a mortgage-burning service.

Switch Extension. The main switch in the Southern Pacific yards in this city is being extended from its southern terminal. As at present constructed the switch is not more than half long enough to serve the purposes for which it was laid. Scarcely a day passes that a heavy freight train, in clearing the track for a passenger, is not obliged to double up, in order to get out of the way.

SALEM DEFEATS DALLAS

In a Swiftly Played Game

The Basket Ball Team is Now Champion of the State

Large and Enthusiastic Crowd Witnessed Game Last Night

The greatest event of the season took place last evening at the University gymnasium, when the first of two games was played between W. U. and Dallas college for the state intercollegiate championship. Dallas is champion of the West Side league, while W. U. has scooped everything east of the river, which made the game of unusual interest.

The players arrived yesterday, and a number of hacks brought over about 40 rooters in the afternoon. The crowd was one of the largest that the gymnasium ever held. The advertised "double-header" did not materialize, as the Dallas girls were unable to come, for some reason, but an interesting local game was played between the Freshmen girls and the "All School" team. The game resulted in a tie, 7 to 7. The Freshman team consisted of Misses Rigdon and Stowall, forwards; Parsons, (capt.) center; McConnell and Randall, guards. The "All School" was made up of Misses Clough and Swafford, forwards; Koschmieder (capt.), center; Holmstrom and Gray, guards.

The crowd cheered wildly when the opposing champions appeared on the floor. The boys started in fast and furious, and, after two minutes of play, Dallas made her first and only basket. The varsity boys soon got their bearings, however, and the score stood 4 to 2 at the end of the first half in favor of Willamette. In the second half the home team had everything its own way. The score began to pile up fast, and the varsity boys soon had them "going." Parsons' work was exceptionally fine, his goal from the field was the greatest feature of the game. Judd's goal made with one hand, while closely guarded, was something very seldom seen. Matthews was on his metal, and "walked all over" his man, making two goals over him.

The Dallas team is a strong, speedy team, and they go in for business. Their passing is excellent, and their center held Pollard down in better shape than the Portland "All-Star" center was able to do. But the unerring aim of our boys was too much for them, and the final score stood 5 to 21.

A recovery from this condition cannot take place within another month, and probably not until the latter part of May, when it is positively discovered that there is a shortage in the crop. Another fact that makes the market unusually quiet at this time is that brewers have suspended further purchases, pending a settlement of existing unsettled conditions. There is still another condition that contributes to the unsatisfactory condition of the situation. Growers at this season of the year, especially when the weather is favorable for the growing crop, become restless and desire to dispose of their holdings. This condition of restlessness becomes the more pronounced if there are indications that values will still further depreciate."
