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CHAMBERLAIN'S POLITICAL POLICY.

Governor Chamberlain's appointments so far disclose a deep political sagacity on his part. He has recognized Republicans who were friendly to his election and Democrats who are backed by the organization.

If he maintains the character and quality of his appointments in these two respects he will go out of office at the head of a strong administration and accomplish great results for the people.

The Republicans who helped defeat Furnish need not be ashamed to accept an appointment at the hands of a Democratic Governor honored with an election by the people to the highest office in so strong a Republican state.

Governor Chamberlain's appointments of Democrats who have the strong and united support of the Democratic organization is the only course he can pursue that will keep him out of the local factional fights.

His choice of men like E. C. Morrow, and Hupl. James, who are backed by the unanimous and hearty support of the working Democrats in their respective counties is wise and statesmanlike. If there is to be a Democratic party in Oregon for the future.

No state in the Union so much needs a vigorous and harmonious opposition party as Oregon, and no state has had an opposition party more badly disrupted by factions. Gov. Dates For Republican Primary Set

Also For County Convention to Elect Delegates

Thursday, March 31, the Marion County Republicans will hold their primaries for the election of delegates to the county convention, which will be held Friday, April 3. This action was taken by the Republican Central Committee which met at the city hall, Saturday afternoon.

The meeting was convened by chairman W. J. Culver at 2 o'clock with all but seven precincts represented either in person or by proxy. On motion of H. A. Johnson, a committee of five was appointed on apportionment of delegates to the county convention, as follows: H. A. Johnson, A. F. Hobart, O. D. Henderson, F. T. Wrightman, and S. A. Hughes. A recess of 15 minutes was taken, pending the return of the committee's report.

Chairman Culver was authorized to fill vacancies on central committee. The committee on apportionment recommended that the several precincts be allowed one delegate at large and one for every 15 votes or majority thereof, cast for congressman at the last general election. This apportionment makes a convention of 250 members.
