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A PROPER PRISON PHYSICIAN.

The question of a suitable man for prison physician is still the engrossing topic among the local Democrats and among the medical men of the city and county. Some deny that the question of establishing a clinic at the prison for the benefit of medical students is an open one at all, although several surgeons say that it is done at many prisons, and that interesting operations are of public importance, and that there can be no harm in allowing medical men and students to witness them.

Others say no state institution should be used as an attraction for any particular medical college, and that there will be destruction of discipline and demoralization of the prison management, if it is permitted. There is great difference of opinion among physicians as to the extent of the operations to be carried on, some surgeons operating for appendicitis very frequently, while others do not operate at all, except in extreme cases. The tendency among the profession is to operate less than formerly, when, for a time, there was a craze to convert every case, even fever cases, into subjects for the operating table.

There is a deeper question involved in the selection of a prison physician than of the individual, and that of one school of medicine or another, and that is the right of the prisoner to say whether he shall be subjected to operations or not. The prisoner is not a free man, and the superintendent of the prison not being a physician, as in the case of the asylum for the insane, the prisoner is at the mercy of the prison physician. He must take his treatment or none. If he says operate, operate it is. And when it is recalled that many operations are in their very nature experimental, it will be plain that there should be the greatest care in choosing a prison physician, and getting one, if possible, who has passed through the operation craze, that has swept over the country with such fatal force in many instances. The prisoner is human, and is entitled to some consideration, even though he has been branded a criminal by the courts. To be made the subject of spectacular operations

NO MORE DUST FOR EUGENE

W. S. Hubble Has the Contract for Street Sprinkling

Eugene Guard, March 24th: The dust which has been flying in the faces of Eugene citizens for the past few days finally lodged in the eyes of some of our worthy city councilmen, and they straightway arranged for a special meeting of the city council to treat with the condition of affairs. They met in august session last evening, and discussed the proposition to their heart's content.

A well-known transfer man made the proposition to sprinkle the squares at the intersection of the business streets for \$25 per month. As heretofore, the merchants will pay for the sprinkling in front of their places of business.

The proposition met with the approval of a majority of the councilmen, and it was so ordered.

The contract was drawn up, and this morning business men commenced the day's work with the dust laid out in helplessness in front of their stores. The good work will go on.

The proposition of summer sprinkling for the residence portion of the city will be taken up at some future time. The offer of the water company will most likely receive favorable consideration, with the provision that the service be paid for by the abutting property owners.

Chicago's Dog Show Opens.

Chicago, Ill., March 25.—Owners of dogs, breeders of dogs and friends of dogs generally are displaying a lively interest in the third annual exhibition of the Chicago Kennel Club, which opened today in the First Regiment Armory. Dogs of all sizes, shapes, breeds and nationalities are benched, and the many valuable prizes hung up has had the effect of making the competition keen in every class. Especial attention has been given this year to the collie class and it is probable that before the show closes there will be formed a western collie club similar to the Collie Club of America. In addition to the collies the exhibition is notable for the large number and high class of fox terriers, St. Bernards, Great Danes and bull dogs on show. The show continues through the remainder of the week and the attendance, judging from the indications today, will be unusually large.

Maryland Observes Anniversary.

Baltimore, Md., March 25.—This is Maryland's birthday, the anniversary of the landing at St. Mary's of the colonists sent out in 1634 by George Calvert first Baron of Baltimore. In future it is supposed to celebrate the day in the same manner that Massachusetts celebrates Patriot's Day and Texas its independence day. The state board of education, at the suggestion of the governor, has requested that hereafter the day be set apart in the schools for the study of an event in the state's history.

New American Liner.

London, March 25.—The first of the big steamers to be added to the American line service between Philadelphia and Liverpool, the Belgium steamship Friesland, sails from Liverpool today for Philadelphia, in command of Captain Apfeld. The Friesland, Merion, Noordland, Westernland and Haverford will constitute the service in the future. The Friesland was built on the Clyde in 1902 and can carry 16,000 tons of cargo in addition to 1000 passengers.
